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Preface



Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya (D.S.V.V.) is a non-conventional centre of higher learning, education and research. It is an exceptional creation, which has born out of a unique vision of the groundbreaking scholar and visionary, **Pt Shriram Sharma Acharya ji** (1911-1990), who was also a renowned social reformer and a celebrated freedom fighter. He was honored by the Government of India for his meritorious services by releasing a postal stamp in his memory in the year 1991. He had a vision to establish a university devoted to the preservation and propagation of the Indian Culture, which to him was *Dev Sanskriti*, that could combine the percepts of **practical knowledge** (*shiksha*) and **spiritual education** (*vidya*) to create truly enlightened individuals.

Pt Shriram Sharma Acharya believed that there is need for an educational institution, which could mould its students into noble and enlightened human beings; selfless, warm-hearted, compassionate and kind. To achieve these goals that he had set in his life time for the radical change in the field of higher education; after his attainment of Samadhi in June 1990, his admirers and followers resolved to translate his vision into action by establishing a university and named it as *Dev Sanskriti*. Acharya's silent revolutionary movement is now well established as Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, which works with a primary focus of providing a confluence of modern education with instillation of human values in the students. The students are expected to follow a simple, spiritual life style and they receive benefit from both; state of the art facilities and the wisdom of ancient traditional practices. This allows the university to provide noble citizens, who would channelize their efforts towards the goal of a divine, value based society.

The university was established in the year 2002 on the basis of an act (22.01.2002) passed by the state legislature of the Uttarakhand and notified in the gazette vide notification no. (123/vidhayi & sansadiya karya/2002 dated 11.04.2002). The university is duly recognized by the University Grants Commission and is **privately sponsored by Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, Shantikunj,** a renowned socio-spiritual organization. Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya remains devoted to its founding principles. This has established the university as an epitome of moral and technical education and has very pertinently addressed the need of the academia of having an institution, which can extend solutions to modern day problems with ancestral wisdom, and can contribute in building the future of the country.

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is committed towards:

- Advocating and upholding the fundamental values of Indian Culture with an aim of global cultural & spiritual renaissance.
- Advancing the intellectual, cultural and spiritual welfare of the students by reviving the education pattern of the ancient times.
- Sustaining sentiments of patriotism and service to the society.
- Developing a new generation of professionals to spread the ancient Vedic wisdom.
- Working with established National and International institutes to enrich educational quality and spiritual activities around the world.
- Maintaining High standards of ethics and quality in research, teaching and administration.

The lush campus of the university is set in the Himalayan surroundings and is both beautiful and state-of-the-art. The university has well equipped infrastructure in the form of adequate number of lecture theaters with modern ICT facilities, laboratories, central and departmental libraries, auditoriums, sports and gym centre, health centre, amenities centre, student and faculty cafeterias, offices, full wi-fi connectivity, adequate security arrangements, *yajnashala*, herbal gardens, *gaushala*, museum, multi-modal polyclinic etc. It is a residential and non-affiliatory university with co-education facilities having separate hostels for boys and girls along with the residential facility for all the faculty and supporting staff.

In addition to offering undergraduate, post-graduate and post-doctoral programmes in wide array of subjects such as Human Consciousness and Yogic Science, Psychology, Indian History and Culture, Theology, Computer Science and Application, Animation, Holistic Health, Tourism, Mathematics, Rural Entrepreneurship and Development, Environmental Science, Life Management, Scientific Spirituality, Languages, Education, Journalism and Mass Communication etc., the university specializes in the character development of its students through fostering an uplifted lifestyle based on the spiritual practices of east and the west. The result is well-rounded and dynamic graduates eager to channel their skills towards serving the needs of society.

The number of current faculties in the university is 119, out of which 66 possess Ph.D. degree in different disciplines. Approximately, more than 15000 students, either through regular or via distance mode, have completed their education from the University. These students have come from different states of the country reflecting a truly national character of the university. A unique feature of the university is seen in terms of *Jeevandani* (Life donors) and *Samaydani* (Time Donors) *karyakartas* (Volunteers) working as faculty and staff and contributions made by socially conscious people through a unique process of *Anshdan* (Part-Donation), which allows it to meet all its capital requirements and shortfall in revenue expenses. It has a provision to provide fellowship and scholarship to all the economically disadvantaged students.

It is worth mentioning that the university does not charge any tuition fee but takes only maintenance charges towards hostel, mess, library, laboratory and computers etc. The internship programme is also one of the distinguishing features of the education of this university. This unique programme not only guarantees that students would apply what they have learnt through curriculum, but also presents an opportunity to them to gain valuable

career-related experience, make contacts in their chosen field, and better the world through their knowledge. An internship is compulsory for every course, and a special department of the university helps every student find an internship that suits to his or her needs.

The movement as a whole is fuelled by the active participation of over 100 million members and has branches in more than 40 countries.

The university has International Collaborations with esteemed International Institutions in the US, UK, Germany, Italy, China, Poland, Latvia, Indonesia, Russia, Kazakhstan and Korea. Preamble

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya (D.S.V.V.) is a progressive institute of higher learning, education and research. It was created through the vision of the patron founder Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya ji, who had a vision to establish a University dedicated to the preservation and propagation of the Indian Culture by combining the percepts of practical knowledge (*shiksha*) and spiritual education (*vidya*). Such an educational institution could mould its students into noble and enlightened human beings; selfless, compassionate and kind. His vision became a reality when the University was established in the 2002. The University is now recognized by the University Grants Commission and is privately sponsored by Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, Shantikunj, a renowned socio-spiritual organization.

The University is committed to promoting and maintaining the fundamental values of Indian Culture with an aim of global cultural and spiritual renaissance. It aims at advancing the intellectual, cultural and spiritual welfare of the students by reviving the education pattern of the ancient times. It also strives to maintain the high standards of ethics and quality in research, teaching and administration. As a result, the University has established itself as an epitome of moral and technical education and has addressed the need of a modern day academic institution which can extend solutions to current day problems with ancestral wisdom.

The University offers undergraduate, post-graduate and post-doctoral programs in a wide array of subjects such as Yoga and Human Consciousness, Psychology, Indian History and Culture, Theology, Computer Science and Application, Animation, Holistic Health, Tourism, Mathematics, Rural Entrepreneurship and Development, Environmental Science, Life Management, Scientific Spirituality, Linguists, Education, Journalism and Mass Communication, etc. The University has well-equipped infrastructure in the form of lecture theaters, laboratories, central and departmental libraries, residential facilities, auditoriums, sports and gym centre, health centre, student and faculty cafeterias, offices, Wi-Fi connectivity, adequate security arrangements, *yajnashala*, herbal gardens, *gaushala*, museum, multi-modal polyclinic etc.

The students have access to highly trained mentors and teachers who are experts in the various fields of study. The student body consists of a diverse ray of individuals from different states of the country reflecting a truly national character of the University. In addition, the University has international students and faculty collaborations in the US, UK, Germany, Italy, China, Poland, Latvia, Indonesia, Russia, Kazakhstan and Korea. The research activities of the University are also appreciated at the International level and the University publishes a biannual International Interdisciplinary Journal called Dev Sanskriti.

1. CURRICULUM ASPECTS

To fulfill the mission statement of the University which is to unite contemporary education with spiritual training for each student, a very systematic approach is taken to develop specialized curricula for each course offered. The University offers some unique courses such as the Scientific Spirituality as a module to bridge both contemporary sciences with a spiritual view. In addition, courses which have a depth in Indian culture and wisdom such as the course programmes in the Yogic Science and Holistic Health and in the Indigenous Psychology are taught with a modern understanding to enable students to practice in the current age. Students have a choice in a wide array of subjects ranging from conventional knowledge based on the ancient traditions such as Sanskrit, Indian History and Culture, Theology, Yogic Science to contemporary courses in modern disciplines such as in the Computer Science, Mathematics, Animation, Journalism and Tourism. The unique mandatory course of Life Management provides an opportunity for students to identify their true purpose through discovering their immense potential.

The University accommodates many unique centers such as the multi-modal polyclinic where many disorders are treated through indigenous therapies, a cattle farm with zero waste management system and many more. All the centers amplify the learning process of the students and are integrated in the course curricula where applicable. Perhaps, one of the most successful and creative opportunities that all students who graduate from Dev Sanskriti University is the unique internship program that mandates students to donate their time to the community by providing services through the skills they have obtained at the University. Finally, students have opportunities to cultivate their spiritual potential through a set daily routine in yoga, meditation, rituals and special weekly classes in Gita and Mediation conducted by the Honorable Chancellor.

Curricula for each programme are created through feedback from students, faculty, external experts, alumni and industry representatives to ensure that the course is rigorous and suitable for the modern requirements of today's society. The University also develops courses and curricula based on international needs and collaborations. Currently, the University holds 18 international collaborations for joint academic programmes. Finally, the completed curriculum package is presented to the Board of Studies and then approved by the Academic Council.

2. TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION:

Along with creating rigorous curricula for each programme, the University ensures that teaching and learning evaluations are conducted throughout each semester. To ensure a student-centric learning atmosphere, teaching is conducted in a more interactive mode through group discussions, case studies, question-answer sessions, audio/visuals, quizzes and project/scientific paper presentations. This allows students to build confidence and converse with peers in their subject field. Aside from the classroom setting, students have the opportunity to participate in educational tours that provide them practical knowledge in the taught subject. Students are also able to interact with experts in the field of study through lectures and seminars by invited guests. Annually, the University organizes national and international conferences wherein students gain knowledge in the desired field from leading experts. Students are given opportunities to learn various extra-

curricular skills such as vocational skills, ancient Indian therapies, handicraft, sketching, etc. during off-class hours. This helps to give a broader perspective to the students. To enhance creativity, students are encouraged to participate in various spiritual practices like early morning mantra chanting, prayer, meditation and *yajna*. Sports facilities, National Service Scheme (NSS) camps, Rovers and Rangers program, adventure camps provide further avenues for nurturing the creativity of the students.

To ensure that teaching standards are constantly enhanced, the University regularly conducts formal and informal feedback sessions from students. In addition, faculty members are encouraged to attend national and international seminars to gain current understanding in their field and incorporate in prepared syllabi. Faculty exchange programmes with international universities have proven to be valuable in enhancing teaching and research skills. Conversely, the faculty members who participate in the exchange program are able to share their insights and expertise in the area of Life Management, Stress Management, Time Management, Scientific Spirituality, and Holistic Living at an international level. The faculty also have ample opportunity to master modern technology and tools for their teaching methods and personal skill development through workshops offered through the Computer Science department and the Training and Placement Cell. Participation in Orientation and Refresher courses offered by the UGC boost teaching and research abilities of the faculty.

Evaluation of student progress through assessment tests and examinations is relayed to the students in the University prospectus, website and by their respective departments. As the campus is fully residential, communication is easily accessible through intercom systems in the hostels and notice boards. In addition, the University has developed a specialized examination system for Ph.D. students to ensure national standards are maintained once candidates graduate. The Examination Cell of the University makes every effort to ensure the transparency and privacy of the examination process. The students are well informed about their examination attendance and the minimum required for a passing grade. Any disciplinary issues or misconduct registered during the academic calendar are taken into consideration before allowing the students to partake in the examinations. The examination papers are graded within the stipulated time frame and the Examination Cell ensures a fair process of all student assessments.

3. RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION:

Research conducted by the PhD students and small-scale projects form an integral part of the University's impactful knowledge base and therefore the University's Research Committee strives for a high standard of innovative research following UGC standard and ethical guidelines of the research community. In order for students to conduct quality research, the University mandates PhD students to take coursework in addition to the standard programme. Periodical review of the research progress and examinations through written and oral exams results in the students' ability to grasp knowledge in their dissertation subject area resulting in improved job placement and post-doctoral positions. The Research and Publication Cell of the University documents, compiles and publishes research output and the results are presented/published at national and international conferences and journals.

Students conducting the research projects also have the opportunity to conduct their research with the associated institute called Brahmavarchas Research Institute which was inaugurated in 1979 by Gayatri Pariwar. In addition, students have access to facilities at the Center of Complementary and Alternative Medicine, Psychology Lab, Environmental Science Lab, Computer Lab, Animation Lab, Journalism and Mass Communication Lab etc., which provide the necessary infrastructure for the implementation of research activities. Students also have access to the internet as well as the Central Library to obtain published journal articles in their related fields. To broaden the research skills at the University, effective collaborations with national and international universities for academic and research exchange programs are being conducted. Results from successful research projects are published in the University's biannual research journal - Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal (DSIIJ - ISSN 2279-0578), which publishes original work of all subjects dedicated to the indigenous knowledge.

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya has a unique consultancy policy that is rooted in the basic principles of All World Gayatri Pariwar that exclusively acts as a social organization. Accordingly, the University provides services to the society without any remunerations and is available free of charge. Consulting in a broad range of areas such as Medical treatment, Spiritual awakening, Statistical methods, Psychiatry treatment, Psychological Counseling, Ayurvedic treatment, Yagyopathy, Rural development in Soil and Water conservation, organic farming and medicinal plant cultivation has enhanced the lives of various communities in both personal upliftment and environmental protection.

The extension services are equally deep rooted in the University through the widespread network of the parent organization, All World Gayatri Pariwar. In rural areas many small enterprises and entrepreneurship have resulted from the successful extension work through the Rural Management Department. Some of the services provided include cow based products, bee keeping, hand-made paper production, Handloom fabric technology, waste water treatment and reuse, rain water harvesting and modern cow culture practices. Various other extension services through the Department of Theology have been successful in human health management, de-addiction programmes, promotion of education and hygiene.

To ensure that graduated students have the experience in extension and social service, an internship programme is mandated. During this programme the students of all the disciplines go to rural and urban areas, where they gain the practical experience and also contribute to the dissemination of the knowledge learnt during their course programme. At these locations, the extension activities are monitored by regional and zonal centers of Shantikunj. Many outreach programs in which students and faculty participate directly involve the community in various areas such as blood donation, rain water harvesting, traffic education and regulation, preservation of monuments, reforestation, disaster management, health campaigns focusing on polio eradication, HIV/AIDS, education to promote literacy in rural areas, adults and women, women empowerment, career guidance, and campaigns against social evils like untouchability, dowry and addictions.

4. INFRASTRUCTURE & LEARNING RESOURCES:

The University campus is spread over 75 acres of land which houses state of art buildings that are well connected with asphalted roads and high mast street lights with lush natural greenery. The University has adequate infrastructural facilities for academic, administrative, examination and various other related activities. The University is privately sponsored by the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, Haridwar, who ensures all financial assistance to the University for the suitable development of the infrastructure.

The campus has two large academic buildings that consist of classrooms, laboratories, seminar halls, offices for faculty and computer laboratories. Besides other small auditoriums, there is a large auditorium that has a stage and in-built audio system and projector. There are a total of 4 hostels that can house over 600 boys and girls separately and also adequate residential facilities for faculty members. The University has proposed to build more residential facilities for students and the faculty. Students on campus are provided nutritional meals at the University mess building which has four dining areas and clean drinking water. A new 3 storey Cafeteria is also fully operational within the University. The campus also has a health center that provides primary health care for students, faculty and employees of the University.

The campus has a primary education school for children of the University employees and the local community. It has the C.B.S.E. course that is developed for play group children and KG to 12th standard. To provide students with exemplary learning resources, the University has the central library which is a six story building that has over 37,000 books, journals and over 1000 e-journals encompassing the wide range of subject material including spiritual teachings from various saints. Various centers and departments have libraries, laboratories and computer facilities that aid in the teaching and learning of the students. The campus also has a unique garden that has an acupressure path with fountains and a center for various fresh juices of vegetables and fruits. To add to the spiritual ambience of the campus, there is an amphitheater at the center of campus for various activities such as meditation and festival celebrations. A beautiful Shiva Temple is situated in the middle of the amphitheater. Research labs, computer labs and Yoga halls remain open after school hours to allow students flexibility to work in their related fields.

To allow students to partake in various recreational activities, the campus has a gymnasium, basketball court, volleyball court and a music center.

5. STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION:

The University has a well-developed system to support and mentor its students by guiding them at the professional, personal, social and spiritual fronts. The dedicated systems and practices in place ensure the welfare and positive progression of all students. Students get the opportunity to render solutions to everyday problems of coping with the different environments, managing group dynamics, study related issues and career orientation. As the University's major objective is to unite conventional knowledge with spiritual training, the students are encouraged to attend specially designed sessions conducted under the direct guidance of the Chancellor of the University, Dr. Pranav Pandya. He conducts sessions in Bhagavat Gita and Meditation to allow students to incorporate these teachings in their daily life as a resident of the University and after they graduate. In addition, the Chancellor meets with all the students each semester to provide personal guidance on any issues students may face. The mandatory course in Life Management which is part of the regular curriculum of all courses, aid in group counselling where teachers helps student remove any confusions at a personal, social or spiritual level. Students can also seek the Head of Departments for any issues related their academic progress. Feedback on course curricula is regularly taken and improvements are incorporated in due course.

A unique student initiative called 'Srijna' that the University has developed offers support and encouragement to the students from underprivileged background. Under this initiative, students are encouraged to represent their skills at the University platform. Students create products such as candies, laddoos, rakhi (wrist bands), greetings cards, rugs, pickles, jute bags, handicraft, and much more. This in turn enables them to earn some money to meet their monthly needs. This unique initiative makes them selfsufficient and self-reliant. Over the years, this initiative has evolved to become a selfentrepreneurial model. In addition, financial assistance, scholarships, and other liberal policies offer support to students from the rural or underprivileged background.

Apart from students' classroom education, there are ample opportunities for students to participate in workshops, seminars and symposia. This enhances the students' educational discipline and provides an opportunity to learn presentations skills in both oral and posters. Interactions of students with alumni of the University is valuable in that they can provide current trends in job markets and provide guidance on their real world life after graduating from the University. Various departments of the University organize industry visits and field studies for students to gain practical learning experience. These visits expose them to the practice of theories and enable them to think beyond the scope of the classroom setting. In addition, the internship program is also a unique out of the classroom learning experience, in which students with various skill sets offer their services to the society making them validate their learning and in turn help them grow into better individuals.

The Training & Placement Cell of the University also plays a vital role in identifying the gaps in which students need to cope with the fast changing trends of the industry. These gaps are filled by providing training that offer support to the regular academic processes such as designing a CV, spoken/written English, Interviews skills, group discussions, debates and public speaking, computer knowledge, job placement and career counselling.

Various learning, recreational and culturally enriching opportunities are organized by the University administration such as the National Service Scheme (NSS), welcoming the new students in traditional way by celebrating the yearly 'Unnayan' event, 'Utsav' as the annual celebration of sports, cultural events, festival celebrations etc. All these opportunities offer multiple platforms to the students to represent and develop their skills.

Besides giving special attention to student support and progress, the University takes great interest in motivating the teachers and staff to work for the betterment and development of all the students. The Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor & Pro Vice-Chancellor motivate them on the desired lines and remain available to the students to redress their

grievances. Parents of the students also play a pivotal role in the students' progress during their educational years. To better understand the students and family background, a special three day orientation programme for the parents is conducted. In this orientation, parents are made aware of all University policies, guidelines and norms so that they can become better enablers in their children educational journey.

6. GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a unique higher education institution that strives constantly to uphold and enhance the combination of contemporary education with spiritual training. It is the manifested dream of the chief patron Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya. The Chancellor of the University is Dr. Pranav Pandya, who is also head of the senior management of Shanti Kunj, a socio-spiritual academy dedicated to the upliftment of mankind through the process of self-refinement. This lays the foundation of the strong governance of this institution.

The University believes in a transformational leadership process where the upper management enables the next level and assists them in making decisions and thus creating a conducive and productive environment. The Chancellor is assisted by Vice Chancellor, Pro Vice Chancellor, Finance Officer, Registrar, Controller of Examinations and Directors and Heads of Departments in developing, implementing and continuously improving the processes and systems to run the University.

The stakeholders of the University start with the patron founders, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya and Vandaniya Mata Bhagwati Devi Sharma. It was their vision that the University would be a place of acquiring knowledge not just to earn profit but also to develop individuals with dynamic personalities and spiritual heights so that they may offer services to the communities and directly assist in the overall transformation of the current world. Keeping this vision in mind the University abides by these foundations during all decision makings. Students are the next important stakeholders of the University. They are affectionately considered as part of the larger family of Shantikunj and thus have the ability to directly interact with the top management as opposed to only going through the chain of command. The third stakeholders of the University are the parents of these students who entrust their children with this institution. Parents invest their time and effort so that their children can attend this University therefore their suggestions and views are duly considered when implementing procedures and safety rules. The Parent Orientation program allows them to fully understand the University mission and policies. Teachers are another important aspect of the University stakeholders. They are the daily direct connection to the students who can impart knowledge in the subject areas as well as guidance to student's personal needs. Teacher suggestions and feedback is therefore a major component is the designing process of the University system.

Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust is the University stakeholder that makes all the key decisions with regard to their academic initiative at DSVV. The Chancellor is the part of the Trust and some members of the governing council of the University are among the trustees of Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust. The government and regulating bodies support and guide the University in policy making. Finally, the main stakeholder of the University is considered

as the society. Students with character and competence have a sense of responsibility towards the society at a large. This University feels that as an academic institution, it is building the future of the nation and therefore its students should be better citizens with ethics and ethos reflected in their conduct. DSVV is a people's University as there is a large segment of the society who contributes in operating the system by offering financial assistance to the trust.

7. INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

To keep up with the ever changing scope and demands of the world, the University is always developing innovative methods for operational and student enhancement. One of the main operational aspects of the University is the commitment to the environment and being eco-friendly. Energy is conserved through the well laid out plans of the building infrastructure which allows for natural light and ventilation. In addition, the University has two renewable sources of energy: 1. The Rural Management Department has a cowshed which uses biogas for its operations and 2. Solar heaters used in the Mess for preheating water. The campus takes dedicated measures to minimize the carbon foot prints to zero, by Reducing, Reusing, and Recycling its consumption. For example, Paper is recycled to make handmade paper for folders, envelopes, files, notebooks, photo frames, etc. Collected waste is used create manure and compost as fertilizers for plants and crops.

To purify the environment, the University conducts *Yajna* every morning. To further cleanse the atmosphere, the University maintains a lush green environment with special medicinal and herbal plants. Students are also encouraged to plant and take care of trees as a commitment to restoring the environment.

Over the years the University has created innovative methods that have had a positive impact on the students. One such event is the Gyan Deeksha Ceremony where every student participates at the commencement of each semester. Students are welcomed with a Gayatri mantra duppatta and a tulsi sapling, respectively representing that they must aspire for refined intellect and purity in life. In addition, the existing students and teachers welcome new members in a familial way by celebrating "Unnayan", a yearly cultural event. This event promotes a ragging-free environment.

To create a personal positive impact on each student at the University, classes on Life Management by the Chancellor Dr. Pranav Pandya are conducted. Attending these classes have shown that students build their character with competence by igniting their inner potential. Yagopathy, Scientific Spirituality courses, Spiritual Study Circles, Meditation, Daily Yoga, Deep *Yajna* etc have all promoted a sense of deep connection with the divine among students.

Students are also motivated to represent their creative writings skills through the University news bulletin – Sanskriti Sanchar. The bulletin publishes the current endeavours both at Shantikunj and University level. It covers interviews from experts of the University, Shantikunj and also those visiting from various segments of society such as spiritual leaders, industry executives and managers, social workers, etc. Sanskriti

Sanchar also shares the testimonies of student and staff members especially focusing on their commitment to volunteer their time for this larger cause.

The University has a number of best practices that which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the University. Two of the major best practice measures running at the University are:

- 1. The concept of Samaydaan (Time Donation) and Anshadaan (Financial Resources)
- 2. The Social Internship Programme

The University encourages dedicated and skilled people to contribute their time and skills in this academic endeavor. Those who are dedicated but are unable to join the organization as a full time members render their contribution financially. In this way a self-sustaining model has been built.

The Internship Program of the University is unique in that it allows the students to serve the community directly through their received training. Before completion of their educational programme, the students are expected to spend at least 2 months in the Internship Program to provide social service in the deprived community. The students are sent to various parts of the country to work on any of the seven major areas of social reform, namely Rural Development, De-addiction programmes, Women Empowerment, Environmental Protection, Health and Education to all.

SWOC Analysis Strengths:

- 1. A unique center of higher education, learning and research set in the Himalayan surroundings. The lush green campus of the University is infused with spiritual ambience to accomplish the institutional vision of confluence of vedic wisdom and contemporary knowledge.
- 2. The educational ethos of the University is based on the teachings of Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya (1911-1990), who was a ground breaking scholar, revolutionary seer and a great visionary. He had a vision to create an educational institution that could mould its students into noble and enlightened human beings, and that vision serves as the motto statement of this University and inspiration for other educational institutions.
- 3. The University follows an exceptional set of curriculum that includes commencement of some pioneering disciplines, such as Life Management, Scientific Spirituality etc. to allow comprehensive development of students.
- 4. The University has adopted some innovative practices in the form of *Samaydaan* (donation of time and talent by learned individuals) and *Anshdaan* (donation of resources by socially conscientious individuals). This fully residential University does not take any tuition fee and hence students return the contribution of the society by undertaking mandatory social internship for the betterment of the society.
- 5. The teaching-learning process is enhanced and enriched by implementation of some novel practices such as weekly classes by Honorable Chancellor, spiritual study circles, youth initiative DIYA, honesty counter etc.

Weaknesses:

- 1. The University has an excellent student teacher ratio however, most of the teaching faculty are young and hence absence of highly experienced academicians is visibly felt.
- 2. The University is committed to undertake research in the areas of traditional Indian knowledge and indigenous studies, and hence acquiring consultancy projects in the desired disciplines continue to remain a challenge.
- 3. The University does not take any grants from any government body and is fully funded by the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, a charitable trust run by contributions from the masses; the budgetary provisions are limited and are largely utilized for altruistic intentions. This makes it difficult to provide ample amount of funds for swift implementation of institutional needs.

Opportunities:

- 1. To develop an educational model based on the concept of amalgamation of vedic wisdom and traditional knowledge that could be implemented across the educational fraternity.
- 2. To provide socially conscientious individuals in the form of noble citizens to the nation by instilling right principles and values in the students.
- 3. To undertake non conventional research in the conventional areas that could provide global scientific recognition to the ancient wisdom of India.
- 4. To establish centers of excellence in the areas expertise of the University such as Yogic Science and Human Consciousness, Vedic Informatics, Scientific Spirituality, Spiritual Communication, Veda and Sanskrit, Indigenous Psychology etc.
- 5. The extensive network of the parent organization with approximately 100 million members and 4000 centers, can serve as a wide platform for the implementation of institutional objectives.

Challenges:

- 1. Increasing number of the educational institutions and in such a mushrooming environment, it is a challenge to maintain the value based quality education that this University is committed to provide.
- 2. To improve educational quality in rural areas of the state considering the difficult transport and accommodation facilities.
- 3. To continue providing scholars with employable opportunities in a struggling employment scenario.
- 4. To continue attracting students from diversified background.
- 5. The core knowledge domain of the University lies in the conventional Indian knowledge system which is not as technologically advanced as other emerging disciplines and hence it remains a challenge to keep the faculty abreast with the global expectations.

1.1 CURRICULUM DESIGN AND DEVELOPMENT

1.1.1 How is the institutional vision and mission reflected in the academic programmes of the University?

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a state private University, which was founded in the year 2002, in accordance with the vision and wishes of revolutionary seer and saint, Pt. The students are expected to follow a simple, spiritual life style and they receive benefit from both; state of the art facilities and the wisdom of ancient traditional practices.

Today, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is recognized for the breadth and depth of its knowledge of the ancestral wisdom of India and its ability to apply this knowledge for the cultivation of students of exceptional skills and character for the benefit of society. While the University most prizes the values and high-minded character traits of its student body, it also understands well that a thorough and broad education in a field of specialization is a crucial resource for agents of change and social servants in the modern world.

Vision and Mission of the University

The vision and mission that the University has embraced from the teachings of Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya, allowed it to fashion its academic programmes in such a manner that the above said objectives are thoroughly met and efficiently applied.

The vision of the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is to unite contemporary education with spiritual training to cultivate well-rounded, competent and personally uplifted graduates, who possess a scientifically grounded understanding and experience of spiritual transformation and a powerful drive to use their gifts to promote the greater good of society. The motto statement of the University is hence aptly framed as 'A University for the Global Cultural and Spiritual Renaissance'. The mission of the University is as below:

- 1. Confluence of traditional education with science and spirituality
- 2. Creation of devoted, righteous and learned students
- 3. Infusion of scientific spirituality into life style
- 4. Creation of citizens well-endowed with nationalistic ideals
- 5. Guiding future leaders by developing human values and oneness towards all
- 6. Conducting non-conventional research in the conventional disciplines

The initiatives taken by the University in order to accomplish this vision are:

- Offering courses in unique disciplines, such as in the subject of the scientific spirituality, which serve as mandatory module for all the undergraduate students of the University and help achieving the mission of the University of providing confluence of traditional education with science and spirituality.
- Offering courses of conventional wisdom which are underpinned with modern understanding; such as the course programmes in the Yogic Science and Holistic Health and in the Indigenous Psychology that permit students to gain the spiritual understanding from a scientific perspective and to architect their lives based on great virtues.
- Establishing a centre of wide recognition that is dedicated to undertake research on the scientific spirituality. **Brahmvarchas Research Centre** had conducted pioneering research in the discipline of scientific spirituality and continues to contribute by serving as the backbone of the **Research and Publication Cell** of the University, which oversees publication of the Dev Sanskriti: International Interdisciplinary Journal of the University.
- Carefully designing courses that provide a mix of the conventional knowledge as well as of contemporary education and hence, while University has courses based on the ancient traditions like Sanskrit, Indian History and Culture, Theology, Yogic Science and Human Consciousness; it also offers courses in modern disciplines such as Computer Science, Mathematics, Animation, Journalism and Mass Communication and Tourism. The wide array of subjects provides a distinctive identity to the University and assists it to follow its mission objectives.
- Providing a unique course programme in the form of **Life Management**, which aims to unleash the hidden potential of the students and bring excellence in their lives by teaching them subjects like personality refinement, time management, interpersonal skills, disaster management, environmental awareness and anti-corruption. This module is mandatory for all students and hence, it provides an opportunity to create morally sound, conscientious citizens, who can lead the society and are well endowed with nationalistic ideals.

- Founding **unique centers within the University** such as a multi-modal polyclinic, which houses all ancient Indian therapeutic techniques under one roof, a psychological disorders clinic based on indigenous psychotherapy, a distinctive acupressure path with herbal garden, and a cattle farm with zero waste management; all of which are linked to the course curriculum and hence, provide an excellent opportunity to the students to learn from practical experience and from the environment while undertaking their academic studies.
- Creating an exclusive **Internship programme** for the students that allow them to perform social service for socially disadvantaged individuals. Opportunities for active engagement in social service are facilitated by the outreach work of University's parent organization; the All World Gayatri Pariwar and this exceptional experience of social work allow them to learn about human values and oneness for all.
- Cultivating spiritual life through private consultation with their professors and through a series of spiritual practices and rituals, carefully designed to cultivate the intellectual faculties of the students that are integrated into a set daily routine of each day. Additionally weekly classes conducted by the Honorable Chancellor on Gita and Meditation serve as an inspiration for all the students.

1.1.2. Does the University follow a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum? If yes, give details of the process (need assessment, feedback, etc.).

Yes. The University follows a highly systematic process in designing and development of the curriculum. The process adopted by the University has the following approach:

a. Collection of Feedback:

The departments of the University have a **curriculum development committee**, which collects the feedback and current trends from the industry, faculties, peers, alumni and current students via course-coordinators, departmental heads and from the external experts. Academic input is also sought during academic events such as Conferences, Seminars, Faculty Development Programmes and in the Workshops. The feedback collecting mechanism is both formal and informal.

b. Development of Curricula:

Based on the feedback received; the curriculum development committee prepares a draft that includes proposed curriculum, objective of the proposed course programme, employability of the suggested course, a trend analysis of possible projections in the subject areas in next few years as well as societal and industrial expectations. The UGC model of course curricula for that given programme are given due consideration in the process of development of curricula.

The committee then also considers that how this course programme can be moulded into a value based course as per the mission of the University while keeping the desired academic criteria intact. The prepared draft curriculum is then placed before the faculty members to receive their suggestions and modifications. The curriculum finalized by the faculty members is placed before the Board of Studies for further discussion.

c. Approval of Curricula:

The University has **Board of Studies** for each subject, which is prescribed for degree, diploma and certificate course programmes. The function of the Board of Studies is to initiate proposals regarding new courses of study and to make suitable changes in the existing curricula. The new curricula or modifications in the existing curricula, as emerged from the aforementioned process are then submitted before the Board of Studies of that particular subject.

All the decisions and resolutions passed by the Board are presented before the **Academic Council** for its approval and eventually to the **Board of Governors** for final approval.

d. Implementation of Curricula:

After the final approval is obtained on the curriculum, the University starts publicizing the course through prospectus, banners, hoardings, flyers, print and electronic media advertisements, notifications, via University website and by using community outreach programmes of the University.

The curriculum is implemented from the following academic year, which is then periodically reviewed in the departmental meetings, faculty meetings and in the bi-annual meeting of the Board of Studies. The University aims to revise and update its syllabus at least once in three years.

1.1.3 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development?

- Employability
- Innovation
- Research

The University makes sincere efforts to focus on the aspects of employability, innovation and research of each and every course programme. The students approaching from all areas are empowered with the perfect blend of the human resources and academic skills. The courses are designed, developed and offered to students in such a way as to fit in as a perfect player of the emerging knowledge based society.

Employability is ensured through following mechanism:

- The curriculum in created in due discussion with the potential recruiters, alumni and external experts focusing on the employability of the course, trend analysis of the possible projections in the job sector. Curriculum is based on the demands of industry.
- The laboratories are also equipped with the latest equipments to provide adequate exposure to the students in an order to enhance their skill sets.

- The curriculum development committee works in close liaison with the identified placement coordinators, who work as an interface to enrich curricula as per the requirements of the potential recruiters. The coordinators work in close connection with the **Training and Placement Cell** of the University, which functions to identify the potential of the students and help them develop necessary competencies for their personal and professional growth. The cell also provides training in the development of core competencies; facilitates campus/ off campus interviews and arranges capacity enhancement talks on regular intervals to increase the employability of the students.
- Specially designed professional internship, mandatory for all the students, allows students to learn necessary professional skills.
- Additionally, University organizes variety of academic events such as workshops, symposiums, seminars, and conferences etc. that allow students to interact and learn from leaders of the discipline and increase their employability.

Innovation is encouraged through following mechanism:

- Value added courses / training to the students and staff are routinely provided. There are innovation workshops arranged for the faculty members through the **Training and Placement Cell** of the University that encourages innovations within the University to be discussed at a common platform.
- Specially designed compulsory program of the Life Management for all the students, which entails modules on creativity, innovation and leadership.
- Scholarships are available for the undergraduate and postgraduate students to work on innovative projects. Faculty members are also encouraged to do innovative work and receive **Excellence Awards in Innovation** on the Teachers' Day.
- Giving exposure to the students to participate in various national level competitions and in academic events.
- Special classes by Honorable Chancellor on meditation and Bhagwad Gita allow traditional knowledge to be learned and implemented to encourage innovation in the faculty and students.

The research ability of the students is ensured through the following mechanism

- Providing access to the entire research infrastructure for students to carry out project works. Students are also encouraged to learn at the Research and Publication Cell of the University.
- Almost all academic curriculum have research component, either in the form of a dissertation or project work. Almost all Master's course programmes have a paper on research methodology and statistics.
- Good academic reward for the research publications is ensured through financial provisions. The University also provides adequate funding to selected innovative research projects for the students and faculty. The departments are encouraged to enrich their thrust areas of research.

- Financial support is provided to present the research work in in-campus and offcampus academic events such as Seminars, Conferences, and Workshops.
- UGC 2009 guidelines for the Ph.D. students are followed. As part of the research, course work has been made as a compulsory component covering both research methodology and statistics.

1.1.4 To what extent does the University use the guidelines of the regulatory bodies for developing and/or restructuring the curricula? Has the University been instrumental in leading any curricular reform which has created a national impact?

The University adheres to the policies and guidelines provided by the various regulatory bodies such as the UGC, NCTE and other similar bodies while developing and restructuring the course curricula. Such policies are thoroughly discussed by the curriculum development committee while developing the curricula and the Board of Studies pays major attention to them while finalizing the syllabus. Apart from following the guidelines from the regulatory bodies, the University also considers the NET syllabus and syllabi of various competitive examinations such as the M.Phil., civil services examinations etc., while designing and restructuring the syllabus.

The University has been instrumental in designing unique syllabus of the Life Management course, which serves as a module of personality refinement of the students. Various educational institutions in consultation with the University have adopted this unique course curriculum. A shorter module of this course has been widely implicated in the course training programmes of police personnel, armed forces, ITBP, CRPF, IPS, PSUs and Corporate houses, etc. The University has also started an undergraduate course programme in the field of Scientific Spirituality, which still stands as an exclusive course programme anywhere in the country. The University has also designed various non-conventional course programmes in the Theology, Holistic Health Management and Entrepreneurship programme in Handloom Technology, Water Management and Village Management.

The unique syllabus of the M.Sc. Yogic Science and Holistic Health ensures comprehensive development of the students in the discipline of conventional yogic treatises but also in the fields of anatomy, physiology, pathology and clinical diagnosis. A similar enterprise in the M.A. Applied Yoga and Human Excellence ensures that students also learn human resources management, leadership and team building while learning the ancient wisdom of Yoga. This unique initiative has revolutionized the concept of teaching Yogic Science in various educational institutions and has created a national impact. The UGC inspection committee highly appreciated this inventiveness and suggested to translate the current concept into making a **Centre of Excellence in Yogic Science and Human Consciousness.** (Ref: *Letter No. 3768/UGC/Ins/01/2010) dated 22/Dec/2010*).

1.1.5 Does the University interact with industry, research bodies and the civil society in the curriculum revision process? If so, how has the University benefitted through interactions with the stakeholders?

Yes, the University routinely interacts with the industry, research bodies and the civil society while revising and designing the curriculum. All the departments of the University have representations from the industry and research bodies in the curriculum development committee. In addition, the departments on their level; as well as through the placement cell of the University, regularly organize their lectures and talks to allow students to interact with them, which have proven to be immensely useful to make them acquainted with the requirements of the potential recruiters.

The University also collects indirect feedback from the employers during their visit to the University for campus interviews as well as while liaising with them to arrange placement activities. The University also invites many celebrated personalities from the civil society as part of the new initiative of the University called *'Learn from Leaders'* that has proven to very useful in the personal and professional development of the students.

1.2.2 Give details on the following provisions with reference to academic flexibility

a. Core / Elective options

The University remains committed to provide full flexibility to the students during their academic development.

In the undergraduate programmes, there are three subjects that are mandatory for all the students; namely Life Management, Scientific Spirituality and Communication skills. The remaining subjects are available as optional subject groups depending upon the stream of the study that they have chosen; i.e. B.A. or B.Sc. course programme. The students are required to select three of these optional subjects and in the final year of the undergraduate programme, students are expected to leave one of these subjects to receive degree in the remaining two subjects. The BCA course programme also offers similar flexibility in electing their subject papers.

In the postgraduate programmes, the students do have elective options available to them in the final year of the study depending upon their preferred specialization.

b. Enrichment Courses

The Training Cell of the University offers range of skill development and enrichment courses that are available to the students to enrich their academic skills and attributes. In addition, each department of the University constantly organizes to advance the study of the students.

c. Courses offered in modular form

Industry offered courses are provided in the modular form and are available to all the students of the University. They are periodically arranged and are created in due discussion with the departmental heads and faculty members.

d. Credit accumulation and transfer facility

Not Applicable. The University does not currently follow a credit-based system.

e. Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes, courses and disciplines

After completion of a course programme in one discipline, a student is free to take admission in any other discipline as a new candidate subject to the eligibility criteria of the applied course programme. The University offers lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes, courses and disciplines as per the University norms.

1.2.3 Does the University have an explicit policy and strategy for attracting international students?

The University follows an explicit policy to attract the international students and its success has clearly been reflected in the increasing numbers of the international students in the University. The University has a dedicated **International Relations Department**, which is established to advise students, scholars and faculty members, who are either studying, teaching or doing research at the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya or are willing to be part of the Vishwavidyalaya in any such capacity.

The department also provides guidance and support to the local students and scholars, who have a desire to study, teach, and to do research at a foreign University. The department functions as University's primary point of contact for International affairs as well as being responsible for maintaining the University's international relations and collaborations. Currently University has **20 International Collaborations** to allow joint academic programmes to run between partner institutions and attract international students.

1.2.4 Have any courses been developed targeting international students? If so, how successful have they been? If 'no', explain the impediments.

All the curricula of the University have potential to be taught to the International students; however, courses in the yogic science and human consciousness tend to attract maximum number of international students. The demand for admission to the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is increasing every year and so far students of more than 14 nationalities have pursued education in the courses offered by the Department of Yoga and Health alone.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 How often is the curriculum of the University reviewed and upgraded for making it socially relevant and/or job oriented / knowledge intensive and meeting the emerging needs of students and other stakeholders?

The goal of the University is to impart knowledge reinforced with sound scientific principles and ethical values to the students so as to enable the development of knowledge based society. The University makes continuous efforts to enrich the curriculum. A systematic process is followed for designing and development of curriculum.

The University aims to review, revise and upgrade the course curricula at regular intervals with an aim to make them value based, socially relevant and employable. The curriculum design is based on inter-disciplinary approach and they are revised and enriched once in three years in the undergraduate programmes and in every two years in the postgraduate programmes. However, review of the syllabus by the Board of Studies is done every year in all the subjects.

The inclusion of emerging trends in the relevant subject's syllabus like in the computer science, tourism, journalism, animation, psychology etc. shows that the rapid changes in technology is always in sight while working with the syllabus review / up-gradation is concerned.

1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for the revision of the existing programmes?

Creativity, innovation, self-dependency and employment are the focus areas for revamping existing programs. The University revises the regulations, scheme of examinations, curricula and syllabi based on the following:

- Vision and Mission of the University
- Guidelines from the regulatory bodies
- Feedback from the students, alumni, current students, employers, faculty and external experts
- Regional needs, societal expectations and industrial projections
- Logistical issues such as the availability of faculty, expertise, training, feasibility, accessibility and affordability etc.

1.3.4 What are the value-added courses offered by the University and how does the University ensure that all students have access to them?

The vision, mission and objectives of the University focus around the value based education. Value added subjects like life management equally support the various courses, which are offered in the University. Life management is a compulsory subject for all the students of the University and it aims to furnish comprehensibility into their lives by teaching them life style management, study management, time management, stress management, spirituality, leadership, communication skills, creative excellence etc.

All the faculty members, students and supporting staff attend the weekly lectures on the Shrimad Bhagwad Gita and Meditation by the Honorable Chancellor to effectively shape their personal and professional life, also. Additionally, University has also introduced a unique discipline of Scientific Spirituality as part of the study curriculum to look into the insightful approaches into the spiritual studies from a scientific perspective. Periodically the University invites scholars, seers, saints of international repute for moral and cultural nourishment of the students.

Jnana Diksha-Invocation ceremony in the beginning of the every academic session is also a unique tradition set by the University. Through this ceremony of *Jnana Diksha*, the mind of the student is prepared for receiving value-based knowledge and in return devoting their time for the country and society. Until now, 25 *Jnana Diksha* ceremonies have taken place and were presided by eminent personalities.

Additionally, all the departments offer the courses that are aimed at developing personal and professional skills; career training and promote social responsibility. These courses are offered after the study hours in weekdays and during the weekends to provide equal opportunity to all the interested students to attend them. Following the guidelines of the UGC, following courses have been developed:

- a. Professional communication skill development courses for all the students.
- b. Subject-wise technical skill- enhancing courses with experts in the fields both from academia and industry under the training cell as well as in the subjective departments. The Training and Placement Cell also organizes courses in the case discussions, experiential learning, simulation exercises, seminars, and group discussions to develop core competencies.
- c. The native experts like Russian, Chinese, and Spanish, for the benefit of those students looking for an international career, teach foreign language courses. The University also arranges courses in the regional languages and these value-added courses help develop skills of reading, writing, expression and critical appreciation in the students.
- d. Disaster Management training, fire-fighting training and training in the Basic Life Support (BLS) is provided to all the students so as to combat the emergency situation.
- e. Training in color management, graphic designing and advances in printing and publishing in digital age is given to the students of the animation.
- f. Cloud computing and services, Green computing, E-learning techniques, Information retrieval and management training is provided to the students of the computer science and application. It is also available to all other students who have a technical background.
- g. Training programmes in sustainable rural tourism, cultural heritage, adventure programs are offered to all the University students.
- h. Workshops on positive psychology, right mental attitude, spiritual professionalism are conducted for the benefit of the students.
- i. Training programmes in Pranic Healing, Rekki, Acupressure, Marm Chikitsa, Nadi Vigyan and Panchkarma are available for the students of the Department of Yoga and Health.

1.3.5 Has the University introduced any higher order skill development programmes in consonance with the national requirements as outlined by the National Skills Development Corporation and other agencies?

The regular courses offered by the Department of Rural Management of the University aim to provide skill development and they all have been designed with this sole focus. They are in consonance with the national requirements. The Department of Rural Management offers following courses to regular students:

- 1. Diploma in Self Entrepreneurship and Rural Development
- 2. Certificate Course in Water Resources Conservation and Management
- 3. Certificate Course in Handloom Technology

Besides this, the department also offers free of charge, 45 days skill based training to unemployed individuals in 23 areas such as Paper making, Handloom, Khadi, Bakery, Incense stick making, Cow products making etc.

The University also has a dedicated Training and Placement Cell, which assists in providing skill based training in following areas:

- Acupressure
- Naturopathy
- Physiotherapy
- Panchakarma
- Pranic Healing
- Yajnopathy
- Horticulture and Gardening
- Handmade Paper and Uses
- Handmade Dari and Aasan
- Yoga
- Music

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 Does the University have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of?

Yes. The University has a formal mechanism in place to obtain feedback from the students. At the end of semester, the students are asked to complete an optional, anonymous feedback form, which is used by almost all departments with little modifications. It includes various aspects of teaching – learning evaluation such as duration taken to complete the course, comprehensibility and teaching methodology of the teachers as well as their accessibility and approachability.

All the departments duly follow the informal mechanism of collecting the feedback in the meetings with course-coordinators and departmental heads. There is also a grievance process, which is employed if such cases are brought to the attention. Concerns raised and recommendations offered by the students are duly incorporated into the development of the curriculum and improving the teaching – learning process, if deemed appropriate.

The recently established **Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)** of the University is working on a unified proforma to collect feedback on the curriculum and teaching-learning-aspects from the students.

1.4.2 Does the University elicit feedback on the curriculum from national and international faculty? If yes, specify a few methods such as conducting webinars, workshops, online discussions, etc. and its impact.

Yes, the University elicits feedback on the curriculum not only from the national and international faculty but also from the peers, civil society, alumni, parents and employers. The University arranges regular guest lectures, workshops and discussions with the faculty members of national eminence such as from the IIT, BITS, IARI etc. to receive feedback on the curriculum and accordingly makes necessary amendments into the curriculum. The feedback collected is on variety of issues, such as on the curriculum design, employability, trend analysis, value-addition etc.

The University has also entered into formal collaborations with 20 International educational institutions with a view for constant development, improvement and upgradation of the course syllabi, pedagogy, exchange of the views and opinions and sharing of the knowledge between faculty and the research scholars for the collaborative educational development and research.

The faculty members visiting from other Universities (including leading universities professors from USA, Australia, UK, Germany etc.) give valuable feedback on the curricula and syllabi. Online discussions through Skype and Viber are also held by the faculty members to upgrade the curricula to meet the global challenges. During the last four years, more than 50 Professors / Academicians from various countries had visited and delivered the talks in the University along with holding formal discussions on various aspects with Head of Institutions, Head of Departments. Similarly, the faculty of the University that have visited other institutions in India and abroad have routinely discussed the course curriculum with their academic peers.

The University is highly engaged in conducting National and International conferences on modern trends in various disciplines. In the last four years, the University has organized more than 38 National and International academic events, which have proven to be immensely useful in exchanging ideas on the curriculum development.

1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which affiliated institutions give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a unitary, non-affiliatory University and hence, we do not have affiliated institutions to receive feedback from. However, we routinely interact with different educational institutions of the state and other parts of the country as detailed before.

1.4.4. What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the University in ensuring the effective development of the curricula?

The University has taken significant quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures to ensure the effective development of the curricula, such as:

- 1. Collecting feedback from academic peers, students, alumni, external experts, faculty and employers. Course curricula is regularly assessed, reviewed, revised and upgraded based on such feedbacks.
- 2. Regular review of the syllabus is done in the meetings of the Board of Studies. The University aims to revise the whole syllabus at least once in three years in most of the programmes.
- 3. Curriculum designing and development workshops and paper-setting workshops have been arranged to ensure that the policies and guidelines of all related bodies are duly considered while developing the curriculum. Particular emphasis is given to ensure that the Vision and Mission of the University to provide value based education remains intact while making all necessary amendments and modifications in the syllabus and curricula.
- 4. The University aims to ensure full flexibility to the students to provide increasing opportunities to them in terms of their academic and professional development. Add-on courses, value–added courses, enrichment courses, and skill based courses are being provided on regular basis to ensure quality enhancement of the curricula.
- 5. The University also provides customized subjects training program to enhance the knowledge of Ph.D. Research scholars in their respective subjects like SPSS, MATLAB etc.
- 6. The University uniformly follows the semester based examination system and was one of the first universities in the state of Uttarakhand to adopt this method. The University also follows a well-tested internal and external examination process for effective implementation and assessment of the study programme.
- 7. The University has done remarkable work in establishing linkages with international universities to ensure that sharing knowledge at all levels allow us to implement the curricula in an efficient manner.
- 8. The University has been keen to improve the research aspects of the University.
- 9. The University has also recently established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell to monitor, supervise and review the quality of the development of curricula.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the University ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The University advertises the admission process in several newspapers as well as in the electronic media. The information is promptly displayed on the University **Website (www.dsvv.ac.in)** as well as on the University Help Desk (manual, telephone and internet), which is located at the University reception as well as in the Shantikunj campus (Headquarter of the All World Gayatri Pariwar/ Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, the sponsoring body of the University).

The admission process is publicized by distributing brochures and pamphlets, and displaying posters, banners and hoardings. The **print and electronic media advertisement** process is also utilized. The admission notice is also publicized in the **Pragya Abhiyan newsletter**, which is a fortnightly newsletter of the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, with a circulation of 50,000 in the print medium and more than 200,000 of online edition. **Akhand Jyoti,** the monthly magazine of the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, with a circulation in excess of 800,000, **Sanskriti Sanchar**, the newsletter of the University and other magazines of the All World Gayatri Pariwar (AWGP), Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, (www.awgp.org) also provide a sustainable platform to circulate the admission information.

AWGP, the sponsoring body of the University, is a socio-spiritual organization with approximately 100 million members and 4000 centers spread across the globe, which in turn spread awareness among their acquaintances and in their neighborhood. The University also exploits all available modes of social networking such as facebook, twitter, instagram, whatsapp etc. to reach out to wider audience. In addition, AWGP also has a Youtube channel which functions as a powerful medium to publicize the admission process.

Another mode of publicizing the admission process is through the University **Outreach Programmes.** Various modes of the outreach programme include:

- 1. **Social Internship Programme**, wherein, as an integral part of their academic programme, students visit different parts of the country for two months. As part of the internship, students create awareness about the University, its courses and its admission process.
- 2. **Training programmes:** Specialized trainers are sent by the University in small teams to different parts of the country from time to time to conduct Life Management, Stress Management, Yoga, Personality Refinement workshops. They also publicize the University programmes as part of these training sessions.
- 3. Shantikunj, Haridwar (Headquarter of All World Gayatri Pariwar) continuously sends teams for conducting programmes in various parts of the country and abroad. These teams also publicize the University and its admission process.

The admission process is managed by the **Admission Cell** of the University. Complete transparency is maintained in the admission process. The forms and the required documents are scrutinized scrupulously. It is made sure that no malpractices take place in the written test for admissions. The guidelines for short-listing the candidates from the written test are clearly informed to the applicants through prospectus, notices and via website. The written test is followed by an interview for the shortlisted candidates, wherein each and every candidate is interviewed based on equitable norms. The results for the admissions are publicized on the website, University notice board as well as notice boards of the all examination centers.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place by the University. List the criteria for admission:(*e.g.*:(i)merit, (ii)merit with entrance test, (iii)merit, entrance test and interview,(iv)common entrance test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) other criteria followed by the University (please specify).

The detailed admission procedure is mentioned in the prospectus and on the University website. There are specific qualifications and merit requirements for each course programme that are detailed as the eligibility criteria of that particular course. The forms submitted by the applicants and the required documents are carefully scrutinized to ascertain that the qualification and merit requirements are met properly. Subsequently the applicants are called for the entrance examination, the details of which are as follows:

(i) For Undergraduate (UG) and Postgraduate Courses (PG) for Indian Students

Student is admitted to the University on the basis of an entrance test, which is conducted in two stages, i.e. written test and interview. For the 6 month Certificate courses, only interview is conducted.

(a) For PG Course Programmes (including PG Diploma Courses)

Stage - I is the written test that has 5 sections consisting of objective type questions. The time duration is 1.5 Hours. The 5 sections of the written test are:

(ii) For Undergraduate and Postgraduate Courses for International Students

The candidates applying for the desired course can download the Application Form from the University website or purchase it directly from the University counter.

The candidates are required to email the scanned copies of the following documents to admissions@dsvv.ac.in: Completed Application Form, Passport, and Educational Certificates of the school/University last attended. The candidates are also required to submit a statement of purpose in which they have to write about their academic background, reasons for applying for the desired course etc. The candidates shall obtain a Student Visa for desired period in the name of Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, Haridwar from the Indian Embassy of their country (a letter of provisional admission, if required, is given after suitably examining their documents of qualifying examinations). The international students are required to

exhibit their level of proficiency in English through the interview process (written entrance examination is exempted) and get the medical clearance before finally receiving the offer of admission to the University.

(iii) For Ph.D. Course Programme

The Ph.D. Entrance Notification is issued by the Ph.D.Cell, Registrar Office of the University. Selection to the Ph.D. programme is on the basis of an entrance test, which is conducted in two stages, i.e. written test and interview.

Stage I is the written test that has 2 papers.

Paper I	Research Methodology and Statistics
Paper II	Subject Knowledge

Stage II consists of the interview of the candidates selected from the Stage-I.

The final result is posted on the University website and on the notice board. As described above, the criteria for admission are merit, entrance test, interview and medical test.

(iv) For D.Litt./D.Sc. Programme

A candidate seeking admission to the D.Sc./ D.Litt. degree, shall apply to the Registrar, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya by submitting the following:

- (i) His/her complete bio-data providing details of obtained educational qualifications, area of specialization, research experience, published research work, work experience, academic distinctions, awards and prizes etc. The candidate shall also provide 2 passport size photographs along with the biodata.
- (ii) The candidate shall also provide the details of the proposed research work including the title of the proposed thesis (4 copies).
- (iii)The candidate shall also provide the list of publications in the refereed journals and if required, copies of such publications should also be attached. The candidate, who has conducted a previous work on the work, vision, literature and philosophy of Pt Shriram Sharma Acharya Ji should submit copies of such publications.
- (iv)The candidate shall also provide a brief account of his/ her most recent research work, in about 500 words on the subject relevant to the applied discipline, showing that how his/her work is original and how this makes a distinct contribution to the field of knowledge.

After receiving the applications for the D.Litt./D.Sc. course Programmes, the University schedules the applicants to present their synopsis and research proposal in front of the RDC of the University. Once it is approved by the RDC, the applicant can continue his/her work in the mentioned course programme as per the University norms. The University guidelines can be downloaded from the website of the University.

2.1.3 Provide details of admission process in the affiliated colleges and the University's role in monitoring the same.

Not Applicable. Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a unitary University.

2.1.4 Does the University have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profile annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The admission process of the University is reviewed annually by the University administration and the results of this analysis are used to improve the process. For example, the written entrance test, that was earlier subjective in nature, was recently made objective and OMR sheets were introduced. This improvement helped in properly scrutinizing the increasing number of applicants, as well as further enhanced the transparency of the process.

The student profile is also monitored annually by the University administration. The analysis has shown that students from more than 20 states have so far studied in the University. Efforts are made to publicize and attract students from other states as well. Based on the feedback about the academic background of the students coming to the University, efforts are made during extension programmes of the University to spread awareness about the University among school and college students from different backgrounds.

The University has also recently established IQAC to ensure quality enhancement of the full admission process.

2.1.5 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for students belonging to the following categories:

SC/ST

Seats are reserved for the students belonging to the SC/ST category as per the Uttarakhand State Government rules. These students are also given a special consideration of 5% in the minimum cut-off marks needed in the qualifying examination/degree for appearing in the entrance test.

OBC

Seats are reserved for the students belonging to the OBC category as per the Uttarakhand State Government rules. These students are also given a special consideration of 5% in the minimum cut-off marks needed in the qualifying examination/degree for appearing in the entrance test.

Women

Seats are reserved for women as per the Uttarakhand State Government rules.

Persons with varied disabilities

Seats are reserved for persons with varied disabilities as per the Uttarakhand State Government rules.

Economically weaker sections

The students from economically weaker background are given full or partial fee waiver after proper scrutiny of their current economic situation. There is a committee comprised of Student Welfare Officer, a senior faculty member and a member of the Admission Cell, which duly assesses such applications and based on their recommendations, the students are either provided full or partial fee waiver.

During the extension programmes conducted by the University, special programmes are conducted among the weaker sections of the society to create awareness among them about the University, the various academic programmes offered that have ample opportunities for self-employment, as well as the grass-root level entrepreneurial programmes taught here like cow-shed management, handmade paper making and use, handmade cloth and carpet making, vermi-composting, bee-keeping, waste management etc.

Outstanding achievers in sports and other extracurricular activities

The students having a National Service Scheme (NSS) Certificate, or National Cadet Corps - B or C Certificate, or who have passed the Bharatiya Sanskriti Gyan Pariksha (BSGP- www.bsgp.org) - a holistic education programme conducted annually by All World Gayatri Pariwar (www.awgp.org) are given a special consideration of 5% in the minimum cut-off marks needed in the qualifying examination/degree for appearing in the entrance test.

Those who have served the country in armed forces and are past students of the University (either from regular or distance mode) are also provided a special consideration of 5% in the minimum cut-off marks needed in the eligibility criteria.

Apart from aforementioned strategies, the University has created a committee in the co-ordinatorship of student welfare officer to ensure that all the disadvantaged sections of the society are well represented in the University admissions and they continue to receive all the necessary support and assistance for their personal and professional growth.

It is clearly evident from the above tables that the demand ratio has been fairly consistent for most of the course programmes for the last four years, even when the number of students admitted has consistently increased; this is because of the continuous efforts of the University to publicize its programmes all over India and abroad (the demand ratio for PG Diploma is not consistent owing to the fact that the number of students admitted has been small and has varied a lot).

The slight drop in the demand ratio for the UG programme is somewhat attributed to the significant increase in the number of students admitted, while the number of applications did not increase proportionately.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 Does the University organize orientation / induction Programmes for freshers? If yes, give details such as the duration, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

Yes, the University organizes orientation / induction programme for new students. The details of the orientation programme are as follows:

One of the unique features of the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is the organization of **Gyan Deeksha - Invocation ceremony** before the commencement of each academic session. All the new students, as well as teachers and senior students attend this ceremony, wherein they are told about the importance of righteous education, and ways and means of adopting it in their day-to-day lives in order to attain holistic personality development.

Gyan Deeksha is followed by a 3 days **Orientation Programme**. During these 3 days, the new students receive sessions on the vision and mission of the University, academic schedule, and interpersonal skills and interact with their faculty members. They also take part in the quizzes, group discussions, and youth workshops as part of the ice-breaking sessions. During orientation, the students are divided into small batches and senior students are made coordinators and mentors for each group. This allows identifying specific requirements of the new students as well as providing right solutions for such challenges.

During the orientation, the students are informed about the extra learning opportunities available to them, possibilities of taking part in the skill enhancement courses available through Training and Placement Cell; Student Welfare Cell, etc. Additionally practical information about the facilities available within the University premises and those available in the local vicinity; like Bank, ATM, Post Office, Launderette, as well as about their syllabi and time table by the respective departments, is provided to them.

Both oral and written feedback is routinely collected from the students after the Orientation Programme, submitted to the administration, and accordingly the structure of the programme has been modified. The feedback received from the coordinators of various groups assists in developing focused strategies for students. Besides the Orientation Programme, the senior students at the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya welcome the new students through 'Unnayan', which is a cultural programme presented by the senior students for the new students.

2.2.2 Does the University have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of the student population" are analysed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

The orientation programme is aimed to cater the differential requirements of the student population. During orientation, the particular challenges to be faced by a student are identified and solutions are sought for recognized challenges.

The freshers of each department are assigned course coordinators who supervise their academic as well as general queries. The freshers are supposed to visit the Student Welfare Cell, meet its coordinator and fill a form that judges their basic skills and needs. The Student Welfare Cell analyzes these forms and chalks out plans for providing support to the students accordingly.

At the end of the Orientation programme, both written and oral feedback is collected from the students. This feedback is analyzed and shared with the administrative authorities as well in order to understand the needs of the students and make arrangements accordingly.

2.2.3 Does the University offer bridge / remedial / add-on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

The University offers several bridge / remedial / add-on courses, both through its academic departments and other centers like the Internship Cell, Training and Placement Cell, etc. These courses are offered in the early morning, afternoon and evening, during off-class hours. The details of these courses are as follows:

Besides these courses, the Training and Placement Cell offers several remedial / addon courses in collaboration with other departments. These courses include performing Yajna and Sacramental Rites, vocal and instrumental music, gaushala prabandhan (cowshed management),gauutpad (cow based products) making and vermi-composting, handloom, handmade carpet and mat making; food processing, waste management, English communication, basic computer skills, research Methodology and statistics, dance training – Kathak, Nukkad Natak, anchoring, conference management, softwares - corel draw, panchakarma, naturopathy, acupressure, Interview / group discussion preparation, Physiotherapy, self defense, Urdu, logical reasoning practice for competitive examinations.

2.2.4 Has the University conducted any study on the academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped, slow learners, etc.? If yes, what are the main findings?

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is committed to uplift the quality of each and every student. There are numerous cases wherein the faculty and senior students have diligently, and with perseverance helped the academically weak students in their studies and have brought them at par with normal students.

Majority of the students at the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya come from disadvantaged sections of the society; a major boost-up has been observed in their confidence and academic acumen by the time they graduate from the University; many such students are well placed in jobs and are successful entrepreneurs as well.

The University recently commenced a unique programme of personality refinement that included bright students to mentor academically weaker students, which demonstrated a positive outcome in terms of improved academic performance and a healthier hostel environment. Informal observations have revealed that after attending the help sessions through Training and Placement Cell on Mathematics, English and Computers, the performance of students from disadvantaged sections of society as well as that of slow learners markedly improved.

2.2.5 How does the University identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

The academically advanced learners are identified through their performance in the internal and external assessment examinations as well as during routine interactions between faculty and the students. The advanced learners and performers in other disciplines like sports, music and cultural activities are identified during their performance in the large number of such activities organized on-campus as well as in the competitions organized in other institutions.

The advanced learners are given special trainings; opportunities for attending conferences and competitions in other institutions; opportunities for delivering training and lectures in schools, colleges, youth programmes and corporate entities. They are also given special counseling for their career path and goal setting. During the organization of on-campus conferences/seminars/workshops, these students are given an opportunity to be a part of the management committees and thus enhance their leadership skills.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the University plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)?

The University's teaching, learning and evaluation schedules are planned well before the commencement of the semester. The semester-wise course list is provided in the prospectus itself. The detailed syllabus and reference books for each course is available in the Central Library; the students can readily refer to this syllabus and can get a photocopy if needed. The academic calendar is currently being devised by the Office of the Vice Chancellor, which shall now be looked after by the IQAC.

Based on the syllabus, the teacher for each paper prepares his/her teaching plan and submits it to the Head of the Department (HoD). The HoD monitors the progress of the teaching plan. The course-coordinators assigned for each course programme also assist the HoD in supervising and monitoring the progress of the students.

The evaluation schedule consists of both internal and external evaluations. The internal evaluation usually consists of 4 tests, which are conducted on dates predecided by the Controller of Examinations. These dates are declared well in advance. In case a student misses one of these tests, then there is a provision for taking one special test, which is also conducted on a pre-decided date. The external evaluation consists of the semester-end examination.

2.3.2 Does the University provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

The syllabi of all the courses are placed in the library. The students can access these, and if needed, they can get copies. The course outlines and schedules are prepared by respective faculty members and submitted to the Head of the Departments (HODs). The HODs do a mid-term evaluation of the course schedules in order to find out how much the faculty members have complied with the schedule submitted at the beginning of the semester.

2.3.3 Does the University face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional measures to overcome these.

No, the University does not face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and calendar. Under exceptional circumstances, extra classes are conducted during weekends and off-class hours in order to complete the syllabus on time.

2.3.4 How is learning made student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contributes to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

In order to make learning student-centric, participative learning and interactive mode teaching is introduced. In this, teaching is done via an interactive mode, wherein students discuss various topics in the class with the teacher. Students are encouraged to ask questions and critically analyze what is taught to them. The students have to prepare and present monographs, which increase their basic understanding about the subject.

Departmental seminars are also organized in various courses, wherein each student has to deliver a presentation on any topic related to the course. Besides clarifying the basic concepts, this process also enhances the confidence and presentation skills of the students. Students are frequently taken for educational tours, wherein they see upfront the practical on-field application of whatever is being taught to them inside the classroom.

Life Management classes are an integral part of all the programmes. Through these classes the students learn the basic techniques of holistic development, which are useful for their entire lifetime.

2.3.5 What is the University's policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to deliver lectures and/or organize seminars for students?

The University readily invites experts / people of eminence to deliver lectures for the students. There are various modes under which the experts are invited. Firstly, if some portion of the syllabus requires teachers with some specific skill-set, which is not available on-campus, then experts of the subject are invited to give guest lectures to the students. Secondly, national and international conferences are organized on a regular basis in which efforts are made to invite eminent speakers to come and give talks, as well as interact with the students and staff members. Thirdly, if some eminent personality is visiting the campus, they are requested to share their expertise with the students and guide them with respect to their career prospects. Fourthly, seminars on state-of-the-art topics are organized from time-to-time by inviting experts of those areas. The University also has a project called 'Learn from Leaders', through which, University invites eminent personalities from any discipline to talk to the students and thus allow the students to learn from their experience and expertise.

2.3.6 Does the University formally encourage blended learning by using e-learning resources?

Yes, e-learning resources are readily available as teaching tools. All auditoriums of the University are equipped with audio/video and computer/projector setup for conducting classes along with the use of e-learning resources. Department of Computer Science, Department of Communication, and Department of Indian Culture and Tourism Management have their own computer labs. Besides this, there is a Computer Lab Extension and Training and Placement Cell equipped with computers for providing blended learning opportunities.

Computer and internet access is available to all the faculty members so that they can incorporate e-learning resources in their lectures. The library is equipped with e-journals and e-databases for facilitating e-learning. The University has an intranet facility for sharing e-learning resources and databases. Both wi-fi and LAN facilities are available in most of the campus.

2.3.7 What are the technologies and facilities such as virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources and mobile education used by the faculty for effective teaching?

The technology and facilities used by the faculty include computer/projector setups, audio/video setups, computer labs, laptops, internet, intranet, e-journals, e-books, open seminars and symposiums, video conferencing, e-lectures, guest lectures and classes by experts in the respective fields, access to national and international conferences, educational tours, proprietary and open source software, educational CDs/DVDs and, library equipped with a large number of books on relevant subjects.

2.3.8 Is there any designated group among the faculty to monitor the trends and issues regarding developments in Open Source Community and integrate its benefits in the University's educational processes?

Yes, several faculty members associated with the Department of Computer Science, Training Cell, Admission Cell and Central Library continuously monitor the trends and issues regarding developments in Open Source Community, and strive to integrate its benefits in the University's educational processes.

Some such developments include access to Open Source journals and books; using Open Source computer operating system like Ubuntu and its associated software, and conducting training sessions on how to use these in educational processes; using Open Source typing tools in Indian languages like Hindi (unicode typing). The University has also installed open source softwares like moodle and dspace which provide significant advantage to the IT system of the University. The Central Library of the University has also subscribed an open source magazine "Linux For You" to be appraised with latest developments in this field.

2.3.9 What steps have the University taken to orient traditional classrooms into 24x7 learning places?

Several steps have been taken by the University to orient traditional classrooms into 24x7 learning places. Colorful banners and posters containing inspirational and motivational thoughts are displayed on the walls of the classrooms. Classrooms have provisions for displaying Wall Magazines, which contain a collection of inspirational books. Classrooms have notice boards where motivational articles as well as creative write-ups of students are posted regularly.

2.3.10 Is there a provision for the services of counselors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefited.

The University has a Student Welfare Cell, which provides regular guidance and counseling services to the students with regards to academic, personal, financial and psycho-social matters. At the time of admission, students are made to fill a personal profile form; this form is analyzed by the Student Welfare Cell and specific needs of the students are identified and addressed. The Department of Clinical Psychology also provides counseling services to the students through its psycho-counseling clinic. Additionally, there is a group of 28 faculty members, who work as advisors and mentors to the students in close liaison with Student Welfare Office.

For academic purposes, a faculty advisor is assigned to each incoming batch of students. The faculty advisor provides regular guidance to the students with regards to their academics matters such as course requirements, performance, attendance, etc.

The University also creates Spiritual Study Circles (SSC), which consists of small groups of like-minded students who want to take up specific projects for personal and societal development. The University provides proper environment, encouragement, support and guidance to these groups. All of the aforementioned strategies are aimed to benefit all the students of the University.

2.3.11 Were any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve learning? What were the methods used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

Several innovative teaching approaches / methods / practices have been adopted / put to use by the faculty members and these have definitely improved the learning of the students. Some of these techniques include:

- 1. The students are asked to write monographs in most of the courses. They are also told to present these monographs in front of the faculty and external examiners.
- 2. Weekly departmental seminars are conducted by the faculty members on topics related to the course syllabus. These seminars further enhance the learning and presentation abilities of the students.
- 3. Students are taken for educational tours in their area of study. This proves to be a practical learning experience for the students and they are able to see the on-field application of whatever they are learning in the classrooms.
- 4. All the students are supposed to do a mandatory internship of two months as an integral part of their curriculum. This includes one month of professional internship in which the students get on-field experience of their core area of study, and one month of social internship in which the students are sent in small group of 3 to 4, to different parts of the country for doing social service. The internship significantly boosts the confidence of the students and improves their communication and social skills; this fact is clearly evident from the internship reports submitted by the students after the completion of the internship.

- 5. The course on Life Management is compulsory for all the students. This includes weekly theory and practical classes, as well as lectures on Gita and Meditation by the Honorable Chancellor, Dr. Pranav Pandya. Students are benefited by this course in terms of learning and practicing the basic techniques for holistic personality development.
- 6. Incorporation of audio/visual aids and computers in conventional course programmes has significantly contributed to greater learning ability of the students. This has been reflected in both their internal and external evaluations, as well as in-class discussions.
- 7. Interactive and creative teaching is practiced by some faculty members in which lectures are not delivered, but instead lessons are developed through interactive participation of students and faculty. This method significantly improved the learning of the students.
- 8. Students are given opportunities to learn various extra-curricular skills such as vocational skills, ancient Indian therapies, handicraft, sketching, etc. during offclass hours. This has helped in giving a broader perspective to the students and in boosting their confidence.

Besides the aforementioned methods, interdisciplinary research projects are also conducted by various departments of the University in this regard. These projects include studying the impact of spiritual practices and environment on the physical, mental and emotional state of people.

In terms of giving due recognition to the faculty members who practice innovation in teaching, the University undertakes the following methodology. The faculty members, who have mastered a particular technique with complete blueprint of teaching technique and follow-up mechanism, are given opportunity to share their expertise with other faculty members through seminars or short term training programmes. They are also given opportunities to provide training to outsiders, as well as, visit different places as a part of University's extension activities. The University has also recently started an initiative of awarding the faculty members with "Excellence Awards" in different categories on the Teachers' day.

2.3.12 How does the University create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

There are various means by which the University creates a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners: These include:

- 1. The course on Life Management, which is compulsory for all the students, gives innumerable dimensions to the students to explore the various tenets of their personality and to adopt various methods for holistic personality development. The course practical brings the students closer to nature, and make them understand their dependence on the entire eco-system. This significantly broadens their approach towards life and nurtures their creativity.
- 2. The course on Scientific Spirituality, which is compulsory for all the undergraduate students, teaches the complementary nature of science and spirituality. The students learn to explore the scientific basis of various spiritual practices.

- 3. Depending on their academic programme, the students have access to well equipped laboratories including psychotherapy clinic, polyclinic (acupressure, pranic healing, pathology lab, yoga, yagyopathy, physiotherapy), naturopathy center, panchakarma center, computer labs, language lab, where they get hands-on experience in these scientific techniques.
- 4. Classes are conducted in an interactive manner in which the students are encouraged to question and verify each and every concept with the help of proper guidance from the faculty.
- 5. Vocational training opportunities available on campus (handmade paper, handmade cloth handloom, vermi-composting, cow urine and cow dung based products, cow shed management, handicraft, stitching, etc.) are effective means for nurturing the creativity of the students.
- 6. The internship programme, which is mandatory for all the students, and in which the students are sent to different part of the country for doing social and professional work, is another effective means of instilling and nurturing creativity in the students.
- 7. Independence Day, Republic Day and various national festivals are celebrated by the University on a grand scale. The University also organizes national and international conferences on a regular basis. The students actively participate in the organization of these events including decoration, rangoli making, stage arrangement, anchoring, cultural programmes, music, etc. The University has a Music and Culture Cell for providing guidance to the students in this regard. These activities significantly contribute to the enhancement of creativity of the students.
- 8. All the post-graduate programmes have a strong research component associated with them, which helps in nurturing the scientific temper of the students. Several students conduct significant portion of their research in collaboration with the Brahmavarchas Research Institute of All World Gayatri Pariwar, which is dedicated to the research on Scientific Spirituality.
- 9. The University publishes a research journal **Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal** and organizes various national and international conferences and seminars in order to create a scientifically rich environment in the University campus.
- 10. An extraordinary feature of the University with regards to nurturing creativity is its rich spiritual environment. The students are encouraged to participate in various spiritual practices like early morning mantra chanting, prayer, meditation, yagya, which are conducted daily on the University campus. Various interdisciplinary research projects in yoga and psychology have established, beyond any doubt, that these practices and environment are extremely effective in instilling and nurturing creativity among people.
- 11. Sports facilities, National Service Scheme (NSS) camps, Rovers and Rangers programme, adventure camps provide further avenues for nurturing the creativity of the students.

- 2.3.13 Does the University consider student projects mandatory in the learning Programmes? If yes, for how many programmes have they been (percentage of total) made mandatory?
 - Number of projects executed within the University
 - Names of external institutions associated with the University for student project work
 - Role of faculty in facilitating such projects

Yes, the University considers student projects/monographs mandatory in the learning programme, and hence these are made mandatory for most of the students.

Several projects are run by the University in association with external institutions. Some of these projects include Handloom unit in collaboration with the Khadi and Village Industries Commission, project on cleaning Ganga river by faculty of Environmental Science Department, nationwide river and water bodies cleaning movement, and, nationwide programmes on health, education, self-reliance, women empowerment, environment protection, reforestation, de-addiction, and, eradication of unjust customs.

The faculty provides the necessary guidance to the students for all these projects including literature survey, methodology, and analysis and feedback collection.

2.3.14 Does the University have a well-qualified pool of human resource to meet the requirements of the curriculum? If there is a shortfall, how is it supplemented?

Yes, the University has a well-qualified pool of human resource to meet the requirements of the curriculum. Almost all the faculty members either hold a Ph.D. degree in their respective discipline or they are pursuing it. The faculty members also have reasonable teaching experience.

In case there is some specialized topic that needs to be taught, then the University invites the expert of that topic as guest faculty.

2.3.15 How are the faculty enabled to prepare computer-aided teaching/ learning materials? What are the facilities available in the University for such efforts?

The Department of Computer Science and the Training and Placement Cell offer regular training sessions to the faculty members regarding the basics of computer hardware and software, and preparation of computer-aided teaching / learning materials. The faculty can learn basics like computer architecture, internet, document preparation, presentation making, image processing, audio/video handling and recording, basic softwares, web conferencing, etc. Training and Placement Cell also prepares sample computer-aided teaching / learning materials for various courses, and demonstrates these in front of the faculty of these courses; this gives them an idea as to how they can themselves include computer-aided learning in their courses.

The University encourages the faculty members to include more and more computeraided teaching in their courses. Faculty is also encouraged to participate in Orientation and Refresher courses offered by the UGC, in which computer-aided teaching / learning material preparation is an integral part. In terms of facilities available for this purpose, the University has several computer laboratories including two in the Department of Computer Science, one in Department of Communication, one in Department of Indian Culture and Tourism Management, and one in Training and Placement Cell. There is Extension Computer Lab, all auditoriums are equipped with modern ICT facilities, 4 halls equipped with audio/video setup and computer/projector, and several projectors available for regular issuing by the faculty members. Besides this, every department has some computers, with all the necessary softwares available for faculty members.

2.3.16 Does the University have a mechanism for the evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation feedback used to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, the University has several means for the evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni. Some of these include:

- 1. Some of the departments take feedback from students at the end of their coursework. This feedback includes questions regarding teaching quality, teacher's personality, preparation for the class, delivery/presentation of lectures, interactive content, depth and breadth of content, quality of internal-evaluation, practical examples, real-life examples, on-field examples, etc.
- 2. A suggestion box is put outside Hon. Chancellor's office in which any student can submit feedback about the faculty members. During the semester, Hon. Chancellor, Dr. Pranav Pandya teaches weekly Gita and Meditation classes, in which he conducts an open question session in the beginning; students are free to provide their feedback about faculty in the form of questions during this session, and Hon. Chancellor addresses them immediately. Students are also free to provide feedback to the Hon. Chancellor during his office hours in the University, as well as during his morning meeting hours in Shantikunj, Haridwar.
- 3. The students can provide feedback to the Head of the Departments, the Registrar and the Pro-Vice Chancellor.
- 4. The Student Welfare Department and Alumni Cell are two other avenues for the students to provide feedback about the faculty.

The feedback is communicated to the respective Head of the Departments, who in turn communicate it to the respective faculty members. If the feedback is positive, it is shared with other faculty members as well in order to motivate them to adopt the good teaching practice; if the feedback has sought some corrective measure, then the faculty member is advised to incorporate necessary improvements in teaching.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 How does the University plan and manage its human resources to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum?

The University plans and manages its human resources on a regular basis to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum. Department-wise Board of Studies meeting is conducted once in a year, in which the human resource requirements are analyzed and course allocations/recruitments are done accordingly. Subject-matter experts are invited to deliver guest lectures for specialized topics. Advertisements are floated for vacant positions and rolling recruitments are done regularly.

2.4.4 How does the University ensure that qualified faculty is appointed for new programmes / emerging areas of study (Bio-technology, Bio-informatics, Material Science, Nanotechnology, Comparative Media Studies, Diaspora Studies, Forensic Computing, Educational Leadership, etc.)? How many faculty members were appointed to teach new programmes during the last four years?

The University regularly commences new programmes / emerging areas of study. The University has recently started the PG programmes in Environmental Science, Hindi, Rural Management and Sanskrit. Qualified faculties were appointed after floating advertisements and conducting recruitment interviews. The competent faculties from the existing pool are also assigned courses in these new programmes.

Scientific Spirituality, which is an emerging area of study, is a compulsory course for all the undergraduate students. The University has Centre for Scientific Spirituality under the Department of Oriental Studies, which has well qualified faculty for teaching and doing research in this area.

Another emerging area of study, Life Management, is a compulsory course for all the students of the University. The University has Centre for Life Management under the Department of Oriental Studies, which has well qualified faculty for teaching in this area. 44 faculty members have been appointed in the last four years to teach new programs.

2.4.6 What policies/systems are in place to academically recharge and rejuvenate teachers (*e.g.* providing research grants, study leave, nomination to national/international conferences/seminars, in-service training, organizing national/international conferences etc.)?

Several systems are in place to academically recharge and rejuvenate the teachers. These include:

- 1. The University organizes faculty development workshops, in which the faculty are informed about the state-of-the-art teaching and research methodologies. They are also given hands-on experience in these. The resource persons for conducting these workshops include both external experts and University faculty members.
- 2. Experts are invited to the University from time to time to deliver lectures on recent advancements in various fields.
- 3. The faculty members are encouraged to attend various national and international conferences, seminars and workshops in relevant disciplines.
- 4. The University organizes national and international conferences, seminars and symposia, in various relevant disciplines, on a regular basis, and encourages the faculty members to both organize and participate in these. This gives a chance to the faculty to interact with the experts in their fields, and have discussions with them on current trends of teaching and research.
- 5. The faculty is encouraged by the Research and Publication Cell to write research papers, articles, books, etc.. The University publishes a research journal Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal, which publishes research in various interdisciplinary fields. The faculty is encouraged to contribute articles for this Journal and manage it as well.
- 6. The University supports the research work (both financial and logistic support) undertaken by the faculty members in their respective fields, either themselves or with their postgraduate and doctoral students.
- 7. The faculty members are also sent to various parts of the country and abroad for University Extension and publicity programmes. This gives a chance to faculty members to interact with various companies and institutions, and helps them in exploring various new dimensions related to professional development and life management.

- 8. The Department of Computer Science and the Training and Placement Cell offer regular training sessions to the faculty members regarding the basics of computer hardware and software, and preparation of computer-aided teaching / learning materials. The faculty can learn basics like computer architecture, internet, document preparation, presentation making, image processing, audio/video handling and recording, basic software, web conferencing, etc. Training and Placement Cell also prepares sample computer-aided teaching / learning materials for various courses, and demonstrates these in front of the faculty of these courses; this gives them an idea as to how they can themselves include computer-aided learning in their courses. The University encourages the faculty members to include more and more computer-aided teaching in their courses.
- 9. Faculty is encouraged to participate in Orientation and Refresher courses offered by UGC. They are also encouraged to appear for NET and other similar exams that can boost their teaching and research abilities.

- 2.4.10 How often does the University organize academic development programmes (*e.g.*: curriculum development, teaching-learning methods, examination reforms, content / knowledge management, etc.) for its faculty aimed at enriching the teaching-learning process?
 - 1. Academic development programmes are organized for the faculty at the departmental levels about once every semester, in which they are given latest knowledge about curriculum development, teaching-learning methods, examination reforms, content/knowledge management, etc. Besides, experts are invited on a regular basis to acquaint the faculty with the recent advancements in their respective fields.
 - 2. At the University level, the faculty development programmes are conducted at least once annually. In these programmes, the faculty is given a broad overview of their teaching, research and administrative roles in the progress of the University. Faculty is informed about the present achievements of the University and the resources available to the faculty within the University. The further vision of the University is also shared and discussed with the faculty in these programmes.
 - 3. The Computer Science Department and the Training and Placement Cell also offer regular training sessions to the faculty members regarding the basics of computer hardware and software, and preparation of computer-aided teaching / learning materials.

Faculty exchange is an integral part of all these MOUs. As a part of the faculty exchange programme, the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya faculty from relevant disciplines visit these national and international Universities and share their knowledge through in-class lectures and general awareness seminars. They also get a chance to enhance their knowledge and know about the recent trends in teaching and research in their specific fields. This also broadens the perspective of faculty in terms of their role as a teacher and a researcher. This in turn reflects in their improved performance once they come back to Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya. For example, Dr. Vijay Sharma and Dr. Sushil Bhadula from Department of Environmental Science visited Kazimierz Wielki University, Bydgoszcz, Poland, which was a nice enriching experience in the field of teaching and research. In collaboration with this University, they are planning to start an academic course on 'Revitalisation of Rivers', which would be unique in this discipline.

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is regularly visited by the faculty from other Universities, both national and international. These faculty members have conducted various types of classes such as English Communication and Translation, Russian Language, Effective Teaching Techniques, Research Methodology, Library Management and Accessing Research Databases, etc. These classes have definitely contributed to the improvement in the quality of the faculty and also in boosting their confidence. The faculty have been motivated to practice innovative teaching techniques as well as take up new research projects.

Besides sharing their knowledge with other Universities in their areas of core academic competence, the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya faculty also share their insights and expertise in the area of Life Management techniques that they practice on a regular basis at Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya. The faculty members visit various Universities and Institutions, both national and international, to conduct Life Management workshops and seminars wherein they teach various topics like Stress Management, Time Management, Freedom from Anxiety and Depression, Scientific Spirituality, Holistic Living, Holistic Medicine, etc.

2.5.1.1 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1.2 How does the University ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are in place?

In order to make sure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are in place, the University takes the following steps:

- 1. The evaluation process for each course is mentioned in the prospectus, which is given at the time of applying for admission. The evaluation process is also mentioned on the University website.
- 2. The evaluation process for each course is given along with the syllabus. The syllabi for all the courses are readily available in the University Central Library, and if needed, the students can get a photocopy of the same.
- 3. The students are also informed about the evaluation process by their respective departments and course instructors.
- 4. The time-table for the internal assessment tests, the final examinations and other important dates such as result declaration, etc. are informed to all the inmates of the University well in advance through circulars posted on notice boards, circulated to all the departments.

2.5.2 What are the important examination reforms initiated by the University and to what extent have they been implemented in the University departments and affiliated colleges?Cite a few examples, which have positively impacted the examination management system.

The University has initiated several examination reforms in order to make the evaluation process effective. Some important examination reforms are as follows:

- 1. The University has an Examination Cell that facilitates conduction of 4 internal evaluation tests at fixed dates during the semester for all the departments. These dates are decided by the Controller of Examinations after consulting with all the Head of the Departments. This way the syllabus is roughly divided into equal parts, wherein a particular part is to be finished before a specific test. This makes the syllabus progress monitoring streamlined and there is not much pressure at the end of the semester. If some faculty member or department is not able to conduct the internal evaluation test on the pre-fixed date, they have to take written permission for the same from the controller of examinations; this develops accountability in the evaluation process.
- 2. In case some student misses an internal evaluation test, he/she gets one chance of a special internal evaluation test just before the final external examination.
- 3. Feeding all the internal and external marks in computerized database for compiling final result and marksheet has improved the accuracy and efficiency of result generation process.
- 4. Since Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a fully residential University, the requirement of 80% attendance is followed and students having shortage in attendance are not allowed to appear for the final external examination (they can take the final external examination in the subsequent semester only). The attendance of all the students is regularly updated in the University Database (Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software), and the consolidated attendance is displayed on the notice board and the University's local intranet website (Gurukul) on monthly basis. This way, the students are well informed about their attendance and can take corrective measures during the semester itself by not missing further classes. This has improved the students' regularity in attending the classes.
- 5. The dates for the final external examinations are declared well in advance. The Examination Cell maintains complete confidentiality with regards to the question papers. Two invigilators are assigned to each examination room. The invigilators are given proper instructions for making sure that no malpractices, such as copying, etc., can take place during the examination.
- 6. Pattern has been changed in both internal and external exams which aims to encourage the students to do an indepth study of the subject.
- 7. A flying squad of senior faculty members continuously keeps strict vigil over the entire final external examination process.
- 8. The final results are displayed on the University notice boards and website. Any grievances are promptly addressed.

All these processes have led to a streamlined examination process.

2.5.3 What is the average time taken by the University for declaration of examination results? In case of delay, what measures have been taken to address them? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the University for the publication of examination results (*e.g.* website, SMS, email, etc.).

The average time taken by the University to declare the results is about one month. The Examination Cell keeps a close vigil over the entire examination process, and hence no delays have been reported so far in the declaration of results. The examination results are published on the University notice board and the University's local intranet website (Gurukul).

2.5.4 How does the University ensure transparency in the evaluation process? What are the rigorous features introduced by the University to ensure confidentiality?

The University ensures complete transparency in the evaluation process. The evaluated answer sheets for internal evaluation tests are shown to the students and any grievances are promptly addressed. The final results for each semester are promptly displayed on the University notice boards and website. After the final results are declared for a semester, the students are given a specific time-frame in which they can approach the Examination Cell and request for re-evaluation of their answer sheets. The re-evaluations are also conducted promptly.

The Examination Cell of the University ensures complete confidentiality in the entire evaluation process. Following are some rigorous features adopted by the Examination Cell in this regard:

- 1. The process of setting paper, typing and printing is completed while maintaining complete confidentiality.
- 2. The question papers are given to the invigilators only a few minutes before the commencement of the examination and they are told to take these directly to their respective examination rooms. This ensures total confidentiality and timed opening of the question papers.
- 3. After the completion of the examination, the answer sheets are promptly collected by the invigilators and immediately submitted to the Examination Cell.
- 4. The answer sheets are sent for evaluation in a confidential manner, wherein the name of the evaluator is not disclosed to anyone.

2.5.5 Does the University have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

• Pre-examination processes – Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.

Yes, the University has an Examination Cell that looks after all the preexamination processes, such as time-table generation, student list generation, appointing invigilators, setting up flying squad, attendance sheet generation, etc.

• Examination process – Examination material management, logistics, etc.

Yes, the University's Examination Cell looks after the entire examination process including examination material management, logistics, etc.

• Post-examination process – Attendance capture, OMR-based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing, certification, etc.

Yes, the University's Examination Cell looks after the entire post-examination process including attendance capture, result processing, certification, etc.

2.5.6 Has the University introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

Yes, the University has introduced several reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process and in total consonance with the recent UGC guidelines. Some of these reforms are as follows:

- 1. All students are expected to undertake a mandatory course work for 6 months (one semester) followed by the written examinations. The students are registered only after they clear the examination.
- 2. During course work, research methodology is taught in detail, both by University and external experts. Every week, the students have to attend one session named "Journal Club", which is a hands-on session wherein they learn to write research papers and present research proposals.
- 3. One year after clearing Ph.D. entrance, the students have to do Topic Presentation in which they make a presentation on the topic of their interest and the associated research plan. The research plan is critically analyzed by the faculty members and examiners and changes to the research topic, if any, are suggested.
- 4. The students have to present their research progress report every 6 months in an open evaluation in which other students, faculty and examiners are present. The students have to make a presentation on the research work done till date and answer the questions raised by audience.
- 5. All the students are required to write at least two research papers based on their research work, with at least one of these published in a peer reviewed journal.
- 6. The University promptly interacts with the Ph.D. examiners to get the evaluation reports in time, and conveys these reports to the students for making necessary corrections and modifications.

2.5.8 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to examinations?

All the grievances with regards to the examinations are referred by the Examination Cell of the University to an Examination Committee. The Examination Committee promptly looks at these grievances, talks to the student, if required, and takes necessary action.

2.5.9 What efforts have been made by the University to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved the process and functioning of the examination division/section.

A separate Examination Cell has been constituted to assist the Office of the Controller of Examinations. This Cell looks after all the procedures with regards to examinations under the guidance of the Controller of Examinations. Following are some significant efforts that have improved the process and functioning of the examination section.

- 1. The Examination Cell conducts 4 internal evaluation tests at fixed dates during the semester for all the departments. These dates are decided by the Controller of Examinations after consulting with all the Head of the Departments. If some faculty member or department is not able to conduct the internal evaluation test on the pre-fixed date, they have to take written permission for the same from the controller of examinations; this develops accountability in the evaluation process. In case some student misses an internal evaluation test, he/she gets one chance of a make-up internal evaluation test just before the final external examination.
- 2. Since Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a fully residential University, the requirement of 80% attendance has been strictly enforced and students having shortage in attendance are not allowed to appear for the final external examination (they can take the final external examination in the next semester only). The attendance of all the students is regularly updated in the University Database (Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software), and the consolidated attendance is displayed on the notice board and Gurukul intranet portal regularly during the semester. This way, the students are well informed about their attendance and can take corrective measures during the semester itself by not missing further classes.
- 3. The dates for the final external examinations are declared well in advance. The Examination Cell maintains complete confidentiality with regards to the question papers. Two invigilators are assigned to each examination room. The invigilators are given proper instructions for making sure that no malpractices, such as copying, etc., can take place during the examination.
- 4. Feeding all the internal and external marks in computerized database for compiling final result and marksheet has improved the accuracy and efficiency of result generation process.
- 5. The final results are displayed on the University notice boards and website. Any grievances are promptly addressed.
- 6. Medical facilities and assistance from local Police Station are readily available during the examinations.

2.6. Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Has the University articulated its graduate attributes? If so, how does it facilitate and monitor its implementation and outcome?

The graduate attributes of the University have been well articulated in its Mission Statement, as well as Aims and Objectives. The mission of Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is to unite contemporary education with spiritual training, to cultivate holistically developed, competent and personally uplifted graduates who have a science based understanding and experience of spiritual transformation and a powerful drive to use their education to promote the greater good of society. To do this, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya offers a unique blend of modern research and pedagogy with a broad spectrum of ancient Indian practices for raising the level of consciousness and character development.

The Aims and Objectives of the University include dissemination of the tenets of Indian culture and human values; education and research in the disciplines of divine Indian culture (Dev Sanskriti) and to provide a proper blend of Science and Spirituality; conducting research on various streams of science based on ancient Vedic Culture like Ayurveda, Science of Mantras, Yogic Science, Psychology, Cosmology, Astrology (Jyotish), Science of Yagya, Ancient Indian Therapies, etc.; teaching and research in the fields related to self-employment, village management, etc. with a view to usher in a new social order based on the vision of Pandit Shriram Sharma Acharya; providing a residential environment to establish the ancient Gurukul tradition.

The University is continuously striving to achieve these attributes in its graduates through various means including course work, Life Management classes, social and corporate internship, academic collaborations (MOUs), national and international academic exchanges through conferences and seminars, etc.

2.6.2 Does the University have clearly stated learning outcomes for its academic programmes/departments? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the University has clearly stated learning outcomes for its academic programmes and departments. These have been mentioned in the Mission Statement, Aims and Objectives, and Annual Reports of the University, as well as in the Prospectus that is given along with the admission form. The learning outcomes are also clearly evident from the syllabus, which are available in the Central Library and can be readily copied. All learning outcomes are also available on the University website.

2.6.3 How are the University's teaching, learning and assessment strategies structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

In order to achieve the intended learning outcomes, the University's teaching, learning and assessment strategies have been structured as follows:

- 1. The students are made aware of the learning outcomes through the prospectus, website, Gyan Deeksha ceremony and Orientation Programme conducted before the commencement of the classes, the syllabus that are available from the Central Library, as well as in-class lectures.
- 2. The regular classes are conducted 6 days a week. These include early morning practical Yog classes; optional spiritual practices like yagya, meditation, prayer, etc.; other theory and practical classes starting from 8:30 am in the morning; and, evening music meditation played in the entire campus.
- 3. A course on Life Management is compulsory for all the students. Hon. Chancellor, Dr. Pranav Pandya conducts weekly classes on Meditation and Gita. All the students have to do a mandatory professional and social internship of two months. National and international conferences and seminars are organized on a regular basis, experts are invited for talks on a regular basis, and, various festivals and cultural programmes are organized regularly; various extra-curricular activities are also available to the students.
- 4. The students have access to state of the art classrooms, learning facilities, well qualified faculty, laboratories, library, etc.

5. The evaluation is done on a regular basis through 4 internal tests and a final external examination. Complete transparency and confidentiality is maintained in the assessment process. 80% attendance is strictly enforced.

The above mentioned teaching, learning and assessment strategies and several other similar processes facilitate the achievement of intended learning outcomes.

2.6.4 How does the University collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it to overcome the barriers to learning?

The University has several means of collecting and analyzing data on student learning outcomes. These include:

- 1. The internal evaluation tests and the final external examination.
- 2. The presentations/seminars done by students in each course on Saturdays.
- 3. The monographs / project reports prepared by students in each course.
- 4. The programmes conducted by the students during their internship and the feedback/recognitions received from the people of that place.
- 5. The feedback obtained by the employers of the students.
- 6. The awards and honors received by the students in national and international competitions, conferences, seminars, cultural programmes, social service schemes, sports, etc.
- 7. The feedback collected by the Student Welfare Cell.

Based on this feedback, the University takes several measures to overcome the barriers to learning. Some of these methods include:

- 1. Regular training sessions are organized for the faculty, wherein they are taught various techniques for interactive teaching. They are told about ways in which they can make their lectures more interesting by including relevant audio/video clips and presentations, etc.
- 2. The University offers several remedial and add-on courses, both through its academic departments and other centers like the Internship and Placement Cell, Training Cell, etc. These courses are offered in the early morning, afternoon and evening, during off-class hours. These courses include: English Communication; English Translation; Mathematics help sessions; Computer Basics Presentation, Spreadsheet, Document, Internet; Research Methodology Writing a Research Paper; Panchakarma; Naturopathy; Acupressure; Interview / Group Discussion Preparation; Physiotherapy; Logical Reasoning practice for competitive examinations; etc.
- 3. The Training Cell also offers some extra-curricular learning opportunities, which enhance the creativity and learning abilities of the students. These include: performing Yagya and Sacramental Rites; playing Dhapali and singing PragyaGeet (motivational songs); Gaushala Prabandhan (cowshed management), GauUtpad (cow dung and urine based products) making and Vermicomposting; Hastakargha (handmade cloth handloom); handmade carpet and mat; pickle and jam making; best out of waste wall hanging; stitching; dance Kathak; Nukkad Natak; anchoring; conference management; software Corel Draw; sketching and drawing; guide training; self defense Lathi; learn Urdu; etc.
- 4. The students are taught various Life Management techniques and spiritual practices by which they can enhance their learning abilities and strive for holistic development.

5. The students are given opportunities for participating in sports, cultural programmes, conferences, seminars, competitions, etc., as well as conducting life management sessions in various parts of the country during their internship, all of which enhance their learning ability and boost their confidence.

2.6.5 What are the new technologies deployed by the University in enhancing student learning and evaluation and how does it seek to meet fresh/ future challenges?

The new technologies deployed by the University in enhancing student learning and evaluation are as follows:

- 1. The e-learning resources are readily available as teaching tools. One large auditorium, two big halls, one classroom (Linguistics Classroom) and one Committee Room are equipped with audio/video and computer/projector setup for conducting classes along with the use of e-learning resources. About 8 classrooms have been identified as technology classrooms, which are provided with computer and projector. Department of Computer Science, Department of Communication, and Department of Indian Culture and Tourism Management have their own computer labs. Besides this, there is a Extension Computer Lab and Training and Placement Cell equipped with computers for providing blended learning opportunities.
- 2. Computer and internet access is available to all the faculty members so that they can incorporate e-learning resources in their lectures. The library is equipped with e-journals and e-databases for facilitating e-learning. The University has an intranet facility for sharing e-learning resources and databases.
- 3. Depending on their academic programme, the students have access to wellequipped laboratories including psychotherapy clinic, polyclinic (acupressure, pranic healing, pathology lab, yoga, yagyopathy, physiotherapy), naturopathy center, panchakarma center, etc., where they get hands-on experience in these scientific techniques.
- 4. The vocational training opportunities available on campus (hand made paper, hand made cloth handloom, vermicomposting, cow urine and cow dung based products, cow shed management, handicraft, stitching, etc.) are effective means for nurturing the creativity of the students.
- 5. The Brahmavarchas Research Center at Haridwar, which is equipped with various instruments for conducting research on Scientific Spirituality, is readily available to the research scholars for pursuing their research.
- 6. The database of all the students has been created in the Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software; the ERP Cell regularly upgrades and updates this software. The attendance for all the students is regularly fed into this database and declared to the students from time to time. The results for both internal and external evaluation are also fed in this database. This way, all the data pertaining to the students is centralized in this database, and handling large amount of data pertaining to the growing number of students and academic programmes has become feasible.

All these technologies have significantly enhanced the capability of the University in meeting fresh / future challenges with regards to student learning and evaluation.

3.1. **PROMOTION & RESEARCH**

- **3.1.1** Does the University have a Research Committee to monitor and address issues related to research? If yes, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations which have been implemented and their impact.
 - Yes, the University has a research committee comprising of the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice Chancellor, Registrar, Research Coordinator and a panel of faculty members from various disciplines. The Research Committee meets periodically to address various issues related to research. Research Committee also monitors and ensures adoption of the UGC minimum standards and procedure as per revised guidelines of UGC regulation 2009 for the award of Ph.D. degree by the University.
 - The University also has Research Degree Committee (RDC), Research Ethical Committee (REC) and Departmental Research Committees.

The main function of the RDC is to examine the synopsis submitted for research degree of the University and to look into the following matters:

- (i) the candidate possesses the requisite qualifications;
- (ii) adequate and appropriate facilities exist at the place of research for the proposed topic and the scheme of investigation is likely to give results of sufficient value;
- (iii) the supervisor possesses the requisite qualifications and is competent to supervise and guide the candidate;
- (iv) whenever a synopsis is rejected or recommended for modification, the RDC shall record reasons and concrete suggestions in the form of expert guidance for the candidate/supervisor.

The main function of REC is to monitor and ensure that the researchers have strictly followed the ethical standards of research in conformity with national guidelines, our social values and traditions.

Departmental Research Committees: DRC comprises of the senior faculty members of the department. The main objective of this committee is to monitor and ensure that the quality of projects and dissertation work conducted at the departmental level is satisfactory.

Recommendations

The following recommendations of the research committee have been implemented:

- Pre-Ph.D. course work to be introduced as a part of the Ph.D. programme to ensure better quality of research.
- There shall be uniformity in the examination pattern of the Ph.D. admission (Written test and interview).
- Speedy evaluation of the Ph.D. thesis.

- Periodical review of the progress of Ph.D. students.
- Setting the minimum requirement for Ph.D. thesis submission to be the publication of at least two research papers in journals of repute.

Impacts:

• The quality of the Ph.D. Degree in various disciplines has improved and has been found to be useful for the students in getting jobs and post-doctoral positions.

3.1.2 What is the policy of the University to promote research in its affiliated/constituent colleges?

Not Applicable. Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a unitary University.

3.1.3 What are the proactive mechanisms adopted by the University to facilitate the smooth implementation of research schemes/projects?

Autonomy:

- Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya (DSVV) is a State Private University that is fully financed by Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, Shantikunj, Haridwar. The University strictly adheres to the guidelines for Private Universities laid down by the State and the University Grants Commission, but at the same time it does not take any grant from the State or Central Government.
- The University has a **Research and Publication Cell** that is responsible for the documentation, compilation, publication and promotion of the research output of the University. The University runs its own research programs in various topics related to Indian Culture and Traditional Indian Wisdom, as well as in the areas related to modern technology, such as Computer Science and Animation. The results of these research projects are presented/ published on a regular basis in national and international conferences and journals.
- All the Principal Investigators (PIs) are authorized to operate research grants by themselves with the approval of the Vice-Chancellor/Pro-Vice Chancellor.
- The University is inherently associated with a well-established research institute named **Brahmavarchas Research Institute**, which was started in 1979 by Revered Pandit Shriram Sharma Acharya for conducting research on Scientific Spirituality. Chancellor, Dr. Pranav Pandya is the current Director of this institute and has conducted various research studies at this Institute since 1979. The Institute has a well-equipped library, various diagnostic equipments and technically qualified, research-oriented volunteers. Several research studies of the University, including both theoretical and experimental are being conducted at this Institute.
- The University has established many equipment facilities at the Center of Complementary and Alternative Medicine (Acupressure, Pranic Healing, Pathology Lab, Yoga, Yagyopathy, Physiotherapy, Naturopathy, Panchakarma, Marma Therapy), Psychology Lab, Environmental Science Lab, Computer Lab, Animation Lab, Journalism and Mass Communication Lab, etc., which provide

the necessary infrastructure for the implementation of research activities. Further, it is proposed to strengthen/upgrade the research laboratories of the Department of Rural Management, which include Herbs/Food Processing Lab, Handmade Paper Lab, Handloom Technology Lab and Cow Based Products Lab.

- As per the recommendations and requirements of the investigators and research students, most of the laboratories are allowed to function without any time restrictions.
- The University publishes a biannual research journal **Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal (DSIIJ - ISSN 2279-0578)**, which publishes original work of all subjects dedicated to indigenous knowledge. This journal shall also be published in Italian in near future.
- The University regularly organizes various **national and international conferences**, which facilitate the confluence and sharing of knowledge among intellectuals from various fields of study.
- The University has entered into academic collaboration with 26 national and international institutions for mutual academic exchange in the fields of research, teaching, vocational training, etc. Faculty exchange is an integral part of all these MoUs. As part of the faculty exchange program, the University faculty from relevant disciplines visit these national and international Universities and share their knowledge through in-class lectures and general awareness seminars.

They also get a chance to enhance their knowledge about the recent trends in teaching and research in their specific fields. This also broadens the perspective of the University faculty in terms of their role as a teacher and a researcher.

• The University regularly invites faculty from other Universities, both national and international. These faculty members conduct various types of workshops on Research Methodology, Library Management and Accessing Research Databases, etc.

These classes have motivated the faculty to practice innovative teaching techniques as well as in taking up new research projects.

Simplification of procedures related to sanctions/purchases:

- The University has a Purchase Committee, which is empowered to procure the required things for various departments as per their needs. All purchases are made through the recommendations of the Purchase Committee. The items needed for research by various departments are also procured through this Purchase Committee. The recommendations of Purchase Committee are finally approved by the Pro-Vice Chancellor. The time taken to purchase items is fairly short and the process is highly simplified.
- The members of the purchase committee include Assistant Registrar, Estate Officer and representative of Finance Officer.

Providing seed money, matching grant and advance to the investigators:

- As of now, the University does not have a separate provision for providing Seed Money, Matching Grant and Advance; discussions are underway and a policy in this regard may be formulated soon. However, once the research topic for a student is finalized, the necessary funding needed for conducting that research is provided by the University to the research guide/investigator.
- The University provides fellowship along with free accommodation, food, library, lab and primary healthcare facilities to the registered Ph.D. students.

3.1.4 How is interdisciplinary research promoted between/among different departments / schools of the University:

The University encourages all its departments to take up interdisciplinary research. This is facilitated by several means, including:

- Selecting interdisciplinary topics for Ph.D. Theses and Postgraduate Dissertations is encouraged.
- Faculty of one department serving as guest faculty in another department leads to academic discussion and exchange of ideas between faculties of different departments. This in turn leads to opportunities for collaborative interdisciplinary research. For example, the Postgraduate (PG) program in the Department of Psychology has a subject on Ayurvedic Psychology, which is taught by a faculty of the Department of Yoga and Health; the PG program in the Department of Yoga and Health has a subject on Yogic Psychology, wherein the lectures are delivered by the faculty from the Department of Psychology.
- Organizing national and international conferences, seminars and lectures by eminent personalities on a regular basis, on a wide spectrum of topics, which provides opportunities to the faculty to learn about the current research areas of various academic streams, as well as it provides platform for exploring possibilities of interdisciplinary research.
- Groups from various countries and different parts of India visit the University on a regular basis for short-term induction and training programs; these groups request for a training program of an interdisciplinary nature, which spans over the focus areas of several departments such as Department of Yoga and Health, Department of Psychology, Department of Oriental Studies, etc. Organization of these training programs provides an opportunity for exchange of ideas of interdisciplinary nature leading to collaborative research.
- As of now, various departments that are involved in interdisciplinary research include: Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Psychology; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Rural Management; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Oriental Studies; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Computer Science; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Psychology and Department of Education; Department of Psychology and Dsychology and Dsychology

Environmental Science; Department of Indian Culture & Tourism and Department of Rural Management.

The total amount of fellowship provided by the University during the assessment years is Rs 7.91 Lakhs.

3.2. RESOURCE MOBILIZATION FOR RESEARCH

Specific budgetary provision for research is yet to be made by the University; however, the University has taken important financial steps to support research activities in the University.

- **Fellowships:** The University provides a monthly stipend of Rs. 1000/- p.m. with free accommodation, meals and primary health services to all its registered Ph.D. research fellows.
- **Contingency:** Research projects of Master's / Ph.D. students are financially supported by the University.
- Lab Facility: From the funds of the University, core labs and computer labs have been established in the different departments. All the laboratories of various departments of the University are accessible to research scholars. These labs have internet connectivity through 1 Gbps leased line through the National Knowledge Network (NKN project). Various free journals can be accessed by the scholars through this connectivity.
- Students are encouraged to avail various Research Fellowships. The Training and Placement Cell and Central Library of the University also run special sessions on making this information available to the students and scholars.
- Field trips are arranged for students to visit Institutions of Higher Learning, Industries, National Laboratories and Places of Historical importance.

3.3 RESEARCH FACILITIES

3.3.1 What efforts have been made by the University to improve its infrastructure requirements to facilitate research? What strategies have been evolved to meet the needs of researchers in emerging disciplines?

The University releases necessary funding, on regular intervals, to its various Departments, for improving infrastructure to facilitate research. This development is monitored by the Planning and Extension Division of the University as per the set norms, and the financial assistance for this purpose is provided by Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, Haridwar. The major infrastructural improvements are as follows:

- The Department of Yoga and Health can now conduct its Yoga practical classes in the well-equipped Mrityunjay Auditorium, which has a seating capacity of more than 1300. This gives an opportunity to do research on the effects of Yoga on larger population.
- Several halls have been made available for conducting regular Yoga practical classes, as well as collecting data for research work.
- The Centre of Complementary and Alternative Medicine under the Department of Yoga and Health has various laboratories including Psychotherapy, Acupressure, Pranic Healing, Pathology, Yoga, Yajnopathy, Physiotherapy, Naturopathy, Panchakarma, Marma Therapy, all of which facilitate regular research work in the University. These laboratories are continuously upgraded to meet the ever changing research needs.
- The Centre of Holistic Health Management under the Department of Yoga and Health, as well as Brahmavarchas Research Institute have well-equipped laboratories and gardens of medicinal herbs for conducting research in the disciplines of Ayurveda and Yajnopathy. Besides this, there is also an Ayurvedic Pharmacy for cultivation, processing, research and development of Ayurvedic products.
- Brahmavarchas Research Institute has been provided with several research equipments including Gas-Liquid Chromatograph, 12-Channel EEG, Alpha EEG Bio-feedback, Vitalograph, and various Psychometric Tests for assessing illusion, memory, steadiness, etc.
- Department of Psychology was assisted to establish a well-equipped Psychotherapy lab and a large collection of Psychometric Tests for conducting psychology related research.
- Department of Computer Science has two Computer Labs, each having more than 60 computers along with the necessary software.
- Center for Journalism and Mass Communication under the Department of Communication has a Computer Lab with about 25 computers, as well as a Clipping Room and a TV room to facilitate knowledge enhancement and research.

- Center for Sanskrit Studies under the Department of Languages has a huge collection of books and scriptures including the Vedas, Upanishads, Puranas, Smritis, etc. to allow literary research to take place in these ancient disciplines.
- Department of Rural Management has several laboratories including Herbs/Food Processing Lab, Handmade Paper Lab, Handloom Technology Lab and Cow Based Products Lab.
- The Department of Environmental Science has a modern laboratory to conduct research in the areas like Water Pollution, Air Pollution and other environmental parameters.
- The Center for Theology under the Department of Oriental Studies has set up several astronomical measurement instruments and structures on campus. Regular measurements are conducted from these instruments based on the ancient Indian science of Astronomy. A telescope has been set-up on the roof of the Central Library for regular astronomical measurements.
- The Central Library of the University is a five storey building that houses more than 37000 books, journals, magazines, etc. Several departments and centers have their own libraries. Such a resourceful referencing section provides ample literary support to conduct research in the University.

3.3.2 Does the University have an Information Resource Centre to cater to the needs of researchers? If yes, provide details of the facility.

Yes.

Student Learning and Information Centre at Library:

University Central Library has a major information resource centre for the students and researchers. It displays information regarding the research projects, proposals, fellowships, jobs and higher study opportunities and is updated periodically. The centre also provides accessibility to e-resources.

Research and Publication Cell:

Research and Publication Cell provides research library (Dissertations & Ph.D. theses of University) and offers research guidance to the researchers on various aspects. The Cell also encourages researchers to submit their research paper for publication to journals of repute including **Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal.** Publication in this journal is absolutely free for all.

3.3.3 Does the University have a University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC)? If yes, have the facilities been made available to research scholars? What is the funding allotted to USIC?

• As of now, the University does not have a centralized University Science Instrumentation Center; yet, the research equipments are made readily available to the students and scholars by the respective departments. Full funding required for the procurement and maintenance of these equipments is provided by Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, Shantikunj, Haridwar. • Besides this, Brahmavarchas Research Institute, Haridwar has a centralized repository of several diagnostic equipments, which are readily available for all the research scholars.

3.3.4 Does the University provide residential facilities (with computer and internet facilities) for research scholars, post-doctoral fellows, research associates, summer fellows of various academies and visiting scientists (national/international)?

- Yes, the University provides free meals and lodging to all doctoral research fellows. Research scholars of various academies and visiting scientists can also stay either in the University Guest House or in the hostels, based on their choice and availability.
- Internet and Wi-Fi facilities are also available in the Research Scholars' Hostel and in the University Guest House for the benefit of doctoral research fellows, visiting scholars and scientists. The University Guest House is equipped with 7 flat systems, each with 3 double bed rooms, en suite toilets and shared toilets. One office, refrigerator, dining, hot water, RO with safe drinking water, launderette, wi-fi, computer, printing, photocopying facilities are also available in the Guest House.

3.3.5 Does the University have a specialized research centre/workstation on-campus and off-campus to address the special challenges of research programmes?

Yes, the University has two specialized research centers.

- **ISOL Research Centre on Vedic Foundations of Indian Management**: This on-campus research centre was established in joint collaboration of Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya and ISOL Research Foundation, Delhi to work primarily in the disciplines of Sanskrit, Vedic studies and Indic studies.
- Brahmavarchas Research Institute: This off-campus research centre has conducted pioneering research in the discipline of scientific spirituality and continues to contribute by serving as backbone of the Research and Publication Cell of the University, which oversees publication of the International Interdisciplinary Journal of the University.

3.3.6 Does the University have centres of national and international recognition/repute? Give a brief description of how these facilities are made use of by researchers from other laboratories.

The Brahmavarchas Research Institute is well recognized for researches in the disciplines of Scientific Spirituality, Vedic Sciences and Yajnopathy. Researchers from various parts of the world come to the institute, and understand the in-depth researches that have been conducted so far, as well as those that are ongoing in the field of Scientific Spirituality.

3.4 RESEARCH PUBLICATION AND AWARDS

 - Yes, the University publishes a research journal named **Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal (ISSN 2279-0578) (DSIIJ).** DSIIJ is a biannual and bilingual (English and Hindi) journal. We publish original work of all subjects; specially research papers are dedicated to the indigenous knowledge. The journal has adopted a standard policy for publishing the research articles. All research papers in this journal are peer reviewed and publication is absolutely free.
 - Editorial board consists of 10 members (including 3 international members), which are the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice Chancellor, Professors of different disciplines of the University as well as from other universities/institutions. The Editorial Board also has 3 International members.

- The University takes the issue of malpractices and plagiarism in the research very seriously and has drafted a stringent and transparent policy on Research Ethics to deal with this issue. The Research Ethics Committee is empowered to check the occurrence of malpractices and plagiarism in research and to decide necessary corrective/disciplinary action against the people involved in such cases.
- No case of malpractices and plagiarism in research was reported during the assessment period.

3.4.7 Does the University promote interdisciplinary research? If yes, how many interdepartmental /interdisciplinary research projects have been undertaken and mention the number of departments involved in such endeavors?

Yes, the University encourages interdisciplinary research and collaborations with national / international institutes and industries. The University also encourages all its departments to take up interdisciplinary research. This is facilitated by several means including:

- Selecting such topics for Ph.D. Theses and Postgraduate Dissertations, which are interdisciplinary in nature.
- Faculty of one department serving as guest faculty in another department; which leads to academic discussion and exchange of ideas between faculty members of different departments. This in turn leads to opportunities for collaborative interdisciplinary research.
- Organizing national and international conferences, seminars and lectures by eminent personalities on a regular basis, on a wide spectrum of topics, which provides opportunities to the faculty to learn about the current research areas of various academic streams, as well as provides platform for exploring possibilities of interdisciplinary research.
- Groups from various countries and different parts of India visit the University on a regular basis for short term induction and training programs. Organization of these training programs provides an opportunity for exchange of ideas of interdisciplinary nature leading to collaborative research.
- The University has entered into academic collaboration with 26 national / international institutes / industries. Faculty exchange is an integral part of all these collaborations. As a part of the faculty exchange program, the University faculty visits these national and international Universities and shares their knowledge through in-class lectures and general awareness seminars. They also get a chance to enhance their knowledge and know about the recent trends in teaching and research in their specific fields, as well as interdisciplinary aspects and opportunities.
- Faculty members from these institutions also visit Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya on a regular basis, interact with the faculty and promote interdisciplinary research and teaching.
- Another interdisciplinary area in which the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya faculty shares their expertise with other institutions is Life Management techniques for Stress Management, Time Management, Freedom from Anxiety and Depression, Holistic Living, etc.
- As of now, various departments that are involved in interdisciplinary research include: Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Psychology; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Rural Management; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Oriental Studies; Department of Yoga and Health and Department of Science; Department of Yoga

and Health and Department of Communication; Department of Psychology and Department of Education; Department of Psychology and Department of Environmental Science; Department of Indian Culture and Tourism and Department of Rural Management, etc.

Total 47 projects of inter-disciplinary nature have been taken up by the University.

The University has instituted Excellence in Teaching and Excellence in Research awards for the faculty, which will be conferred on the deserving faculty members after in-depth scrutiny of their credentials.

- The University encourages and supports its faculty members to conduct research on wide range of topics related to indigenous knowledge. Further, in order to receive state, national and international recognition for research contributions, the faculty members are encouraged and supported to attend national and international conferences at various locations within India and abroad, from time to time.
- The University regularly organizes various national and international conferences, which provide the faculty an opportunity to present their research work in front of their peers and gain appropriate recognition.
- The University publishes a biannual research journal Dev Sanskriti Interdisciplinary International Journal (DSIIJ - ISSN 2279-0578), which publishes original work of all subjects dedicated to the indigenous knowledge; the faculty members are encouraged to publish their work in this journal.
- The University has entered into academic collaboration with 23 national and international institutions for mutual academic exchange in the fields of research, teaching, vocational training, etc. Faculty exchange is an integral part of all these MOUs. As a part of the faculty exchange program, the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya faculty from relevant disciplines visit these national and international Universities, share their knowledge through in-class lectures and general awareness seminars, and get recognized for their research contributions.
- The faculty members who get national and international recognitions for research are suitably honored by the University.
- The faculty members are also encouraged to take part in various researches being conducted by the on and off-campus research centers of the University; i.e. ISOL Research Centre for Vedic Foundations in Indian Management and Brahmavarchas Research Institute.

3.5 CONSULTANCY

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is unique in the sense that it acts exclusively as a social organization and this feature is based on the principles of sponsoring body All World Gayatri Pariwar (Vedmata Gayatri Trust). Accordingly we provide services to the society without any reciprocal expectations and remunerations. Hence relevant consultancies offered by the various departments of the University are offered free to users with a singular aim to benefit the society and impart altruistic ideals in the students and scholars.

3.5.2 Does the University have a University-industry cell? If yes, what is its scope and range of activities?

The University has a Training and Placement Cell, which is in regular contact with other institutions and industries for mutual collaboration, publicity, extension and placement purposes.

The scope and range of its activities are as follows:

- This Cell regularly brings out publications that inform the industry about the latest developments in the University.
- It invites the industry personnel for visiting the University, interacting with the students and staff, and give guest lectures.
- It invites the industries and institutions for campus placements. It also informs the students about off-campus opportunities in various industries.
- Consultancy is provided to various types of industries such as Soil Conservation and Water Shed development; Water Conservation and Management; Organic Farming / Eco Farming; Cow Culture and Cow based products; Apiculture and Organic Honey production, etc.
- Life Management and Personality Development workshops are organized for the employees of the industry, both at their location (for example Birla Tyres, Laksar; industries in SIDCUL, Haridwar, etc.) as well as in the University.

3.5.3 What is the mode of publicizing the expertise of the University for Consultancy Services? Which are the departments from whom consultancy has been sought?

The University publicizes the expertise of the University in consultancy services by displaying it on the University Website (www.dsvv.ac.in). The University also employs conventional publicity means such as by distributing brochures and pamphlets about University's expertise.

The University also utilizes **Pragya Abhiyan newsletter**, which is a fortnightly newsletter of the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, with a circulation of 50000 in the print medium, **Akhand Jyoti**, the monthly magazine of the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust, with a circulation in excess of 800000, **Sanskriti Sanchar**, the newsletter of the University and other magazines of the Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust (www.awgp.org), to spread awareness about the expertise of the University in the Consultancy services.

The departments from whom consultancy has been sought include Department of Yoga and Health, Department of Psychology, Department of Oriental Studies, Department of Computer Science, Department of Communication, and, Department of Rural Management.

3.5.4 How does the University utilize the expertise of its faculty with regard to consultancy services?

The University encourages the faculty members to participate in consultancy service and provides all possible support. These faculty members provide consultancies in accordance with their field of expertise and specialization. The specialized fields of consultancy are mentioned in point 3.5.1.

The broad areas of consultancy services by different departments are mentioned in point 3.5.1. The University believes in providing Consultancy without any financial motives and hence, no revenue has been generated out of these social service efforts.

3.6 Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and Extension Activities

3.6.1 How does the University sensitize its faculty and students on its Institutional Social Responsibilities? List the social outreach programmes which have created an impact on students' campus experience during the last four years.

The Founder-Patron of the University, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya believed that there is need for an educational institution, which could mould its students into noble and enlightened human beings; selfless, warm-hearted, compassionate and kind and hence, all the activities of the University function with a primary objective of making students and scholars responsible to the society.

A sense of belonging to the institution, intellectual honesty, commitment to teaching, social bonding and national duties are some of the important Institutional Social responsibilities that are inculcated in the teachers as well as in the students. The University not only urges the importance of disseminating knowledge but also places emphasis on the global priorities like societal duties and eco-consciousness. The dissemination of the knowledge acquired by faculty members is performed up to the grass root level at proximal and distal locations.

The University has commenced many social outreach programmes to impart social responsibility in the students:

1. Social Internship: Social upliftment through self-refinement and vice versa is the area of University's focus, which helps the students of the University in testing their character and competence, both being built during their study tenure at the University. This internship is a unique and compulsory feature, which offers the students of the University a platform in the form of society, corporate organizations, academic institutions and schools.

The students organize health camps, awareness drives, religious ceremonies, deaddiction campaigns, personality refinement talks, workshops and conferences. This enables them to interact with people, understand their lives, learn from their experience, and at the same time offer them valuable inputs and thoughts to help them transform their lives. This, therefore, is a process of mutual transformation and collective elevation of students and the counterparts. Some students are also offered professional internships and there are some who contribute to the University development affairs.

- **2. National Service Scheme (NSS):** NSS, with its motto "Not Me But You", helps the students to develop appreciation for helpless people of the society. Through NSS activities, the students have conducted blood donation camps, river cleaning projects, mass awareness campaigns, volunteering services in events of national and international importance such as Republic Day, Commonwealth Games, Kumbh Mela etc.
- **3. DIYA** (**Divine India Youth Association**): DIYA is a unique initiative taken by Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, which aims to improve and beautify the world we live in. DIYA aims to stir young minds towards bringing about a change in the society, and to channelize energy and capabilities of youth of India, which are now half of India's population, towards a single aim of transforming the era and change the face of the world. With this vision, DIYA was commenced at the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, Haridwar on the convocation day of the year 2007 in the presence of **H. E. President of India, Mr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam.**
- **4. Gramotthan Pariyojana (Rural Upliftment Project):** Students eagerly participate in the Rural Upliftment project of the University that includes Swasthya (health), Swakshata (Cleanliness and Hygiene) and Swavalamban (Self-entrepreneurship) programs.
- **5. Environmental Conservation projects:** through 'Taru-Mitra/ Taru-Putra pariyojna' (adopting a tree as a friend/child) and 'Vriksha Ganga Abhiyan' (movement for planting innumerable trees), that have lead to the plantation of more than 10 million trees all over India; students and staff of the University have played a significant role in making this happen.
- 6. Social Reform Movement: (Dushpravratti unmulan-Sadpravratti samvardhan): This initiative has been taken to protect the social and ethical values at global level by discarding the bad habits like Addiction of Alcohol / Smoking/ Tobacco and enhancing good habits by improving the way of life. The students of the University have conducted numerous de-addiction camps and helped in rehabilitating many individuals.
- **7. Disaster Relief Programs:** Students and all staff of University have participated in various Disaster Relief Programs initiated by the sponsoring body of the University (Shri Vedmata Gayatri Trust), including Kedarnath calamity, Haridwar floods etc.

Additionally, the daily routine of the University includes collective shramdaan (volunteering to do physical labour) and use of Honesty Counter, both of which are aimed to instill social values in the students.

3.6.2 How does the University promote University-neighborhood network and student engagement, contributing to the holistic development of students and sustained community development?

We conduct special training programmes on Life Management, Personality Refinement and holistic development of individuals.

Compulsory internship by the students is a form of our extension activity. During this programme, our students of all the disciplines go to villages and urban areas, and work with farmers and small industries, where they gain practical experience and also contribute to the dissemination of the knowledge learnt by them in the University during their course programme.

NSS also undertakes extension activity through group living, collective experience, sharing and constant interaction with community.

3.6.3 How does the University promote the participation of the students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National / International programmes?

The University strongly encourages all the students to take part in various National schemes such as NSS through the mechanism mentioned in point no. 3.6.1 and 3.6.2.

Faculty members play an active role in these extension activities in terms of mentoring and guiding the students, both for on-campus and off-campus programs.

The University also offers special academic support in terms of relaxation of 5% marks in the eligibility criteria for admission to the students from NSS, NCC background.

3.6.4 Give details of social surveys, research or extension work, if any, undertaken by the University to ensure social justice and empower the underprivileged and the most vulnerable sections of society?

No such survey has been conducted so far at the University level. However, some departments receive feedback from the general public, and take necessary actions for incorporating the relevant suggestions in the extension programs for improving their condition.

For example, the Department of Rural Management welcomes the suggestions of selfhelp groups, cooperatives, and small enterprises, and always tries to incorporate these in its programs for rural development and upliftment of rural population.

3.6.5 Does the University have a mechanism to track the students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

Yes, the University tracks this via Internship Report, which is supposed to be mandatorily prepared and submitted by all the students going on the Social Internship programme. This is a portfolio of all their activities undertaken during their social internship. This promotes ideal citizenry in the students.

3.6.6 Bearing in mind the objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the University, how did they complement learning experience? Specify the values inculcated and skills learnt.

Most of the concurrent activities of the NSS and Internship programmes focus on the adoption of homes for the aged, destitute, and orphanages, blood donation, rainwater harvesting, traffic education and regulation, preservation of monuments, greenery development and forestation, disaster management, health campaigns focusing on polio eradication, HIV/AIDS awareness, education and recreation leading to promotion of literacy, rural, adult and women education, women empowerment, career guidance, campaigns against social evils like untouchability, dowry, addictions, etc.

The first hand experience gained through these activities makes the students aware of the impending problems and needs of the society. They emerge as better citizens, having become more sensitive to the society to which they belong. **3.6.7** How does the University ensure the involvement of the community in its outreach activities and contribute to community development? Give details of the initiatives of the University which have encouraged community participation in its activities.

The University takes pride in its various activities initiated in relation to *community and national development*. The community services are part of the University programmes.

The University is extending its community services to the rural people by giving medical facilities and creating social awareness. This task is carried out by the faculty members of the University through the active involvement of Shantikunj volunteers and its diverse social following. In the various activities like mass cleaning drive of river Ganga, mass tree plantation, yoga and health awareness camps, community participation is encouraged and ensured by prior invitation and publicity amongst the masses.

3.7.2 Mention specific examples of how these linkages promote

• Curriculum development:

Interaction with other premier Institutes' faculty helped markedly in enriching the curriculum; such as the MoU with JPIET helped the University to improve the BCA curriculum.

• On-the-job training:

Recently Prof. Maureen P. Hall from University of Massachusetts Dartmouth (UMass Dartmouth), USA organized workshop on effective teaching for teachers. Ms. Danielle Johansen, UMass, USA also arranged workshop on professional communication in English for all the faculty members, which proved to be immensely useful. Similarly, department of Rural Management has upgraded its academic programme by using the suggestions given by collaborating institutions like NIH, Indian Institute of Technology (IIT), Central Soil and Water Conservation Research and Training Institute (CSWCRTI), Indian Council of Forestry Research and Education (ICFRE), Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR, New Delhi), etc.

• Internship:

We have established a strong linkage with different organizations to favor the welfare of our students. The students go and stay with these organizations to gain practical experience of various problems faced by the people in their coverage areas.

• Faculty exchange and development:

Many Faculty members have visited collaborating institutions through these faculty exchange programmes and the list of such faculty is enclosed in the evaluative reports of individual departments.

• Research Publication:

Quality publications are brought out by the faculty members through the experiences availed during aforementioned visits. The International Journal of the University will be published in Italian as a result of collaboration with Academy of Traditional Indian Sciences, Pisa, Italy.

• Consultancy:

The University has existing collaboration with Jiangxi University of Traditional Chinese Medicine (JUTCM), China to provide consultancy in the areas of traditional Chinese Medicine, and in return, the faculty members of the DSVV have provided consultancy to the JUTCM in traditional Indian Medicine. Similar kind of collaboration has taken place in between DSVV and University of Latvia to provide reciprocal consultancy in areas like Indology and Baltic Studies.

• Student Placement:

The linkages that the University has developed with various institutions of national and international stature have allowed high number of students being placed in such destinations.

3.7.3 Has the University signed any MoUs with institutions of national/international importance/ other universities/ industries/corporate houses etc.? If yes, how have they enhanced the research and development activities of the University?

Yes.

The list of such MoUs has been provided in the point no. 3.7.1. Almost all the MoUs have one section dedicated to the mutual support in the areas of research and development, and hence, all the MoUs have contributed significantly in the enhancement of the research and development activities of the University. It is to be noted that one of the on-campus research centre of the University, ISOL Research Centre for Vedic Foundations and Indian Management is established in collaboration with ISOL Research Foundation.

3.7.4 Have the University-industry interactions resulted in the establishment/creation of highly specialized laboratories/facilities?

Yes. Following establishments have taken place within the University as a result of various MoUs between the University and other institutions:

- 3. Establishment of Virtual Laboratory in collaboration with JP Institute of Engineering & Technology (JPIET), Meerut.


4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

4.1.1 How does the University plan and ensure adequate availability of physical infrastructure and ensure its optimal utilization?

The University campus is spread over 75.38 acres with total built up area of 64,100 sq.m. The University has a well- designed layout and state of the art infrastructure that is well connected with wide asphalted roads and high mast street lights. Special emphasis has been paid in providing adequate greenery in the campus and flowering along the roads. The campus presents harmony in architecture and natural green environment. The University has adequate infrastructural facilities for academic, administrative, examination, accommodation, sports and all necessary University activities.

I) Planning of Infrastructure (Please see Annexure 'H')

The University focuses on proper planning and optimal utilization of its resources. The planning for any infrastructure is done well in advance so as to make it available for its proper use in the decided time.



All teaching departments and administrative units identify annual requirements of the department, annual maintenance of existing infrastructure, requirement of new physical infrastructure, enhancement of facilities in various laboratories; libraries; sports and gymnasium students activities etc. and present them to the Planning and Extension department of the University, which is supervised by the Estate Department of the University. The Estate Officer in turn sits with the Pro-Vice Chancellor, Finance Officer, Chief Architect and Chief Engineer of the University to create a draft proposal. The proposal is then presented to the Finance Committee to allow adequate budgetary provisions to be made and then in the Board of Management to receive administrative approval. The proposal is finally submitted to the Board of Governors for their approval.

II) Available Physical Infrastructure

1. Academic Infrastructure:

There are two large academic buildings with adequate class rooms; laboratories, seminar halls, faculty rooms etc.

- **a. Shriram Bhavan:** Ground floor and two upper floors = 4240 sq.m. approximately.
- **b.** Chaitanya Bhavan: Ground floor and two upper floors = 5860 sq.m. approximately. Additionally, there are also three other academic buildings for the Department of Rural Management, Department of Education and for the Centre of Holistic Health Management.

Additionally, a Swavalamban bhawan comprising of a ground and two upper floors has recently been completed and shall be operational from next academic session. A new administrative block as well as a Centre of Excellence of Yoga and Complementary & Alternative Medicine are under construction.

2. The Central Library:

The central library of the University is one of largest and tallest building of the University. It has a ground floor and five upper floors. The top-most floor of the library also has a Solar Observatory Centre that was built in guidance of Baroda Observatory. The total built up area of the central library is approximately 1560 sq.m.

3. Auditoriums:

The University has **6 auditoriums:**

- One Air Cooled Auditorium with 1300 capacity. Modern information and communication technology (ICT) facilities including PA system, Audio-visual system, LCD projector with cyclorama.
- Two auditoriums with modern ICT facilities, each with 400 capacity.
- Two auditoriums with modern ICT facilities, each with 200 capacity.
- One auditorium with modern ICT facilities with 120 capacity.
- The University also has three seminar halls with ICT facilities.

4. Accommodation Facilities:

a. Hostels for Students

The Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a fully-residential University and provides hostel accommodation to all its students. There are two hostels each for boys and girls, to accommodate more than 1200 students. Additional hostel buildings are proposed and shall be made available very soon. The list of the existing hostel buildings is as follows:

Additionally a new boys hostel with a capacity to accommodate 700 inmates is also under construction.

Facilities in the Hostels:

International Hostel:

Wi-fi internet connection, cooking facilities, washing machine, RO system for safe drinking water etc.

All Hostels:

Common room with television, daily newspapers, magazines and journals, telephone/ intercom/ fax facilities, water coolers and purifiers, hot water facilities, launderette etc.

b. Residential Facilities for Staff:

The staff residential facilities are provided on campus for faculty and staff members. There are total eight large blocks of buildings for the University staff and two new buildings are proposed, which shall be added soon. The list of current staff residential facilities is as follows:

Additionally, two buildings each comprising of 32 family accommodation flats are also under construction.

c. Facilities for Staff:

Wi-fi campus, free mobile, free water and electricity, medical, eco-friendly campus, faculty dining area.

- **5. Health Center:** The campus has a fully built health center to cater to the needs of the primary health care for all the students and staff of the University. This includes:
 - **a. Triage and Assessment Centre:** Itincludes a dispensary, pharmacy and facility to provide initial emergency treatment to four patients.
 - **b. Outpatient Clinic:** Constant availability of two Physicians and three Ayurvedic Consultants on site.
 - **c. Physiotherapy Services:** Wax Bath, Ultrasound, Interferential Therapy (IFT), Short Wave Diathermy, Traction, Pulleys etc.
 - **d.** Centre of Complementary & Alternative Medicine: Providing specialist services in Yoga Therapy, Marma Therapy, Acupressure, Yagya Therapy and Pranic Healing. It also has a Pathology Lab.
 - e. Psychological Disorders Clinic: Psychological Disorders Clinic with counseling rooms to provide various types of psychological therapies
 - **f.** Naturopathy Centre: Natural Treatment, Steam Bath, Spinal Bath, Hip Bath, Sun Bath, Mud Therapy, Massage, Colour Therapy, etc.
 - **g. Panchkarma Centre**: Oleation (Oil Massage, Shirodhara, Basti), Sudation (Steam Bath), Vamana (therapeutic emesis), Virechana (therapeutic purgation), Vasti (therapeutic enema), Nasya (nasal insufflation), etc.
 - **h.** Ambulance facility is available on site.
 - **i.** Additionally, a 50 bed multi-specialty hospital, with free access to health care for staff and students, is also located in the premises of the Shantikunj campus, which is the Headquarter of the sponsoring body of the University.
- 6. Secondary School: The campus has a secondary school within the premises of the University, which is called 'Gayatri Vidyapeeth'. The school follows the CBSE curriculum course and admits students from play group to 12th standard. The school is being run in a large three storey, independent building with playground facilities and has a capacity of 1400 students.

7. Dining Facilities:

- **a. Anandmayee Bhojanalay** A large mess for students and faculty, having four dining halls (separate for boys and girls) on ground and first floor with central kitchen. The meals are available without any cost to students and staff. The central R.O. plant provides drinking water in the mess.
- **b.** Annapurna Cafeteria: There is also a three storey Cafeteria available within the premises of the University that serves a variety of food at subsidized rates. The canteen has proper hygienic systems for cooking and proper servicing counters. It can accommodate more than 1500 guests at a time.

There is also a free of cost dining facility available for all the contractual staff of the University.

- **8. Sports Facilities:** The University has suitable infrastructure for the sports facilities that includes:
 - **a. Outdoor sports facilities:** Football ground, Cricket ground, Volleyball court, Basketball court, Badminton courts, Kho-Kho court, Kabaddi courtand Track and Field facilities with 400 meter running track, 100 meter running track, High Jump and Long Jump Pit, Throwing Arena. Additionally, two more game shades are also under construction. An indoor swimming pool is also proposed.
 - **b. Indoor Sports Facilities:** Table Tennis Tables, Chess Boards and Carom Boards, Fully equipped Gymnasium with multi-gym, power lifting and weight lifting facilities.
- **9. Power House:** The University has a suitably built power house with 33/11KV Substation, 630KVA Substation. Generator facilities 125 KVA for uninterrupted power supply in entire premises.
- **10. Amphitheatre:** The campus has an Amphitheatre with a large Shiva Temple in the center for conducting all outdoor student activities at its focal point. The entire campus has lush green landscape with beautiful flowering and other plants including rare medicinal plants.
- **11. Waste Management Centre:** The University has its own waste disposal and management centre with facilities like Gobar Gas Plant, Solid Waste Disposal System, Organic manure system etc.
- 12. Other Important Buildings: Other important buildings of the University are:
 - Guest House with seven flat systems, each with three double bed rooms, en suite toilets and shared toilets. One office, refrigerator, dining, hot water, RO with safe drinking water, launderette, wi-fi, computer, printing, photocopying facilities are available.
 - Grocery Store
 - Book Binding Outlet
 - Book Stall
 - Prakritik Ahar Kendra (Natural Products Stall)
 - *Srijna* 'Earn while Learn' centre, which provides training in knitting, sewing, embroidery, greeting card making, sweets making etc. to the students who require financial assistance.
 - *Smriti Upwan* having herbal garden, acupressure path.
 - Vedhshala (ancient astronomical measurement structures)
 - Atta Chakki (flour mill)

- *Dhanvantri Vanaushadhi Vatika*(garden of medicinal herbs)
- Swavlamban Kendra (self-reliance training center) with facilities for paper making, handloom, cow based products etc.
- *Yajnashala*(place for doing daily Yajna sacred fire ceremony)

The layout of proposed infrastructure to be developed in next three years is enclosed.

4.1.2 Does the University have a policy for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment? If yes, mention a few activities.

Yes. The University has a policy to create and enhance the infrastructural facilities in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment. The Head of the Departments collect feedback from the faculty, students, external experts, peers and alumni in relation to the existing infrastructure, and then taking the related concerns and recommendations into consideration, they present their requirements to the Planning and Extension department of the University, which is supervised by the Estate Department of the University.

The Estate Officer in turn sits with the Pro-Vice Chancellor, Finance Officer, Chief Architect and Chief Engineer of the University to create a draft proposal. The proposal is then presented to the Finance Committee to allow adequate budgetary provisions to be made and then in the Board of Management to receive administrative approval. The proposal is finally submitted to the Board of Governors for their approval.

A few initiatives taken by the University are as follows:

Adequate Teaching Facilities are available in the form of 2 large academic buildings with more than 50 class rooms, ICT facilities, seminar halls, laboratories, etc.

Adequate Research Facilities are available in the form of Research Laboratories, Computer Lab Extension and Specific Laboratories for Yoga and Health, Environmental Science, etc.

Adequate ICT Facilities are available in the form of fully wi-fi campus with 1 GBPS connectivity and LAN connectivity. Smart classrooms are available with LCD projectors and all modern facilities.

Adequate Conferencing Facilities are available in the form of auditoriums, seminar halls, meeting halls etc.

Adequate Clinical Facilities are available in the form of Health Centre, Centre of Complementary and Alternative Medicine, etc.

Some **unique centers of teaching-learning** include open air teaching under mango trees, in keeping with Gurukul tradition for Theology students; in amphitheatre, in

keeping with spiritual ambience for students of Oriental Studies; in herbal garden and in *yajnashala* to facilitate ancient Indian Medicinal systems' teaching for students of Yoga and Health; and in cattle farm to provide authentic learning environment for the students of Rural Management.

4.1.3 How does the University create a conductive physical ambience for the faculty in terms of adequate research laboratories, computing facilities and allied services?

The University is dedicated to provide the perfect physical ambience for the comprehensive development of the faculty members. In terms of facilities - research laboratories for various subjects, computer stations, yoga halls are provided and the faculty is encouraged to use these facilities even after working hours. Internet facility, Reprography section and individual mobile phones are also made available to the faculty.

The University has ICT based classrooms to enhance the traditional pedagogy. Seminar/conference halls are shared by the departments whenever required. The academic activities of the faculty are further backed by the University library system having a rich collection of knowledge and information resources which includes journals, periodicals and theses database. E-journals are the additional input for the faculty members. Some departments also have their own departmental libraries.

The University is widely connected on the Local Area Network based on Optical Fiber Cabling. The hi-end connectivity of 1 Gbps internet bandwidth connects all the departments of the University. All the offices and the hostels are connected via intranet. The entire campus is also connected through Wi-fi.

4.1.4 Has the University provided all departments with facilities like office room, common room and separate rest rooms for women students and staff?

Yes, all the University departments, which include Administrative, Academic Blocks, Auditoriums, Central Library, Cafeterias, and Hostels are provided with facilities like office rooms, common rooms and separate rest rooms for women students and staff.

4.1.5 How does the University ensure that the infrastructure facilities are disabled friendly?

The University effectively takes care of physically disabled faculty, staff and students. Majority of the University buildings are provided with disable-friendly infrastructure in the form of approach ramps, handrails, lifts and special lavatories.

4.1.6 How does the University cater to the requirements of residential students? Give details of

The Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a fully-residential University and provides hostel accommodation to all its students. There are two hostels each for Boys and Girls, to accommodate more than 1200 students. Additional hostel buildings are proposed and shall be made available very soon. The University has a well equipped Gymnasium with multi-gym, power lifting and weight lifting facilities. There are several halls on campus for practicing yoga.

4.1.7 Does the University offer medical facilities for its students and teaching and nonteaching staff living on campus ?

Yes. The University provides adequate medical facilities for its students and all the staff members residing on campus. The available medical facilities include:

- **Triage and Assessment Centre:** includes a dispensary, pharmacy and facility to provide initial emergency treatment to four patients.
- **Outpatient Clinic:** Constant availability of two Physicians and three Ayurvedic Consultants on site.
- **Physiotherapy Services:** Wax Bath, Ultrasound, IFT, Short Wave Diathermy, Traction, Pulleys etc.
- Centre of Complementary & Alternative Medicine with specialist Services in Yoga Therapy, Marma Therapy, Acupressure, Yagya Therapy and Pranic Healing

- **Psychological Disorders Clinic** with counseling rooms to provide various types of psychological therapies
- **Naturopathy Centre:** Natural Treatment, Steam Bath, Spinal Bath, Hip Bath, Sun Bath, Mud Therapy, Massage, Colour Therapy etc.
- **Panchkarma Centre**: Oleation (Oil Massage, Shirodhara, Basti), Sudation (Steam Bath), Vamana (therapeutic emesis), Virechana (therapeutic purgation), Vasti (therapeutic enema), Nasya (nasal insufflation), etc.
- Ambulance facility is available on site

Additionally, a 50 bed multi-specialty hospital with free access to health care for staff and students is also located in the premises of the Shantikunj campus, which is the Headquarter of the sponsoring body of the University.

4.1.8 What special facilities are available on campus to promote students interest in sports and cultural events / activities?

The University is well equipped with all necessary facilities to promote interest of the students in sports and cultural activities. The sports facilities available in the campus are:

Outdoor sports facilities: Football ground, Cricket ground, Volleyball court, Basketball court, Badminton courts, Kho-Kho court, Kabaddi court, Track and Field facilities: 400 meter running track, 100 meter running track, High Jump and Long Jump Pit, Throwing Arena.

Indoor Sports Facilities: 5 Table Tennis Tables, Chess Boards and Carom Boards

Well equipped Gymnasium with multi-gym, power lifting and weight lifting facilities

To promote interest of the students in cultural activities, the University has a dedicated Mrityunjay auditorium and a fully-functional **Music and Cultural Cell.** The Cell provides regular training to the students and ensures their participation in intra-university, inter-university and national level events. The students of the University have participated in more than 10 International events and have secured prominent positions.

4.2 LIBRARY AS A LEARNING RESOURCE

4.2.1 Does the library have an Advisory Committee? Specify the composition of the Committee. What significant initiatives have been taken by the committee to render the library student/user friendly?

Yes. The library is being governed by the Library Committee with Vice Chancellor as its Chairman, the Head of the Departments as members and the Librarian as convener for the professional growth of the library. The committee looks after the budget proposals, purchasing of the books, journals, periodicals, staff requirements and their performance, and submits the advices to the academic council. The Library Committee also looks into the rules and regulations for the smooth functioning of the Library under the supervision of the Librarian. The functions of the Library Committee are as follows:

Functions of Library Committee

- Budget allocation to all departments based on their demand of books and journals.
- Scrutiny of list of books and journals as per needs of the concerned departments.
- Policy decision regarding the Library.
- Framing of Library rules and regulations including the purchase of book and nonbook materials.
- To implement recent technology in the Library and convert the learning resource centre into a modernized one through the purchase of equipments such as computers, scanners, printers and barcode.
- Encouraging the Library staff members to attend faculty development programs, conferences, workshops related to Library, e-resources and latest technology implementation in and around the world.
- Monitoring of the routine functions of the Library.

The major innovative steps taken by the Library Committee are as follows:

- User orientation program: to educate and train the students and the staff members by making them aware about the information services and resources available in the library.
- Usage of ICT based library services: the Library staff is also being trained to use the ICT based library services themselves, as well as assist the users as and when required.
- **Exhibition of new arrivals:** The Library has a recent arrival corner and it is updated on weekly basis.
- **UPS supply:** The library is on the uninterrupted power supply, so as to smoothen the functioning right from the morning 7.00 am to 8.30 pm.
- **Online access of E-journals:** 25 dedicated machines are installed in the library building (Aryabhatt Bhavan), for the effective use of e-journals by the students and faculty.
- Automation of Library: The entire library operations have been automated by the help of SOUL software for the smooth functioning and effective usage.
- **Competent and Qualified Library professionals:** the team of Library staff is highly qualified and competent; all of them are M. Lib. /Ph.D. and eagerly support the users in mining the desired information.
- Sitting arrangements and supporting staff: the Library has sufficient supporting staff to cater the maintenance and cleanliness of the Library. There is 150 seating capacity in the library with comfortable chairs and tables.
- Lift facility: The Library has a lift for use by the University staff and physically challenged individuals.
- **Installation of CCTV for the security:** The entire Library has been secured by the CCTV installation, which helps in continuous monitoring and smooth functioning by the staff members.

The **Aryabhatt Bhavan** (**Central Library**) is a tower shaped, tallest building of the University and the classification of the books is done floor-wise. The five storied building has excellent state of the art computer facilities, perfect reading environment and comfortable furniture.

a) University Library Budget: (Books and Printed Periodicals)

The annual budget of the Central Library is Rs. 10,00,000 out of which Rs. 4,50,000 is spent on purchase of print/electronic journals/periodicals and Rs. 4,00,000 is spent on purchasing books.

The University has taken following initiatives to make the library a happening place -

- Orientation and refresher programmes for all students and staff.
- Advanced training programme for the research scholars.
- Document delivery service to the research scholars for documents of other universities.
- Sufficient infrastructure with adequate furniture are made available for the students.
- Students are motivated to refer library materials by giving them assignments in their course work.
- PG students are allotted time to refer library after class hours. This enables them to read more and creates interest.
- The new arrivals are informed from time to time through circulars, intranet or during staff meetings and academic gatherings. The new facilities are also commenced after providing necessary training.
- Offer library as a major platform to conduct E-resource usage programmes.
- Library frequently organizes book fairs, literary weeks etc. to attract students.

- The users are encouraged to record their views and comments in a feedback register.
- A Senior Faculty in the department is appointed as Library in-charge and he/she receives the feedback.

- Feedback is obtained in the standard format available in the library. The suggestions are discussed and are adopted.
- As per the received suggestions, new books and journals are added to the library.

4.3 IT INFRASTRUCTURE

Yes, the University has a clear and comprehensive IT policy in order to promote technology usage in the campus.

• **IT Service Management**: A dedicated team has been deployed to cater to all the IT services and their respective management in the University campus. The IT team is headed by the Technical Advisor-System Analyst; programmers and other supporting staff are responsible for the Campus-wide Network maintenance and security.

The team is equally supported by the Department of Computer Science of the University and IT Department of the Shanti Kunj to provide the best platform and services to the users. The University portal has the basic features like floating of basic information, leave forms, student attendance feeding facilities, etc. The IT team also ensures full connectivity of the wi-fi in the campus. The University website www.dsvv.ac.in is also being maintained by the IT team.

- **Information Security**: The University is committed to apply all the guidelines provided in IT Act 2000 as amended from time to time. The University does not permit the pirated / unauthorized operating systems, application software and development tools on its systems, be it laptops, desktops or servers.
- **Network Security:** The University has established the entire computer network on LAN on optical fiber cable. The network security measure does include installation of Cyberoam in network to ensure the safety and security of the data on computer systems, servers or on the network. The respective logins are provided to all the staff and the students, which are regularly monitored. The databases and other important University information are highly secured and wellguarded from unauthorized users and hackers.
- **Risk Management:** The measures taken for the risk management include uninterrupted power supply, parallel servers, data maintenance and backups at regular intervals on secondary media. The fire extinguishers have been placed in the computer labs, and server rooms are air conditioned along with restricted entry in the same. The unwanted material and sites on the internet are blocked and computer professionals make all attempts that these IT resources are used only for academic, research and administrative purposes.
- **Software asset management:** [deleted by S G]The University policy clearly indicates to purchase all the legal and licensed software and hardware as per requirement; this has been implemented.
- **Open source resources:** The University is committed for using open source resources. Ubuntu, an open source platform has been implemented in IT labs. The students are also being advised to use open source software for technical development and projects.
- **Green computing:** University encourages the purchase of less power consumption IT equipments to promote green computing. The use of liquid-crystal-display (LCD) monitors is preferred over cathode-ray-tube (CRT) monitors and almost all the CRT monitors have been replaced. The use of laptops and notebook computers rather than desktop computers is also being promoted.

4.3.6 What are the IT facilities available to individual teachers for effective teaching and quality research?

Most of the University faculty has individual computer along with internet connectivity for effective teaching and quality research. The necessary software like Office 2010 along with open source development tools have been provided for the preparation of Power-Point presentation, reports and other office work. The classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors / screens. The e-journals are also made available to the faculty for effective research and publication. They are also provided the official email-IDs on University domain.

4.3.7 Give details of ICT-enabled classrooms/learning spaces available within the university? How are they utilized for enhancing the quality of teaching and learning?

The ICT-enabled classrooms are available in the University along with four seminar rooms. They are well equipped with LCD projectors, computer systems, white board etc. as a supporting aid for effective teaching and learning. Establishment of Language Lab in the Department of Languages is an important step in providing ICT-enabled platform to the students to improve their communication skills.

Most of the departments have their own computer labs with internet connectivity for the benefit of students and faculty. The quality of teaching and learning is also enhanced through web conferencing, webinars, video lectures and other ICT based gadgets for organizing regular guest lectures / modular trainings.

4.3.8 How are the faculty assisted in preparing computer- aided teaching-learning materials? What are the facilities available in the university for such initiatives?

Most of the University faculty are comfortable with the computer based teaching technologies. They use allotted computers for the preparation of study material, power-point presentations along with making preparation for their effective participation in various seminars / workshops / symposia organized in different parts of India.

In some departments, faculty are in the process of developing digital academic contents, DVD's, for the benefit of the students. The contents are usually developed with the open source modules like Moodle, Joomla (open source) and the team of students and faculty are taking initiatives for the same under Software Development Cell.

The Training Cell of the University constantly organizes modular programs for the benefit of faculty on basics of computer, technology and technical skill development. Moreover, the faculty are also provided necessary help in the preparation of Power-Point slides, e-learning materials, data analysis, etc., as and when required, by the Training and Placement Cell.

4.3.9 How are the computers and their accessories maintained?

The IT infrastructure maintenance program is periodical in nature. The hardware team regularly visits the various systems and other peripherals for routine maintenance. All departments are requested to make the "help" call to the Hardware Maintenance Division of the Department of Computer Science, which is duly registered and taken care of on a daily basis.

While purchasing ICT products, the University ensures one year to three year warranty to minimize the maintenance. This confirms the 24x7 availability of the engineering support when required. Additionally the IT Department of Shanti Kunj also provides the necessary assistance.

4.3.10 Does the university avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity? If so, what are the services availed of?

Yes, the University is a part of National Knowledge Network through NMEICT project of MHRD, Govt. of India from 2010. The University avails following services:

- The University is connected through 1 Gbps internet bandwidth from local BSNL NKN center.
- Internet surfing from all the nodes connected to the Network.
- Accessing the e-journals subscribed through UGC-Infonet project and other resources.
- Enhanced internet speed for downloading of information and video streaming.

4.3.11 Does the university avail of web resources such as Wikipedia, dictionary and other education enhancing resources? What are its policies in this regard?

The University avails all web resources such as Wikipedia, dictionaries and other similar educational resources. As most of these are open source, the faculty and students can use them as references as well as to enhance their knowledge. The IT Department, Central Library and Training Cell make all the efforts to spread awareness about their availability. However, the University policy ensures that any content downloaded by the faculty or students from such web resources would be the total responsibility of the user.

4.3.12 Provide details on the provision made in the annual budget for the update, deployment and maintenance of computers in the university.

In the central budget of the University, there is a special provision for the update, deployment and maintenance of computers and other peripherals in the University. The departments are requested to submit their respective budgets based on their IT needs and extension activities. There is a central purchase committee, which supervises all the requirements and approves the indents based on the availability of the budget. The details of the IT budget allocation have been given above under point 4.3.3.

4.3.13 What plans have been envisioned for the gradual transfer of teaching and learning from closed university information network to open environment?

The University was established with a vision to make a definite impact on modern education system. The initial concept of Gurukul is very much there and it works effectively in both the platforms, i.e. closed University information network as well as open environment. The University strongly supports the ICT-base and personalized learning needs, the development and use of open resources as an essential part of modern education, and encourages the faculty to join the open learning and teaching environment.

The efforts are on to generate more and more digital content like University brochure, admission procedure and selection criteria, examination results, annual reports, University journal, Ph.D. synopses and theses, and to put them on public domain so as to provide benefit to everyone concerned.

4.4 MAINTENANCE OF CAMPUS FACILITIES:

4.4.1 Does the university have estate office / designated officer for overseeing the maintenance of buildings, class-rooms and laboratories? If yes, mention a few campus specific initiatives undertaken to improve the physical ambience.

Yes, The University has an estate office with designated and technically competent estate officer for all types of maintenance work in the University. There is periodical review, supervision and monitoring of all the facilities provided by trained staff appointed for the purpose.

The Estate Office also has a Planning and Extension Division that has an Architect and Engineer with the team.

4.4.2 How are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipments maintained? Give details.

The infrastructure facilities, services and equipments are maintained by qualified and competent staff regularly as per the schedule prepared for the purpose.

The sophisticated equipments are maintained through various maintenance contracts with the service experts.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

5.1.1 Does the University have a system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

Yes. The University has a well-developed system to support and mentor its students. Being a varsity with spiritual background, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya enjoys the space to offer guidance and support to its students at professional, personal, social and spiritual fronts. The dedicated schemes and practices in place ensure the welfare and upliftment of students. These schemes are collectively undertaken by the Pro Vice Chancellor and Student Welfare Office that together bring efficiency and affectivity to the same. Financial assistance, scholarships, and other liberal policies offer support and backing to the students from the rural or underprivileged background.

Structure of Student Support and Mentoring

The University has a well – defined and fully operational model of student support and mentoring.

- **a.** Academic Support and Mentoring: Each course programme of the University has an allocated course-coordinator, who acts as a bridge between the Heads of Department and the students, and functions to provide initial academic support and mentoring to the students. The students can always bring their academic concerns to the Head of the Department, who ensures an early response by taking appropriate measures. Be it the feedbacks about a particular programme, any course, any teacher or any new suggestion, the students are always welcomed by the Head of the Department for constructive improvisation.
- **b.** Non-Academic Support and Mentoring: The Student Welfare Cell of the University functions as the primary contact to provide non-academic support and mentoring, such as financial concerns, behavioural challenges, adjustment difficulties etc. The Cell ensures to provide parental care and homely advice to the students. For any non-academic guidance, the students can always go to the Student Welfare Officer.

The Student Welfare Cell keeps thorough record of each student. At the time of admission, the student completes form entailing information about their family background, financial status, hobbies, extra-curricular interests, which serves as fundamental information to identify and recognise the strengths and weaknesses of the students. With each subsequent visit to the cell, a note is marked on this form so as to offer a lead for the next time. This in turn becomes a complete case study of the student and ensures better and proper direction.

- c. Hostel Support and Mentoring: The hostel wardens provide an affectionate, caring and protective environment to the students and act as first point of contact, in case of any hostel-related concerns. Additionally, there are 28 faculty members, who are also appointed as counselors in both Boys and Girls' Hostel to assist the Hostel Wardens and Student Welfare Cell. They function to explore and intervene in cases of any such difficulties that students might encounter during their stay in the University.
- **d. Spiritual Guidance and Mentoring**: Students are guided at all levels and proper counseling is offered so that the student can meet the challenges related to their age, coping with the environment, managing group dynamics, study related issues, career orientation, etc. Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya strongly believes and practices that any person having spirituality at the locus of control can cater to the needs of life in a much better way and take situations as opportunities, not as problems. Therefore, key focus is given in creating the spiritual base for the students, which in turn enables them to manage their life issues.

For this purpose, specially designed sessions are conducted under the direct guidance of the Honourable Chancellor of the University. It is indeed a privilege that the University has a pool of literature and teachings offered by the patron founder and the visionary spiritual master, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya. The Honourable Chancellor carries forward this legacy and ensures that the students get to learn the teachings of the spiritual master and the Srimad Bhagwat Geeta, which he delivers through his discourse every Thursday during the semester. Alternatively, sessions on meditation are taken by him to ease the mindset of students and to provide them the right direction in the life.

Once a semester, the Honourable Chancellor guarantees to spend time with all the students where he meets the students at his office. Such meetings resolve issues related to their life and their academic concerns and the students and scholars feel relaxed by this direct guidance. The Life Management sessions, which are part of the regular curriculum of all the courses at graduate level, also creates a unique group counseling platform for the students where practitioners and teachers from various fields help student with their confusions and therefore in turn filter down the cases to be counseled further.

- e. Psychological Support and Counseling: The University also offers psychological counseling as needed by the students. To accomplish this objective, the University has a dedicated Department of Psychology, which ensures proper counseling of students using Psycho-Spiritual tools. Both indigenous and modern methods are utilised in dealing with such students and offering them guidance.
- **f. Financial Support and Guidance:** The University strongly advocates providing comprehensive support and guidance to those students, who are in a socially disadvantaged position. The unique initiatives taken by the University to ensure this goal are as follows:

'Srijna'- Earn while Learn scheme:

This is an exceptional initiative by the University which offers support and encouragement to the students from underprivileged background. Under this scheme, students from deprived backgrounds are encouraged to represent their skills at the University platform. Students create inspiring products like candies, laddoos, rakhis (wrist bands), greetings, rugs, mats, stitch clothes, pickles, jute bags, handicraft, and lot more products to be consumed within the campus and this in turn enable them to earn money to meet their monthly needs.

This unique project makes them self-sufficient and allows them to earn while learning. Over the years, Srijna has evolved into a perfect self-entrepreneurial model.

Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya Scholarship scheme: Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya offers scholarships to its scholars on the name of its Founder-Patron, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya. It is important to mention that scholar at the University doesn't only mean someone who has only scored good marks in the term end examination. Overall estimation of a student's performance is done while finalizing the deserving scholars of the year. This includes their classroom performance, hostel reports, interpersonal behaviour, commitment to the social cause etc., and reports from hostel, Head of the Department, Student Welfare Cell collected before finalising such list.

Besides, waiver or relaxation of fee is also offered to the students from deprived financial background. For this, either the student's fee is waived off, or some donor is arranged to assist the education needs of the student. We are one of the very few institutions to provide a donor's assistance to its students.

Notably, in the last 4 academic sessions, viz. 2011-12, 12-13, 13-14,14-15 the scholarship and waiver of **Rs. 37 lakhs 25 thousand (37,25,000)** have been awarded by the University to the deserving students.

5.1.2 Apart from classroom interaction, what are the provisions available for academic mentoring?

Seminars/ Workshops/ Conferences:

Apart from classroom interactions, we create ample opportunities for the students to develop and grow in their educational disciplines. To achieve this objective, the departments frequently organize national and international level seminars and conferences where the students get opportunities to interact with the experts in their respective fields, as well as with their senior colleagues in the subject. Such symposiums also offer a place for the students to represent their calibre by presenting research papers, talks, experiential sharing, etc. So far, approximately 30 National and International Conferences, Seminars, Workshops or Symposia have been conducted by the University in the assessment period.

Alumni interactions:

The alumni are frequently invited to meet the students and guide them with respective modern trends in the industry. Such sessions are highly valuable for the students and opens new horizons for making respective enhancements in the curriculum and offering new approaches and concepts to the students. These interactions help the students prepare themselves as per the job requirements.

Guest Sessions:

Special guest sessions from industrial and academic experts deliver relevant information to the students and give them the nectar of their experience enabling the student of the University to learn fast in the overall process. Such sessions are open platforms for the students to spend learning oriented time with the guest. The University has also taken key initiative of inviting renowned people of their discipline to address the University students through a programme called *'Learn from Leaders'*. This initiative has witnessed the presence of many eminent personalities from India and abroad.

Course Coordinators:

Each department has been appointed with coordinators for every course programme, whose prime focus is to mentor the students on the academic front. These are subject experts with thorough expertise of the academia and industry. The coordinators advise the students for academic developments, newer ways of learning, changing trends, and enable students to take their learning process to higher levels.

Training and Placement cell:

The training and placement cell also plays a vital role in identifying the gaps and fixing them by suggesting new developmental areas in which the student can improve so as to cope up with the fast changing trends of the industry. The Cell provides various courses on the core competency development, capacity enhancement, soft skills development etc.

Industrial Visits and Field studies:

The industrial visits and field studies organized at the department level creates a practical hands on learning experience for the students. These visits expose them to the practice of the theory they read in the classes and enable them to think out of the box.

Internship:

The Internship programme of the University is also a unique out of the classroom learning experience, in which a student learns to excel by testing the learnt theories in the field. Students, with various skill sets are divided in groups to work as a single team in the applicable field activities and are expected to offer their learning to the society. Such efforts make them validate their learning and in turn help them grow into better human beings.

Spiritual discourses:

Apart from these, as stated above, the students are guided by the Honourable Chancellor who conducts special weekly sessions on *Geeta* and *Dhyan* (meditation) through which the students learn the spiritual lessons to handle the ups and downs of their lives.

Spiritual Study Circles:

Spiritual Study Circles (SSCs) allow students to make or chose their own study circles to discuss the challenges and opportunities of life and how to deal with them. Such circles are mentored by a pool of faculty members and related experts.

5.1.3 Does the University have any personal enhancement and development schemes such as career counseling, soft skill development, career-path-identification, and orientation to wellbeing for its students? Give details of such schemes.

Holistic development of the student is at the core of any practice at the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya. Each step taken is validated and tested on this scale, that whether this will help in developing and shaping the student or not. Therefore each endeavour taken is in the interest of the personal enhancement and growth of the students. Below are some schemes and initiatives taken to accomplish this purpose:

Daily routine of the students: The time table, the early start of the day at the hostel, the practice of early to bed, and early to rise, the two-time meal concept, simple living high thinking, participation in daily Yoga and *Yajna*, morning and evening prayers, evening meditation etc. creates a different experience for the student. This teaches discipline to the students and a lifestyle which makes him/ her more productive, efficient and effective and helps in refining their personalities.

Life Management: This unique course programme is aimed to unleash the hidden potential of the students and bring excellence in their lives. This module is mandatory for all students and hence, it provides an opportunity to create morally sound, conscientious citizens, who can lead the society and are well endowed with nationalistic ideals.

Volunteering: Students are involved in volunteering their services to various academic and non-academic events of the University. They are assigned in different teams based upon their skills and interest areas. The students volunteer in various committees depending upon their background; i.e. students of tourism volunteer in reception, registration and accommodation committee, sessions' management committee, students of communication in media management committee, souvenir and proceeding preparing committee, students of animation in photography and videography committee, transport and catering committee and music and cultural committee. There is always an eager participation from the students to take part in any such event.

Shramdan: Once in every month, students and staff members come together for collective cleaning of the campus. This is a purposeful practice to teach the power of unity, and it also clarifies a lot of differences or conflicts related to the soft human behaviour. The students learn and develop the feelings of togetherness, kindness, forgiveness and cohesiveness. This is a unique character building exercise and is termed as *Samuhik Shramdaan*.

Career Counseling and Guidance: This is offered through the Training and Placement Cell. The cell organizes special lectures and workshops relating to soft skills and personality development. It also makes arrangements for preparing the students for job and employability skills. It serves to cater to three identified areas of career building:

- a) Core competence development unit,
- b) Academic research and liaison unit, and
- c) Corporate liaison and alumni unit.

The core competence development unit ensures conducting classes to enhance the competence of students and build their capacities. These include training on making their CV, spoken language, computer skills, group discussion and mock interviews. Additional classes for NET/SET, civil services, etc. are also organized for the deserving and interested students.

Centre for Positive Health: The Department of Psychology also runs a "Centre for Positive Health" through which it offers guidance and counseling services. This department helps students having a broader perspective for career, goals and aims of life.

5.1.4 Does the University publish its updated prospectus and handbook annually? If yes, what are the main issues / activities / information included / provided to students through these documents? Is there a provision for online access?

Yes, the University publishes its Information Brochure with annual updates. It contains all the information that one may need for admission to any course in the University. The Brochure contains general information about all the course programmes of the University, admission process, syllabi and pattern of entrance examination, reservation/distribution of seats, eligibility criteria, employment opportunities, fee structure, facilities and amenities, and general rules. Information about the University library, welfare activities, NSS, and hostel and other facilities are also given in the Information Brochure. Its availability on the University website further enhances the dissemination of information to the students and other stakeholders.

Notably, the University offers each new student with an **induction booklet**, presented at the time of induction and orientation programme at the commencement of each academic session. This booklet includes in-depth information about the University, the philosophy behind its operations, the vision and mission of the chief patron Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya, parent organization- Shantikunj, and all the prime geographic locations within the campus. This booklet helps the student ease into the new environment and align with the larger thought process of the organization.

At the time of Gyan Deeksha the induction ceremony, the students are offered with a free subscription of the monthly spiritual magazine of the AWGP, Akhand Jyoti, which is a highly acclaimed monthly publication, being published in more than 9 languages and has a circulation of 1.1 million worldwide.

5.1.5 Specify the type and number of University scholarships / given to the students during the last four years. Was financial aid given to them on time? Give details (in a tabular form) for the following categories: UG/PG/M.Phil /Ph.D./Diploma/others (please specify).

Yes, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya provides assistance to students for obtaining educational loans from banks and other financial schemes. Additionally, the University also provides fee waiver and financial assistance to the students of the socially disadvantaged background through Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya Scholarships. During last four years scholarships worth Rs. 37,25,000 have been awarded by the University and they are always offered on time.

5.1.6 What percentage of students receive financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies (Kishore Vaigyanik Protsahan Yojana (KVPY), SN Bose Fellow, etc.)?

The University functions as a distinctive model of being run through the contributions made by socially conscious people via a unique process of *Anshdan* (Part-Donation), which allows it to meet all its capital requirements and shortfall in revenue expenses. It has a provision to provide fellowship and scholarship to all the needy students and hence, assistance from the Government has not been required.

It is worth mentioning that the University does not charge any tuition fee, but takes only maintenance charges towards hostel, mess, library, laboratory and computers etc.

5.1.7 Does the University have an International Student Cell to attract foreign students and cater to their needs?

Yes, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya has a full-fledged International Relations Cell headed by the senior faculty. It is established to advice students, scholars and faculty members, who are studying, teaching or doing research at the University or are willing to be part of the University in any such capacity. The Cell also aims to provide guidance and support to the local students and scholars, who have the desire to study, teach, and to do research at a foreign University. The Cell functions as the University's primary point of contact for International affairs as well as being responsible for maintaining the University's international relations and collaborations.

Every year the University receives applications from international students. It provides a single-window information and assistance relating to admissions and other facilities available to foreign applicants. Once the admissions are finalised this Cell

provides assistance to the students to make their stay and studies smoother and addresses all the related problems faced by them. It also makes efforts to attract foreign students to the campus.

5.1.8 What types of support services are available for-

Overseas students:

The University ensures all necessary requirements of the overseas students through its well established International Relations Cell. There is a separate hostel for international students with an on-site warden, who understands their requirements and understands their needs As a residential campus, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya allows these students to blend with the Indian students apart from their classroom to make them feel homely. The hostel is Wi-Fi enabled and allows International students to stay connected with their home country.

International students also receive separate classes due to linguistic issues. They are also encouraged to participate in the cultural and sport events and showcase their talent in various fields like Yoga, Judo, instrumental music, singing etc. Special attention is paid to them to get acclimatized with the new environment. The International Cell functions as University's primary point of contact for International affairs as well as being responsible for maintaining the University's international relations and collaborations.

Physically challenged / differently-able students

The University has provisions for the specially enabled students and takes care of the welfare of these students by providing them all required facilities. For the sake of convenience, their classes and examinations are held on the ground floor. In addition, ramps have been provided in all academic buildings to facilitate their movement.

Special aid is provided in the form of required logistics to these students during their classroom studies, outbound learning and examinations. Most of the University buildings are also provided with the ramps and rails to assist them physically.

SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

Yes, the University provides special facilities to students belonging to (SC/ST and OBC) and economically weaker sections of the society. They are given relaxation in minimum marks for admission eligibility to the extent of 5% of marks. They are also entitled for exemption from getting the minimum qualifying marks in the entrance examinations for admission wherever it applies.

Students participating in various competitions/conferences in India and abroad

Yes. The Pro Vice Chancellor's office and Music and Culture Cell of the University look after the participation of students in different competitions. The University encourages such activities and help students on the recommendations of the departments.

The notification for such events is made well in advance using the intranet services and the notice boards located at all prime locations within the campus. The students then submit their expression of interest to the respective departments. This gets followed by the analysis of students who have requested to go for the participation; their attendance, class record and performance is checked before short listing and finalization of the same.

Health centre, health insurance etc.

The University has its own 24 x 7 Heath Centre in the campus to provide essential medical help.

The University has a **Triage and Assessment Centre**, which includes a dispensary, pharmacy and facility to provide initial emergency treatment to four patients.

The **Outpatient Clinic** of the Centre of Complementary & Alternative Medicine functions with the help of two physicians and three Ayurvedic Consultants. The centre also provides specialist services in the Yoga Therapy, Marma Therapy, Acupressure, Physiotherapy, Psychological Disorder, Yajna Therapy and Pranic Healing. In addition, the University also has **Naturopathy** and a **Panchkarma Centre.**

Additionally, a 50 bed multi-specialty hospital with free access to healthcare for all the staff and students is also located in the premises of the Shantikunj campus, which is the Headquarter of the sponsoring body of the University.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)

The Career Counseling and Placement Cell, Centre for Competitive Examinations, the Youth Centre for Skill Development for all Services, and the University Computer Centre provide facility to the students to learn and enhance their skills by participating in the various courses and workshops/ training programmes organized periodically. In addition, individual departments also conduct special/extra classes for the needy students. Special classes are held for slow learners. Interactions with specific group of students are held to bridge the gap.

Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/ corporate/ business houses, etc.

At Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, learning happens every moment. Special attention is given by the departments to create forums for outside the classroom learning. The departments at their own level arrange educational tours/trips whereby the students are taken to various places of academic importance including institutions of higher learning, corporate offices, manufacturing units, and historical places.

Publication of student magazines

Several Departments have started their wall magazines wherein the students can publish and display their creative writings. The Department of Journalism and Mass Communication brings out special newsletters at the time of events hosted by the University. **'Sanskriti Sanchar',** a registered quarterly newspaper is the outcome of the collective effort of the teachers and students of Journalism students. These newsletters are edited and published by the students with the help of faculty members. In addition to it publishes a special News magazine **"Gyanprabha".**

The students also maintain a bulletin voicing various opinions named as **'Prakhar'**. Likewise, students from the department of Computer Science showcase their developments through an in-house publication titled as **'Palash'**. The students also publish a magazine at the time of each convocation ceremony, which is called as **'Sanskriti Manjusha'**.

5.1.9 Does the University provide guidance and/or conduct coaching classes for Students appearing for Civil Services, Defense Services, NET/SET and any other competitive examinations? If yes, what is the outcome?

Yes, the University provides preparatory classes for civil services, guidance from the senior faculty members and officials, practitioners from the industry, etc. Such coaching and mentoring session are offered free of cost.

There is an increase in the number of students undergoing fellowships as JRFs and selection in NET/SET examination. There have been 4 UGC-JRF awards, 2 DST awards, 1 Junior Scientist Award and more than 15 NET qualifications in the assessment period.

- 5.1.10 Mention the policies of the University for enhancing student participation in sports and extracurricular activities through strategies / schemes such as additional academic support and academic flexibility in examinations is made available in terms of credit of attendance, altered scheduling of examinations (practical) etc.

Yes, the University pays a lot of attention and encouragement to the students who prove their potential for excellence in sports. It provides a variety of incentives for participation and excellence in sports. Students who win national and international sports championships are honoured by the University.

The University also has an absolutely free gymnasium with modern sports facilities. The University provides free coaching in different games and sports. They are given academic support for the period of their participation in tournaments.

It bears all the expenses incurred on travelling allowance to participating athletes during coaching and tournament days. Athletes of different sports are given good quality playing kits and track suits. Credit of attendance is awarded to those students who excel in sports. 5.1.11 Does the University have an institutionalized mechanism for students' placement? What are the services provided to help students identify job opportunities, prepare themselves for interview, and develop entrepreneurship skills?

The University has a **Training and Placement Cell** for rendering the required help. This Cell not only facilitates placement of the students of professional courses, but also renders counseling services to them. There are placement committees in most of the teaching departments which are running professional courses to look after the placement and counseling needs of the students of their respective departments. The Training and Placement Cell has a coordination committee with one faculty as a coordinator from each department.

It facilitates dissemination of the career-related information and identifies the specific placement needs of the students of each department. Several reputed companies visit the University for Campus Placements. As a result, the placement profile of the students pursuing different professional courses has considerably improved. The Cell organizes several workshops and special lectures for skill refining and development. Special emphasis is given to sharpening employability skills, personality development, and tips relating to how best to perform in an interview.

Although there is no registered alumni association, yet, the University conducts regular alumni meets and reunions. These meets and reunions ensure that the alumni come together and share their experience to the alma-mater.

Some of the alumni are close associates of the University and suggest progressive amendments to the curriculum, mode of teaching according to the new developments in the industry. They also visit to guide the existing students and mentor them for being more effective and efficient and inspire them to work hard.

The University has a facebook page for the alumni as well as a webpage managed by the alumni of the University. The Department of Yoga and Health also has an alumni body with the name **'Prakahar Yoga Samiti'.**

5.1.14 Does the University have a student grievance redressal cell? Give details of the nature of grievances reported. How were they redressed?

Yes, the University has a Grievance Redressal Cell. Any student with grievances can approach the Cell for help and redressal. The Cell is headed by the Student Welfare Officer and has a panel of senior faculty members in the committee. The Cell also has suggestion/complaint box for addressing the common grievances and to receive suggestions. Moreover, Departmental Committees consisting of senior faculty have been constituted in all the departments for this purpose.

These committees take all day-to-day decisions on specific and general issues and work an effective mean for the redressal of grievances of the students. The office of the Students Welfare remains in regular action to resolve their queries.

5.1.15 Does the University promote a gender-sensitive environment by (i) conducting gender related programmes (ii) establishing a cell and mechanism to deal with issues related to sexual harassment? Give details.

The University has special emphasis on the promotion of gender sensitive environment on the campus. The University sensitizes the students and faculty members on gender sensitive issues by conducting discussions and workshops. The wardens of girls' hostel and PhD scholars' hostel keep guiding the students and handle their issues and problems and route them to the administrating officials for further review.

As per the guidelines of Supreme Court of India and the University Grants Commission, the University has a dedicated anti-sexual harassment policy as well as a committee in place since 2010. The students are made well aware about the provisions for lodging their complaints in this regard, if any.

5.1.16 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances, if any, have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken in these cases?

Yes, the University has an anti-ragging committee that ensures that no such attempts take place in the campus. The anti-ragging committee has registered no ragging instances in the last four years.

The University also believes that apart from preventing such instances to occur through a constitutional committee, the students also need to be inspired to live in a healthy and harmonious environment. To ensure this objective, the University conducts **'Unnayan'**, a welcome event for all the new students by the senior students. On this occasion, the senior students conduct a cultural programme to welcome the new students. The seniors also serve special meals embarking the beginning of a new relationship based on values, culture, and feeling of togetherness.

5.1.17 How does the University elicit the cooperation of all its stakeholders to ensure the overall development of its students?

The University takes utmost care of the students, prepares and motivates the teachers and non-teaching staff to work for the betterment and development of the students. The University administration keeps on motivating the faculty members on the desired lines and remains available to the students to address their needs and listen to their suggestions.

Regular inspiration from the governing body ensures that proper measures are taken from time to time to develop and groom the students. Not only this, the University conducts special three day orientation programme for the parents, which makes the bond stronger and helps in understanding the background of the student. Their opinions are registered to make necessary up-gradations in the functioning of the learning-teaching process.

Corporate and industry experts and alumni are invited at regular intervals to enhance the learning level of students and offer them the latest and updated trends of the industry so that they can excel in their studies and overall personality.

5.1.18 How does the University ensure the participation of women students in intra- and inter-institutional sports competitions and cultural activities? Provide details of sports and cultural activities where such efforts were made.

The University gives utmost care and attention to encourage the women students to participate in sports. A woman sports officerhas been appointed to look after the healthy participation of girl students in regular and zonal, state sports events. The University provides both indoor and outdoor sports provisions for games like, volley ball, basketball, cricket, badminton, kho-kho, kabaddi, long jump, short put, etc. and many more indoor games like chess, table tennis, carom etc.

A dedicated department to encourage participation of female students in the cultural activities is in place and is actively involved in inspiring the female students to participate in meaningful representation of their art. The department is named as **Sanskritik Prakostha (Music and Culture Cell).** As the name suggests, the department takes due care in preserving the essence of Indian culture and represent the skills and art of the students in more meaningful and significant ways.




Fig 1: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for Graduation level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 2: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted in Graduation level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 3: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for Post-Graduation level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 4: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted in Post-Graduation level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 5:Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for Undergraduate Diploma level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 6: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted in Undergraduate Diploma level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 7: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for Postgraduate Diploma level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 8: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted in Postgraduate Diploma level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 9: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for Bachelor of Education course in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 10: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted in Bachelor of Education course in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 11: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for PhD course in 3 successive academic years- 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 12: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted in PhD course in 3 successive academic years- 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 11: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of applicants for Certificate level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15




Fig 12: Bar diagrams representing the trend in the number of students admitted for Certificate level courses in 4 successive academic years- 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 & 2014-15

It is clearly evident from the above tables and graphic representations that the student intake has been fairly consistent for most of the course programmes, even when the number of students admitted has consistently increased; this is because of the continuous efforts of the University to publicize its programmes all over India and abroad (the demand ratio for PG Diploma is not consistent owing to the fact that the number of students admitted has been small and has varied a lot). The slight drop in the demand ratio for the UG programme might be attributed to the significant increase in the number of students admitted, while the number of applications did not increase proportionately.





The Management is always open to discussion with the faculty and staff, which encourages the involvement of the staff for the improvement, effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. There are regular meetings of office bearers and Management representatives.

The Flowchart of University Administration is as follows:



The constitutions of various statutory bodies speak self-evidently of the participative nature of management even at the highest levels. The system provides the continuous involvement of all important functionaries and the faculty in the decision making and policy formulation, as also in the formulation of academic, research, and extension programs.

At the University level, faculty representation on all the important decision making bodies, i.e. Board of Governors, Board of Management, Academic Council etc. is provided for either by seniority and/ or by election.

In addition, different committees are constituted/ nominated by the Vice-Chancellor from time to time to guide and administer the University functioning, both at the academic and administrative levels. At the departmental level, faculty is actively involved in academic decision-making and in other decisions taken by the Academic Council, Boards of Studies and other Departmental Committees.

The leadership of the University plays a role model to make a positive impact at all levels of functionaries; provides autonomy and empowerment to the operations at different levels to make them work efficiently, confidently and diligently.

The senior staff members are appointed as conveners of various committees and are given full autonomy in decision making. Various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are conducted through the different committees.

The total decision making process is democratic and decentralized, which ensures continuous interaction between the faculty and other staff and the administration. This work-approach promotes a healthy coordination among various academic and administrative units of the University. In this way the University grooms leaders at higher levels, faculty, staff and students.

6.1.10 Has the University evolved a knowledge management strategy? If yes, Give details.

The main focus of our University is on the knowledge management. The use of internet technologies in particular impacts upon academic knowledge in fundamental ways, breaking traditional knowledge linkages, creating new knowledge management practices and creating new teaching and learning cultures.

A strategic approach to evolve a knowledge management process in the University has been developed, which involves focused and integrated approaches. Implementation of this policy entails infrastructural development, implementation of knowledge management technologies (ICT), well-equipped laboratories initiatives for faculty development, organization of national/international conferences/ seminars/ workshops, enhancement of laboratory and library facilities, creation of amenities and facilities for the learners and the faculty in the University campus etc.

All these programs have been implemented in the University, resulting in the creation of one of the best facilities for knowledge management.

• Contributing to national development

The foundation of the University carried the concept of societal upliftment through social refinement. The mission and vision statement of the University ensures the fundamentals of preferring and building character over competence, excellence over competition, and therefore it is in the process of creating students and scholars, who excel in all spheres of life and create a better nation after finishing their studies. The process employed by the leadership to serve this purpose includes:

- Providing a unique course programme in the form of **Life Management**, which aims to unleash the hidden potential of the students and bring excellence in their lives. This module is mandatory for all students and hence, it provides an opportunity to create morally sound, conscientious citizens, who can lead the society and are well endowed with nationalistic ideals.
- Dissemination of facets of Indian culture by building a mechanism (daily routine and curriculum at DSVV) to spread the divine message is one of the prime contributions in enhancing the nation's pride at global level.
- Serving the community at large through **Social Internship programme** by rendering services to police administration, national defense services, villages, towns, offering self-entrepreneurial training ventures to enable youngsters and village people to stand on their own, and by offering consultancy services to the thinking minds of the corporate world at various levels.
- Conducting research on spiritual practices and creating valuable knowledge-base in various subjects like yoga, psychology, tourism, computer science, oriental studies, Indian culture, journalism, etc. is another important way through which contribution is being made to the nation's development.
- Conducting workshops and seminars at international level attracting foreign participants and making them explore the teachings of Indian culture.
- Starting unique seminar programme called 'Learn from Leaders' that allows students and faculty to interact with great leaders of the nation and learn from their experience.

Fostering global competencies among students

- Efforts are made to enhance the competencies of the students to make them think globally and enhance their personality traits accordingly. Special classes are arranged from foreign guest faculty visitors at regular intervals throughout the semester.
- The University has organized various National and International level seminars, workshops and conferences to allow students to interact with personalities of global eminence and learn from them.
- The University has 20 International Collaborations that permit scholars, educators, faculty and academicians of world repute to visit the University on regular basis and thus assisting to foster global competencies among students.
- Students are assisted in developing their soft skills by the help of Training and Placement Cell.
- Enriched library and e-journals help in developing global competencies among students.
- Research scholars are encouraged to publish their research articles in international level conferences, workshops and journals.

Inculcating a sound value system among students

- Each and every policy, every action taken and each strategy made by the University, all are in the direction of creating a sound value system and practicing the same. At Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, values are lived, practiced and taught and then transferred.
- The daily routine of the University is a well crafted and knitted schedule, offering opportunities for development of values, for example morning prayer, meditation, yagya, yoga, simple food, simple white colored uniform, residential complex indoor and outdoor sports facility, Honesty Counter at Srijna (where the students can pick up items of daily use and deposit the necessary amount for the item in a drop box themselves), etc., all are with the interest of creating a value system and making the students use and test it in their daily lives.
- Creating an exclusive **Internship programme** for the students that allows them to perform social service by being with socially disadvantaged individuals. Opportunities for active engagement in social service are facilitated by the outreach work of University's parent organization, the All World Gayatri Pariwar. - Cultivating spiritual life through private consultation with their professor-mentors and through a series of spiritual practices and rituals that are carefully designed to cultivate the intellectual faculties of the students and are integrated into a set daily routine of each day. Additionally, weekly classes taken by the Honorable Chancellor on Gita and Meditation serve as great inspiration for all the students.
- Discussions, debates and exploratory talks at various levels, such as those through Spiritual Study Circles, Life Management sessions or through field studies allow students to filter out more value based opportunities.

Promoting use of technology

- Students are encouraged to use all the modern technology. They are offered training of how to enhance their technological skills, use it for making their lives better and in turn also help others.
- Computer labs are accessible and available for even non-computer students to help them learn and grow.
- Special assistance is provided to help them utilize the e-journals.
- Making powerpoint presentations, creating and expressing their skills by using technology are also taught and encouraged.

Vision and mission

The vision and mission of the University is to unite contemporary education with spiritual training to cultivate well-rounded, competent and personally uplifted graduates who have a scientifically grounded understanding and experience of spiritual transformation and a powerful drive to use their gifts to promote the greater good of society.

Teaching and learning

The teaching-learning process is facilitated through qualified, trained and experienced faculty. Apart from classroom teaching, students are encouraged to use library and internet facilities. The faculty maintains a diary and records daily instructions delivered, practicals conducted and other such activities performed. Any short time responsibilities (extra lecture, duties for seminar etc.) are properly recorded and informed to concerned authority. The effectiveness of teaching – learning process is

reviewed on regular basis through performance appraisal system, review of the internal and external assessment examination marks and by collating and analyzing the feedbacks received from different stakeholders.

The teaching and learning process is reviewed by Head of the Department for the concerned teaching faculty and the feedback is communicated. The concerned faculty members then plan for improvements, which are monitored on a regular basis for their effectiveness.

Research and development

Research has been considered as an important integral part of the academic endeavors in our University. Many seminars and workshops are organized by the University to provide expert information on research methodology.

The University promotes faculty participation in research by granting them leave for participation in faculty improvement programs and arranging for books required by them.

The University also has two specialized research centers as well as a Research and Publication Cell, which oversees the publication of the International Journal of the University.

Community engagement

The National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of the University organizes regular and special camps related to health and hygiene, literacy, environment, personality development, etc.

Human resource planning and development

The University plans and manages its human resources on a regular basis to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum. Department-wise Board of Studies meeting is conducted once in a year, in which the human resource requirements are analyzed and recruitments are done accordingly. Advertisements are floated for vacant positions and rolling recruitments are done regularly.

The University has adopted a mandatory Self-Appraisal Method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programs. At the end of the academic year, every faculty member is given an Academic Performance Indicator (API) form on the basis of the UGC regulations.

The form requires the teachers to self-evaluate their academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular progress of the given year. It also requires them to enumerate the papers presented at various conferences and seminars, and furnish the details of the refresher courses and orientation programs attended.


The report is mandatory for each faculty member to complete and all the data provided is duly verified by the Head of the Department before submitting it to the higher authorities. The completed form is then added to their personal files. The process of appraisal of the growth, progress and development of the faculty members helps significantly in better human resource planning of the University.

Industry interaction

Experts are invited from various fields to deliver guest lectures and industrial visits are arranged. The Training and Placement Cell works closely with the course coordinator of each department, and together they design appropriate and meaningful visits to the industry so as to make students see, feel and experience the practical dimensions of what they learn in their classrooms. The aforesaid departments work in tandem with each other in analyzing the need and gaps, if any.

6.2.2 Describe the University's internal organizational structure and decision making processes and their effectiveness.

The internal organizational structure of the University is given in the following chart.



Revered Dr. Pranav Pandya, The Head, All World Gayatri Pariwar is the founding Chancellor of the University. The Chancellor, by virtue of his office, is the head of the University and overall in charge of all the functions of the University. The University keeps him apprised of all the developments of the University on a regular basis.

The Chancellor is assisted by the Vice Chancellor, Pro Vice Chancellor, Finance Officer, Registrar, Controller of Examinations, Directors, and Heads of Departments in developing, implementing and continuously improving the processes and systems to run the University.

The Vice Chancellor is the ex-officio Chairman of the Board of Management, the Academic Council, Selection Committee, Delegation, Examination Committee, Admission Committee, Seniority Committee, Finance Committee and ex-officio member secretary of the Board of Governors.

The University is privately sponsored by the Vedmata Gayatri Trust. Having transformational leadership as a practice, the top order believes in enabling the next level and assists them in making decisions and moving ahead with them.

The various councils, boards and committees actively render their responsibilities from admission to the examination, from course designing to the discipline management and from student welfare and progression to quality assurance. The process ensures involvement of leadership at all levels and brings transparency in running the University.

The Management is always open to discussion with the faculty and staff, which encourages the involvement of the staff for the improvement, effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. There are regular meetings of office bearers and Management representatives.

The constitutions of various statutory bodies speak self-evidently of the participative nature of management even at the highest levels. 6.2.3 Does the University have a formal policy to ensure quality? How is it designed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The University is committed to the Total Quality Management (TQM), both at the conceptual level as well as, at the level of the implementation. The University follows a systematic, integrated, consistent and organized process of benchmarking and internal quality checks by introducing the Internal Audit system for all University departments.

It is envisioned as an educational exercise of accountability linked autonomy to assess and improve the performance of faculty, students, administrative staff and the whole institution in a holistic manner and to have a pragmatic view about the present academic standards of the University.

The University has established an Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC) to ensure internal quality checks on adopted strategies; such as stratified proforma based information on students feedback of teaching–learning process, self-appraisal by faculty, grievance redressal for all stakeholders of the University system, strict adherence to UGC norms in all academic functions of the University, administrative transparency etc. The IQAC shall now function as the focal point to design, drive, deploy and review the internal quality mechanism of the University.

6.2.4 Does the University encourage its academic departments to function independently and autonomously and how does it ensure accountability?

The University provides full freedom and autonomy to the Heads of Departments to function independently. Academic responsibilities are fairly divided among all the faculty members. Departmental Committees are appointed for the various academic and co-curricular activities to be conducted in the course of the academic year. This ensures transparency in policy execution.

The responsibilities of the faculty are communicated to them through regular faculty and staff meetings as well as the weekly departmental meetings. The Management of the University holds regular meetings with the faculty and staff. In these meetings, various issues are taken up for discussion before arriving at a final decision.

6.2.5 During the last four years, have there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? What were the critical issues and verdicts of the courts on these issues?

During last four years, only one court case was filed against the University in the Honourable High Court of the State of Uttarakhand at Nainital in the year 2010. The student challenged the admission process of the PhD entrance examination held on 31.01.2010.

The Honourable High Court was not pleased to pass any stay order regarding declaration of the result of the PhD. The WPMS 183/2010 is pending before the Honourable High Court.

6.2.6 How does the University ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder-relationship?

Yes, the University has a Grievance Redressal Cell to ensure that complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively.

The students can take their grievances to the Student Welfare Officer. The Cell also has suggestion/complaint box for the redressal of common grievances and to receive suggestions. Moreover, Departmental Committees consisting of senior faculty members have been constituted in all the departments for this purpose.

The faculty and other stakeholders can approach the Heads of Departments for their grievances, who can forward these concerns to the senior management, if required.

6.2.7 Does the University have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

Yes, at the end of each semester, the students are asked to complete an anonymous feedback form that includes various aspects of institutional performance such as learning-teaching evaluation, infrastructure, ICT facilities, hostel facilities, mess facilities etc. Earlier, these feedbacks were being collected by the Heads of Departments and now they shall be collected by the recently formed IQAC for thorough analysis.

There is also a due grievance process, which is employed in any cases that are brought to the attention. Concerns raised and recommendations offered by the students are duly incorporated in improving the institutional performance.

6.2.8 Does the University conduct performance audit of the various departments?

Yes, the University conducts regular performance audit of various departments. The University remains committed to the Total Quality Management of its operations and hence, it has devised a comprehensive mechanism of internal auditing that has been detailed in the point no. 6.2.3.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What efforts have been made to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff?

The University makes sincere efforts to enhance and enrich the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff. Some of them are as follows:

- Staff members are deputed for orientation and refresher courses as and when they become due for it.
- Faculty development programs in various areas and subjects are regularly conducted in the University.
- The University regularly conducts seminars and conferences at the state/national/international level. At these seminars and conferences, the faculty gets an opportunity to interact with experts from different fields.
- Regular workshops are conducted to familiarize the staff members with any changes in syllabus or new developments in the field.
- Faculty members are encouraged to attend seminars and conferences.
- Experts from the industry and academia are called to address the staff.
- Faculty members are encouraged to take up minor and major research projects.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of various appraisal methods used by the University? List the important decisions.

Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines of UGC. The appraisal report of the faculty is submitted to the management through the respective Heads of the Departments. API forms are given to the faculty every year. Student feedback is taken on an annual basis and faculty members are given a summarized report of the feedback. Faculty members meet with the Management along with the respective Heads of the Departments to discuss any necessary corrective measures.

6.3.3 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have benefitted from these schemes in the last four years? Give details.

The University is strongly committed to provide all the pertinent welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff. The University provides free accommodation, free electricity, free water supply, free meals, free mobile service, free health-care and 50% relaxation in the fee of the secondary school for their children. The University also ensures to provide full facilities for career advancement, study loans, research etc. to enrich their academic profile.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the University for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Various measures are taken by the University for attracting and retaining eminent faculty. University offers desired remuneration, residential accommodation in the campus.

Ambience (clean, green and serene), security, other facilities - library, research, internet, wi-fi, modern equipped labs, health-care, schooling are also provided. Faculty is encouraged to attend seminars and conferences.

6.3.5 Has the University conducted a gender audit during the last four years? If yes, mention a few salient findings.

The gender composition in the University is well-balanced among teaching and non-teaching staff as well as research scholars and PG students. The women representation in the faculty is 38.46%, which has constantly increased in the last four years.

The University provides a safe, secure and protective environment, which assists in offering a balanced gender composition in the University.

6.3.6 Does the University conduct any gender sensitization programmes for its faculty?

The parent organization of the University, Vedmata Gayatri Trust is a well-known socio-spiritual organization, which functions in seven major areas of social reform, namely Inner Refinement, Women Empowerment, Rural Upliftment, Self-sustainability, Environmental Conservation and Health and Education to all.

The Women Empowerment division of the organization has arranged numerous gender sensitization programmes that have benefitted more than 50,000 people. Such programmes include awareness campaigns and gender – sensitization programmes on various contemporary issues such as:

- 1. Female Foeticide
- 2. Dowry and expensive marriages
- 3. Health and Education for women
- 4. Employability of women
- 5. Safety of women in society

Most of the faculty members have taken part in such programmes.

Cultural programmes are organized in the University on a regular basis, which are well attended by faculty and staff. In these programmes, several plays and events presented by the students and faculty focus on gender equity and women empowerment, thus sensitizing the faculty about gender issues.

Purchase Committee is constituted of Assistant Registrar, Accounts Officer and Deputy Estate Officer.

The Purchase Committee is empowered to procure the required things for various departments as per their needs. All purchases are made through the recommendations of the Purchase Committee. The recommendations of Purchase Committee are finally approved by the Pro-Vice Chancellor. The time taken to purchase items is fairly short and the process is highly simplified.

6.4.2 Does the University have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details

Yes, the University has a well-defined mechanism for internal and external auditing. The process for internal auditing is detailed in the point no. 6.2.3.

The external auditing is done annually by an independent Chartered Accountant. The copy of recent audit completed by them is enclosed with the report.

All the BoS are accountable to the Academic Council of the University, whose composition has been given in point no. 6.1.5. The meetings of the Academic Council are held once every six months, wherein all the academic issues are addressed.

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Criteria VII: Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the University conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya has always laid utmost importance on the fact of building a natural environment along with modern infrastructure and has made sincere efforts to accomplish this objective. The University is absolutely aware of the current environmental concerns and hence, the dedicated Horticulture Department of the University puts in incessant efforts in maintaining the greenery and gardens of the University to make it an eco-friendly campus. The University conducts its Green Audit regularly. The University has more than 1000 trees, with many being listed as heritage trees.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the University to make the campus eco friendly?

• Energy conservation

The University's approach is evident from the layout of its infrastructural designs where proper provision of natural light and ventilation has been made in the classroom and staff rooms enabling lesser consumption of electrical energy in the daytime. Air and light ventilation save electricity and allow us to conserve energy. The Department of Rural Management has a cowshed, which uses biogas for its operations, thus conserving a lot of energy.

The University also aims to replace the street lights with energy efficient LEDs in a phased manner to consume power in the most resourceful manner. Most of the buildings in the University have a master switch operation to allow electricity to be effectively saved.

• Use of renewable energy

A Biogas plant of 55 cubic meters per day capacity that handles 1,375 Kg of waste has been installed and produced biogas has been used as a fuel in the gaushala (cowshed) laboratory. For cooking purposes, preheated water by solar heaters is used in the University mess.

The University has most of the new buildings being built with south facing elevation to allow solar panels to be mounted on the top of the buildings. The University also aims to manage all its electrical consumption through solar panels by 2017.

• Water harvesting

Water harvesting is done by recharging our borewell. The University also has a water recycling plant.

• Check dam construction

Not Applicable.

- Efforts for Carbon neutrality
 - 1. Zero Emission Initiatives: The University takes earnest measures to minimize the carbon footprints to zero, by Reducing, Reusing, and Recycling its consumption. The recycling and making of handmade paper contributes in doing so, where we produce and use folders, envelopes, files, notebooks, photo frames, visiting cards, etc. We also decompose the collected organic waste through a well knitted collection system on a daily basis and create manure from it. This vermi-compost system is a solution to the fertilizers being used to increase the yield.

This is to be noticed that the University not only practices **zero emission approach** but it also offers free training for the same to the villagers, technical people and interested researchers. At numerous occasions, the University has hosted students from institutions of national and international repute to visit and learn from this unique entrepreneurial model.

- 2. Gaushala: The University also has its own *Gaushala* (cowshed) with over 220 cows whose urine and dung are used to make over ten categories of different products. These products are then showcased and sold to offer self-sustenance to the department. The Department of Rural Management provides free training in making cow based products to allow people from socially disadvantaged background to develop financial sustainability.
- **3. Dietary Initiatives:** Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya has a strict vegetarian campus and the diet offered is organic with least carbon footprint. Strictly no animal diet is served, which reduces the carbon footprint drastically. The University also follows the daily practice of *Yajna* that disseminates the teachings of righteous action and creating balance with the universe. Recent scientific evidence suggests that daily practice of *Yajna* also helps in reducing the carbon footprint.
- 4. Plantation Campaigns: The plantation at the campus is not only done with the perspective of creating a scenic beauty and serene environment, but also to add a medicinal value to the campus. The Horticulture Department ensures that there are herbal plants like basil (tulsi), neem, amla (Indian gooseberry), giloya, etc. planted across the campus. The tulsi vatika, a specific herbal garden (vanaushadhi vatika) serves as the source for extracting medicinal juices from herbs and treating patients, students and all others in need. A specially designed *Smriti Upvan* with an acupressure path also contributes to the efforts of the University in reducing carbon footprints.

Plantation

The University has a lush green campus and is full of trees and plants of medicinal and ornamental value. As a regular practice of driving plantation programmes, we create opportunities on occasions like workshops, seminars, cultural festivals, etc.

1. Taru-Mitra and Taru-Putra Yojna: The interesting practice to be noted here is that at the time of Gyan Deeksha (Invocation) ceremony (at the beginning of each semester), each student is offered a tulsi sapling due to its medicinal value. The students then plant these saplings and look after them on regular basis. This sapling becomes their friend (taru-mitra) and remains as a part and parcel of their student life.

Also, the students, scholars and faculty members are encouraged to plant trees on their birthdays, anniversaries or special days and thereafter look after them. This creates a unique bondage between them and the trees. The students returning back to the University as alumnus pay special tribute to these trees and this initiative has encouraged them to be environmentally conscious for rest of their lives.

2. Vriksha Ganga Abhiyan: The parent organization of the University drives a nationwide plantation drive 'Vriksha Ganga Abhiyan', that has planted more than 10 million trees all over India, and students and staff of the University have played a significant role in making this happen. The University also encourages NSS activities and students get involved in various regional, state and national level environmental projects and initiatives. The Department of Environmental Science also plays important role in creating mass awareness on such issues.

• Hazardous waste management

University does not deal with any hazardous waste and hence has not devised any policy on the same.

• e-waste management

E-waste is sent to Shantikunj central store for further disposal in total consonance with the Pollution Control Board.

• any other (please specify)

The University manages the solid waste collected from both Shantikunj and the University campus on a daily basis to recycle and reuse it. The waste is divided into three categories: waste paper, cardboard, and vegetable bags; degradable kitchen and household waste; and non-degradable waste. Each is then treated separately as described below.

Waste paper, cardboards, and vegetable jute/cloth bags:

The waste paper, cardboards and the leftover jute/cloth bags of vegetables and any denim cloth material is processed through a series of manual and mechanical processes to be converted into a pulp or mash, which is then spread over on net cloth sheets and dried in open Sun. The dried paper is then separated from the cloth sheet and made wrinkle free to be converted into sheets of handmade paper.

The University has made genuine efforts in using only the eco-friendly paper for its daily use to protect the environment; all the routine office stationery like notepads, file covers, envelops, certificates for participation in various conferences and workshops that are organised in the University and Shantikunj, visiting cards, file labels, greeting cards, lamp shades, etc. is made of the handmade paper.

The kitchen and household waste:

It is collected on a daily basis through a systematic collection mechanism. The vendors collect the waste from the collection points every day. There are two colored bins provided throughout the campus: blue and green bins representing non-degradable and degradable waste, respectively. Upon collection, the waste is brought to the cowshed for solid waste management system. Segregation of degradable and non-degradable is once again done at this level and then the degradable waste is kept in the designed pits where it is biodegraded by earthworms. A layering of diluted cow dung is spread over the waste, which protects it and acts as a detoxifying agent, and prevents foul smell from the garbage. In a span of 45 days the waste gets converted into manure to be used by the Horticulture Department on a larger scale.

There is no methodology available at the University level to recycle the nondegradable waste and therefore it is sold. Although to reduce this, polythene bags are not used at the selling counters of the University. The general store and the cafeteria both use paper bags as carry bags. The students conduct regular awareness drives within the campus and at nearby places, which helps us in reducing the polythene usage at personal level.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the University.

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a non-conventional centre of higher learning, education and research. It is an exceptional creation, which has been born out of a unique vision of the ground-breaking scholar and visionary, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya ji (1911-1990), who was also a renowned social reformer and a celebrated freedom fighter. He had a vision to establish a University devoted to the preservation and propagation of the Indian Culture, which to him was *Dev Sanskriti*, that could combine the precept of practical knowledge (*shiksha*) and spiritual education (*vidya*) to create truly enlightened individuals. This objective is behind all the key initiatives taken by the University:

Gyan Deeksha – Invocation Ceremony:

One of the important innovations of the University is the Gyan Deeksha, which is the invocation ceremony that takes place at the first study day of all the students in the University. The University strongly believes that if there could be an end to Deeksha (Deekshant) then there should be a beginning of the Deeksha too and this ceremony is designed with that objective in mind.

The very beginning of the student and teaching life at the commencement of each semester happens with a traditional invocation ceremony, where the newly joined and existing students, along with the faculty members, are introduced to the value system of the University, as well as the expectations from them while studying or teaching at the campus.

They are welcomed by being felicitated with a Gayatri mantra dupatta and a tulsi sapling, respectively representing that they must aspire for refined intellect and purity in life.

Notably, in the past few years, this practice has been replicated by various institutions and campuses as they invite the University team to conduct the same ceremony at the beginning of new academic year.

Unnayan- Welcoming the freshers:

At Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya, the existing students and teachers have taken a unique initiative of welcoming the new students by giving them love, care and affection, and by celebrating "*Unnayan*", an yearly event started a few years ago. *Unnayan* means a state of happiness.

As the name reflects, the senior students express their happiness in finding new companions on this voyage of excellence.

The concept behind this initiative is not only to provide a ragging–free, protective environment to all the new students, but also assuring a caring, comfortable environment to them.

Life management:

The University is recognized for the breadth and depth of its knowledge of the ancestral wisdom of India and its ability to apply this knowledge to the cultivation of students of exceptional skills and character for the benefit of society.

Since the salient concept of the University is to develop character with competence in its students, the University has devised a unique course programme called Life Management, which aims to unleash the hidden potential of the students and bring excellence in their lives.

This module is mandatory for all students and hence, it provides an opportunity to create morally sound, conscientious citizens, who can lead the society and are well endowed with nationalistic ideals. Several innovations have been added to this course

over the last few years, such as introduction of practical sessions throughout the semester, which include knowledge of protection of environment, basics of disaster management, training of dhapali, yagya, communication skills, reading skills, personality refinement, stress & time management presentations, etc.

Scientific Spirituality:

The University has created another distinctive course programme called Scientific Spirituality to allow its students to learn about confluence of science and spirituality. Apart from offering it to all undergraduate students, this is done by offering courses of conventional wisdom, which are underpinned with modern understanding; such as the course programmes in the Yogic Science and Holistic Health and in the Indigenous Psychology that permit students to gain the spiritual understanding from a scientific perspective and to architect their lives based on great virtues.

Several innovations have been added to the Scientific Spirituality course over the last few years, such as using the newly created audio/video/multimedia modules to teach the concepts of meditation, spirituality in management, etc.

Spiritual Study Circles:

These circles are dedicated to practise self analysis in the light of enlightening literature for promoting a positive outlook in life. Students discuss various life issues and seek solutions through focused group discussions, inquisitive exploration of spiritual texts, brainstorming sessions and guided talks. This also enables students to interact with each other, build their confidence level and enhance intimacy among each other.

In a recent innovation in this practice, a competition was organized among different groups, wherein the achievement markers were based on day-to-day life management and participation in spiritual practices by the group members; the winner group was awarded a shield named Brahmakamal (the shield was made in-house almost entirely out of recycled materials).

Yagyopathy:

The campus has a practice of performing the fire ceremony (*yajna*) every morning, which witnesses participation from both students and staff members. Its positive impact on the environment and therapeutic effect on the body and mind have been scientifically validated. This sets the mood and tempo for the day and creates a subtle environment of mutual cooperation, trust and kindness.

Over the past few years, specific *havan samagri* (mixture of herbs used for making oblations in *yajna*) for various diseases related to skin, mental weakness and kidney (nephrotic syndrome) have been prepared by the Center of Holistic Health Management. Several people have benefited from these.

Naadyoga:

Likewise the morning *yajna*, this evening meditation with instrumental music is conducted every day and is aired throughout the campus through the common audio system. It is as good as a music therapy, which is practiced by everyone in the campus. Nobody is supposed to move around in the campus during this time and the main gates of the varsity remain closed for this duration of fifteen minutes every evening.

In recent years, Honorable Chancellor, Revered Dr. Pranav Pandya has created several verbal instructions and instrumental music based meditation modules during his regular Meditation Classes in the University; these meditation modules are made freely available to the students and staff of the University through the intranet, as well as the outside world through the website of Gayatri Pariwar (www.awgp.org).

Deep yagya:

Deep yagya, commonly termed as lamp ceremony is another event that represents the celebration of togetherness. Being in practice from so many years, this ceremony is conducted on every full moon night that makes it a monthly event. Deep yagya is celebrated at the centrally located Pragyeshwar Mahadev's temple and gives the feel of mini Diwali festival. Such practices help elevate the collective consciousness of the participants and create a tranquil environment.

In recent years, the students have been trained for conducting Deep yagya in English, both the ritual and the philosophy behind it, as well as a few inspirational songs. This is a special attraction in various international conferences that have taken place on campus in the last few years.

Specially designed training sessions:

The Training and Placement Cell of the University has been instrumental in crafting short term modules, workshops and seminars for students and staff from all disciplines. Such trainings are designed with the fundamental aim of enhancing the existing skill-sets of all the University members. Such trainings include the fields of learning complementary and alternative systems of therapies like acupressure, physiotherapy, pranic healing, naturopathy; enhancing spoken English skills; learning rural management skills at the cowshed; food processing sessions; etc. Some of these are certified trainings while some are skill enhancers.

International Festival on Yog, Culture and Spirituality:

The mission statement of the University is "A University for the Global Cultural & Spiritual Renaissance" and therefore, an exceptional festival to celebrate and spread the fraternity of Yoga and Spirituality to the rest of the world was introduced in the year 2010 and so far four such international events have been hosted witnessing participation from overseas spiritual seekers and aspirants of Indian culture.

Every year the festival is conducted from 2nd to 6th October marking the birth anniversary of Father of the Nation, Mahatma Gandhi and Late Prime Minister Sh. Lal Bahadur Shastri. Although, in the year 2013, DSVV called off this festival as homage to the natural disaster of Kedarnath. This symposium has evolved over the last four years and has catered to participants and facilitators from various nationalities and different backgrounds. The annual festival has become a testimony of a cultural congregation offering scientific plenary sessions, exposure to fitness and therapy classes, and spiritual discussions offered by the practitioners and revered gurus.

Gurukul - Intranet:

The students of the Department of Computer Science have created an intranet portal titled "Gurukul", which serves as an e-forum for sharing circulars, important notices, birthday alerts of staff and students, inspirational thoughts (*sadchintan*) and useful tools like dictionary, spiritual bank etc. The students can also check their attendance status; leave record, academic history, profile and related details on the same.

University Publications:

Students are motivated and enabled to represent their creative writings through inhouse publications. Following is a brief description of some of the new initiatives started a few years ago:

- Sanskriti Sanchar- This is a quarterly newspaper published by the Department of Communication. The bulletin showcases the brilliance of the students, as well as shares the testimonials of students and staff. The newspaper draws its inspiration from the chief patron Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya ji who himself was an eminent writer with over 3,200 books, translation of Vedas, Upanishads, and Geeta, writing of a new Puran- Pragya Puran under his belt, and needless to mention, the famous Akhand Jyoti monthly magazine, which is under publication since 1939 without any advertisements and sponsors, and enjoys over 15 lac subscribers every year.
- **Palash:** Likewise, students from the department of Computer Science showcase its attempts and developments through an in-house publication titled as 'Palash'.

Shriram Smriti Upavan

The University welcomes all its visitors with a health park dedicated to the name of its chief patron Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya ji. This park is not only a delight for the eye but also a model for self-sustenance and entrepreneurship. It was started in 2011.

This health park sets itself different from others for its uniqueness to enrich the physical, mental and emotional health. There is a circular acupressure pathway, which is designed with three levels of peculiarity and excites people to take the walk. There is a fresh juice counter within the park that offers fresh herbal juices and sprouted grains to add to the health factor of the visitors.

While this ancient therapy system (acupressure) takes care of the health just by walking over this specially designed pathway with moulded tiles, the herbal plants on the sideway introduce themselves to the visitors with their description mentioned on the placards placed next to them. This not only enables the visitors to learn about the medicinal value and usage of these plants, but also connects them with nature, thus helping their mind to become emotionally stable and strong.

Srijna

The University has an **"Earn while Learn"** scheme named as Srijna, which enables the economically weaker students to earn some allowance through their creative skills like stitching, tailoring, artistic craft work, making greeting cards, candies, rugs, etc. Although it does offer these students some economic viability but more importantly, it infuses a feeling of self reliance and confidence among these students. **Honesty Counter -** Students are encouraged to be honest by placing an Honesty Counter at Srijna, from where the students can pick the stationery of their need and place the respective amount in the drop box. This is a unique thought, which reflects the deep thinking of the management in building the character of the students.

In recent years, some new initiatives taken up by Srijna include making candies of jaggery and dry fruits, making jute handicrafts, origami (art of paper folding), etc.

Internship

Social upliftment through self refinement and vice versa is the area of University's focus, which helps the students in testing their character and building competence during their study tenure at the University. This internship is a unique and compulsory feature, which offers the students of the University a platform in the form of society, corporate organizations, and academic institutions (schools, colleges, etc.).

The students organize health camps, awareness drives, religious ceremonies, deaddiction campaigns, personality refinement talks, workshops and conferences. This enables them to interact with people, understand their lives, learn from their experience, and at the same time offer them valuable inputs and thoughts to help them transform their lives.

This therefore is a process of mutual transformation and collective elevation of students and the counterparts. Some students are also offered professional internships and there are some who contribute to the University's development.

Before going for internship, the students have to undergo a short term training, which is designed to prepare them for different kinds of social service activities. As a latest initiative, from the current academic year, this training has been made an integral part of the Life Management course curriculum, so that the students get trained in various aspects of social service throughout their study period at the University.

Extension and Counselling services

Like community services, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya offers extension services to the corporate and academic institutions. This happens through collaborations with institutions of national and international repute such as Armed Forces, Police Personnel, Civil Services, NTPC Engineers, Birla Tyres (Laksar, Haridwar), Hero Honda Corps (Haridwar) etc. Only at Birla Tyres, more than 5000 personnel were offered counselling session and personality refinement workshops over the last one and a half years.

Other such organisations include Lumax Industries (Haridwar), Cello, Eveready, etc and academic institutes like Core Business School (Indore), Amity University (Noida) etc. Faculty members of various departments of the University actively participate and show great enthusiasm in conducting these extension services.

DIYA

With the objective of channelizing the innate potential of the youngsters, DSVV initiated a nationwide movement, named DIYA (Divine Indian Youth Association) in January 2009, being initiated on Shaheed Diwas- 30th January.

Since then, the movement has come a long way and the journey of these 4 years has achieved significant milestones through the formation of DIYA chapters and branches throughout the nation.

With activities spread over various dimensions like tree plantation, cleaning drives, awareness drives, locally arranged talk shows and camps, distribution of warm clothes in winters, education sessions for underprivileged, workshops and seminars, the University's DIYA has been enlightening the young masses through its uniquely designed sessions and activities.

Ganga Safai

As a social service and a cause close to heart, every year the students of the University conduct a massive awareness rally spreading slogans and messages, and inviting the local community to join the program, reach Har ki Pauri in Haridwar, the world famous bank of river Ganga and conduct the cleaning drive.

This whole day activity is conducted with the help of Municipal Corporation during the Dushera festival when the water flow is restricted and a complete cleaning is done with tonnes of garbage and filth being removed. This not only pumps up the energy levels of the DSVV family members but also makes them more socially aware.

Format for Presentation of Best Practices

Title of the Practice – 1

Samaydaan and Anshdaan

Objectives of the Practice

To create a benchmark in the society on how an academic institution can run without any financial grant and bring people's participation in the noble cause of disseminating knowledge.

The Context

The ancient education system of India believed in the tradition, where education was imparted to the students without any financial motives and with an aim of passing on the altruistic values in them. In the current setting, it becomes a challenge, particularly in the context of financial and human resource management.

Believing in the philosophy of providing education to all without taking any tuition fee and without any additional grant, the University decides to build it with the part contributions from the Society and hence, it is aptly referred by the people as 'People's University'. This happens by a unique initiative called the 'Anshdan', i.e. Ansh (part) daan (donation), taken by the Founder-Patron of the University, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya Ji, and this ensures the financial management of the University. The second practice is aimed at providing free skills back to the society by another unique initiative called 'Samaydan', i.e. Samay (time) daan (donation).

The Practice

The practice of Samaydan entails a simple concept of providing one's skills and time to the society. The conscientious individuals, who have faith towards the altruistic principles and are committed for a higher cause, decide to donate their life to the University. They are duly offered the accommodation and food facilities, along with other basic requirements like free electricity, free water, free kitchen facilities, free cell phone, subsidized general store and vegetables and over that some basic remuneration to meet the monthly expenses called *Jeevan Sahyog Rashi*. The idea behind that is to have a simple life with higher thinking.

Proper care is taken on meeting both the criteria before accepting samaydaan of any volunteer. Those who are dedicated but couldn't join the organization as a full

time member render their contribution in financial terms. In this way a selfsustaining model has been built, which is growing strongly on the contribution of time and money.

The practice of Anshdan entails another simple concept of all the members of parent organisation donating minimal amount of money a day to provide necessary financial support to the University. Many people pay about 10 paisa a day, making it 3 rupees a month, which is negligible amount of money, but when it is contributed by more than 5,00,000 volunteers of the organisation, it becomes a reasonable sum to offer all the necessary support to the University and its extension activities.

This practice of Samaydan and Anshdan creates a meticulously designed structure of human and financial resource, respectively. The human resource management system thus allows us to offer subsidized education to the students by charging them a meagre amount for their hostel and mess, and offering them education at virtually no cost.

Evidence of Success

It is evident that the model is not only firmly established but is also growing leaps and bounds. There have been new courses, new departments, new collaborations, and interdisciplinary interventions, ensuring the growth of the University in spite of not taking any additional grant and continuing to provide education without taking tuition fee. The applicant numbers are on a rise and number of course programmes has increased. More than 24 collaborations have been signed and the national and international level events have also risen over the last few years.

It is important to observe that the interest expressed by the skilled students to serve their alma mater upon finishing their studies has significantly gone up. Those who clear the criteria of dedication and skill have become a part of the staff now, which is evident by the high percentage of the faculty members, who are from the same University.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

One of the prime challenges in executing this model is the stringent tools and processes in place to accept the interest of someone joining the University. There are some who have dedication but lack in skills, while others who seem to be competent, lack in the dedication. Meeting and ensuring the right combination at times poses some challenge. Another challenge is to ensure that the dedication level of the member remains upbeat all the time and s/he continues to serve for longer periods.

Title of the Practice - 2

Social Internship Programme

Objectives of the Practice

Social internship programme has been designed to make the students realize that they owe back to the society for the education that they have received. As is clear from the previous best practice, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is a People's University and we are expected to revert to their generosity. This programme has been devised to teach students to be more responsible and make them realize their duty towards the society and nation as a whole.

The Context

Service to the mankind is the service to God and to refine ourselves, we need to serve the society. With this objective in mind, the students of the University serve people; they organize camps, conduct awareness drives, perform ceremonies, give personality refinement talks and workshops, and serve the larger purpose of disseminating the core essence of Indian culture to the outside world.

This is a two-way learning process, where knowledge is not imparted from one end to another, rather learning happens with mutual discussion and experiential sharing. This therefore is a process of mutual transformation and collective elevation of students and the counterparts. Some students are also offered with professional internships and there are some who contribute to the developmental affairs of the University.

The Practice

Describe the practice and its uniqueness in the context of India higher education. What were the constraints / limitations, if any, faced (in about 400 words)?

The practice is unique in so many ways especially for its teachings of sow and reap and paying back to the society. This exclusive **Internship programme** for the students allows them to perform social service by being with socially disadvantaged individuals. Opportunities for active engagement in social service are facilitated by the outreach work of University's parent organization, the All World Gayatri Pariwar and this exceptional experience of social work allows them to learn about human values and oneness for all.

It also helps the students of the University to unleash their hidden potential and transform their personalities. They learn to work together as a team, using individual skills for collective good, and get to experience the richness of Indian culture while visiting various geographical areas.

At times, they also encounter challenging situations. It is appropriate to mention here that a team of 16 University students were at Kedarnath shrine when the natural disastrous calamity struck in the year 2013. The students were shocked to

witness devastation and death from such proximity. But, instead of getting panicky, they continued to help people in whatever capacity they could. Such life changing experiences do transform those, who are open to such learning.

Limitations – Since social internship involves arduous process, it may sometimes get tougher for some of the students. With increasing number of students and locations to serve, it is always a challenge to provide right locations to right batch of students; however, with the full flexibility in the module and the great determination of the students for social cause, this issue resolves without much difficulty.

Evidence of Success

So far over 15,000 students of the University have benefitted the society by providing social service. Numerous free medical camps, awareness drives, counselling booths, health sessions, yoga trainings, police training camps, etc. have been organized during the internship.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

There is no specific problem faced due to the erudite support from the administrative team and the counterparts helping in conducting the internship programme; though there are some limitations, which have been indicated above under the heading 'Limitations'.

Following are some of the key areas, which are worth recognizing as best practices or key innovations:

Faculty Excellence Awards: This award has been institutionalized to recognize the best teaching as well as non-teaching practices in the campus. A teacher is rewarded considering various parameters including pedagogy, valuable practices, teacher's behaviour, counselling of students, innovation and progressive ideas, research publications, books authored, rapport with students, assistance in enforcing and fostering excellence, industry interface, etc. Equal weightage is given to value and excellence parameters, along with academic excellence.

Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Software: Electronic management of student record, student and staff attendance, payment of maintenance charges, exam result and marksheet printing, disciplinary records, etc. are all very well maintained and has helped to bring more integrity and transparency in the process of student development and offering support. This has also reduced the time lag and has streamlined the process of student management.

Samavartan as Convocation: The University believes that learning is a neverending process and since there can never be an end to it, it can only go from one level to another. Ancestral Gurukuls called it 'Samavartan'. Samavartan or the Convocation ceremony has added new feathers to the hat, as they were the historical moments graced by the auspicious presence of the then President of the Nation, Vice President of the Country and Governor of the state. Two of the last three convocations of the University were presided by the H E President of India, including the most recent one, which witnessed the august presence of the **President of India, Mr Pranab Mukherjee, as the Chief Guest.**

Collective Shramdan: Once a month, the entire University conducts campus cleaning drive where all the students, teachers, support staff, and the administration come together and take responsibility to clean the campus. This collective effort solves so many purposes. Cleaning is just a means; this in turn helps create an environment of collectiveness by making people come together and work as a family. Students and staff members learn to take responsibility and ownership of their campus.

Gurukul-intranet portal : Two students of Computer Science department created an internal e-platform to smoothen and streamline the process of communication and reduce the time lag by creating an intranet website portal named 'Gurukul'. Since last two years, Gurukul has become a key messenger as all the e-notices are displayed here other than the designated notice boards in the campus. Not only this, Gurukul also displays the birthdays of the students and staff, offers dictionary facility, mental development exercises, quizzes, timetable and syllabus, daily motivational quotations and campus news. Using this platform, students can check their monthly attendance status, term-end exam schedule, result etc.

CCTV: For ensuring safety and security within the campus, the University has taken world class measure by installing CCTV Cameras, which ensures to keep a check on what's happening in the campus. We strongly take the responsibility of safety of our members and therefore the cameras keep an eye on the visitors along with the security personnel attending them.

Biometrics: The teachers mark their attendance through the Biometric attendance system, before getting into the office and at the time of leaving it. This biometric mechanism enables us to keep a fast track of the attendance of the faculty members, and saves a lot of time.

Vedhshala: The University has another unique practice, the ancient Indian observatories commonly called as Vedhshalas that are now present only at few locations in India. These observatories are located at both the entrances and near girl's hostel of the University. The students of theology are taught and made aware about the functionality of the same and they are always an attraction to the visitors as well.

Dhanvantari Vanaushadi Vatika: The University has a herbal garden (*Dhanvantari Vanaushadi Vatika*) where herbal plants of medicinal value are grown and later utilized to make herbal medicines for treating the patients. The Centre of Holistic Health Management undertakes the responsibility of the same. The University also entertains the presence of an in-house pharmacy where the herbal extracts are converted into powder form and then packaged to use in the later course of time. Plants of different species and therapeutic families are grown and maintained by the help of a dedicated team of knowledgeable gardeners and specialists.

Seven Revolutions: Under the aegis of Shantikunj, the University practices seven different revolutions, being commonly termed as, **'Sapt krantiyan'**. These revolutions are 7 identified streams of the society where Shantikunj and Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya work together.

These revolutionary streams are part of the vision of the Founder-Patron, Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya ji. Self Refinement, Health, Education, Women Empowerment & Awakening, Youth Revolution, Environmental Protection and Conservation, & Deliverance from Addictions and Eradication of Evil Customs are those 7 areas where all the students work during their specially designed social internship programme.

41. Was any need assessment exercise undertaken before the development of new programs? If so, highlight the methodology.

Yes, one new program was started in the assessment period and the methodology used in the development of that program is highlighted below:

BCA (Bachelor of Computer Application)

The demand of the recently commenced BCA program was first identified through the feedback forms completed at the time of the entrance tests and extension activities. Many aspiring students indicated that they would wish to have a BCA course programme in the Department considering the employment opportunities, existing infrastructure and the lack of availability of such course in the vicinity.

Since many students who applied for the program belonged to the socially disadvantaged background, particular emphasis was given to providing necessary linguistic support prior to the start of the course. The curriculum was then designed in accordance with the University Policy and in due discussion with the field experts. Board of Studies was then conducted to finalize the curriculum.

42. Does the department obtain feedback from

a. Faculty on curriculum as well as teaching-learning-evaluation? If yes, how does the department utilize the feedback?

Yes. The department used the feedback form to collect the feedback of the faculty on regular intervals. Additionally, course–coordinators have been appointed to monitor the progress of individual programmes. The feedback obtained from the faculty is used to modify the syllabus. The proposed suggestions are put forth in the meeting of the Board of Studies for due approval.

b. Students on staff, curriculum and teaching-learning-evaluation and how does the department utilize the feedback?

Yes. The student's feedback is being taken on regular basis. The feedback forms are anonymous and they are collected at the end of each semester from all students. The Head of the Department then confidentially reviews them and genuine suggestions are duly incorporated.

c. Alumni and employers on the programs offered and how does the department utilize the feedback?

Alumni of the departments and potential recruiters of our students are part of the curriculum designing committee of the department, which proposes their recommendation to the Board of Studies. They are also regularly invited to the Department to give guest lectures and to share their experiences.

- The basic initiatives are in the field of Vedic Informatics. Two new programmes were started in the assessment period and a need assessment exercise was employed in the development of both the programmes. The methodology adopted in undertaking this exercise is highlighted below:

B.Sc. (Environment Science as a subject)

The need assessment of the undergraduate course in the Environment Science was carried out by having informal discussions with prospective students as well as by formally collecting anonymous questionnaires at the time of the common entrance test examination of the University. The viewpoints of the academicians and stakeholders were then put forward to the committee that was formed to create the department in the 2009. The committee further developed the potential operating areas of the department and subsequently designed the programme, which was then placed before the Board of Studies for their approval. The programme was eventually approved by the Academic Council of the University.

M.Sc. Environment Science

The postgraduate course in the Environment Science was conceptualized based on interaction with the graduate students of the University and taking into account their career aspirations, employment concerns and related recommendations. Based on those suggestions, a core committee was created consisting of the faculty of the department, external expert and the University alumni, who looked into the syllabi of different Universities and provided their suggestions to the Honorary Head of the Department. The suggestions were then submitted into the meeting of the Board of Studies, where they played an important role in defining the objective of the course and development of the programme. The programme was finally approved by the Academic Council of the University.

42. Does the department obtain feedback from

a. Faculty on curriculum as well as teaching-learning-evaluation? If yes, how does the department utilize the feedback?

Yes, the department obtains regular feedback from the faculty members through peer group meetings, departmental meetings and in the Board of Studies. Each programme also has an allocated course-coordinator for evaluating teaching and learning. The feedback collected from such sources is duly incorporated in the further development of the course.

b. Students on staff, curriculum and teaching-learning-evaluation and how does the Department utilize the feedback?

Yes, at the end of each semester, the students are asked to complete an anonymous feedback form that includes various aspects of teaching-learning evaluation such as duration taken to complete the course, comprehensibility and teaching methodology of the teachers, as well as their accessibility and approachability. There is also a due grievance process, which is employed in any such cases brought to our attention. Concerns raised and recommendations offered by the students are duly incorporated into the development of the curriculum and improving the teaching – learning process.

46. How does the department ensure that programme objectives are constantly met and learning outcomes are monitored? :

- 1. At the beginning of each semester, the Pro Vice Chancellor creates a teaching schedule, assessment schedule, and examination schedule for each programme in discussion with the department coordinator, which is then communicated to the faculty and the students accordingly. The course coordinators are nominated to monitor the above set objectives.
- 2. The course coordinators meet with the department coordinator fortnightly and with the Pro Vice Chancellor, twice in the semester. The progress of the teaching, any concerns and suggestions etc. are discussed in these meetings and duly incorporated.
- 3. The course coordinators also maintain a record of teaching schedule, which is reviewed by the department coordinator at the end of each assessment period. Any shortcomings in the teaching schedule or learning process are discussed in person with the teacher and suitably corrected.
- 4. The learning outcome of the students is assessed by using both internal and external assessment methods. There are four internal assessment examinations and one external assessment examination, which carry 50% weightage. The students are provided the result of their assessments within a week of the assessment. They must earn a minimum of 40 % to obtain a pass grade in the course programme.
- 5. In addition, unit tests, assignments, lab works, project works etc. are also used to measure comprehensive development of the students.

- The departmental head creates a teaching and assessment schedule at the beginning of each semester in due discussion with the course coordinators and all the faculty members. The internal examination schedule is pre-decided at the University level and is followed by the department accordingly. The course-coordinators are designated for each semester depending upon their area of specialization and past experience by the Head of the Department.
- The teaching progress, completion of the units and any academic concerns are directly addressed and monitored by the course coordinators, who convey their concerns and suggestions in the meetings with the Head of the Department. These are duly incorporated in the further development of the programme.
- The learning outcome of the students is assessed by using internal and external assessment methods. Most of the course programmes have four internal assessment examinations and one external assessment examination that is carried out at the end of the academic semester. The students must earn a minimum of 40% to obtain a passing grade in the course programme.
- The unit tests, daily assignments, group discussions, presentations etc. are also used to monitor daily progress of the students.

- Teaching of the pronunciation of Sanskrit, Hindi and English Sounds, Accent Intonation and Rhythm by giving model examples.
- Pronunciation Drills, Practice in conversations, Speeches and Mock Interviews are also used.

The learning outcomes are monitored by using:

- Presentations on subjects taught.
- Regular Mock Tests.
- Quiz on Saturday.
- Assignment Reviews. The department also utilizes the programme monitoring mechanism of the University, which is as follows:
- The Departmental Head creates the teaching, assessment, and internal examination schedule in discussion with the Pro Vice Chancellor and then accordingly course-coordinators are assigned the task of supervising these schedules.
- The course coordinators meet with the Department Head fortnightly to discuss the issues and progress of the course. Any shortcomings in the teaching schedule or learning process are discussed in person with the teacher and are suitably corrected.
- Using both internal and external assessment methods assesses the learning outcome of the students. There are four internal assessment examinations and one external assessment examination, which carry different weightage depending upon the chosen course. The above-mentioned methodology is also used to monitor the learning outcomes.

The formal process of applying to the NCTE was then initiated after completion of necessary formalities at the end of the University.

INSPECTION REPORT FOR DEV SANSKRITI VISHVAVIDYALAYA, HARIDWAR 3 - 5 July, 2010

I. Background of the Institution:

Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalya (D.S.V.V.) is a non-conventional centre of higher learning, education and research. An exceptional creation, which is executed through the blessings of a great visionary 'Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya, who was a well known freedom fighter. He was honored by the Government of India for his meritorious services to the nation by releasing a one-rupee postal stamp in his memory in 1991. He had a vision to establish a university devoted to preservation & propagation of the Indian culture, which to him was a Dev Sanskriti. After his attainment of Samadhi, his admirers and followers resolved to translate his vision into action by establishing a university and named it as Dev Sanskriti. To achieve the goals, he has set in his life time for the radical change in the field of higher education, by focusing on Indian traditional knowledge system exemplified in Dev Sanskriti after his Samadhi in June, 1990. It was also assumed that the students would follow a simple, spiritual life style and they would benefit from both state of the art facilities and tried and time tested methods of Indian traditions. Acharya's silent revolutionary movement is now well established as Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalya which combines the percepts of practical knowledge and spiritual education to create truly enlightened students. This vision has come true and operational in the university Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalya is committed towards:

- Advocating and upholding the fundamental values of Indian Culture.
- Advancing the intellectual, cultural and spiritual welfare of the students by reviving the education pattern of the ancient times.
- Sustaining sentiments of patriotism and service to the society.
- Developing a new generation of professionals to spread the Vedic knowledge all over the world.
- Working with other reputed National and International institutes to enrich educational quality and spiritual activities around the world.
- Maintaining High standards of ethics and quality in research, teaching and administration.

The university has been established in 2002 through an Act passed in the legislative assembly of Uttrakhand ,recognized by UGC and sponsored by Shri Ved Mata Gayatri Trust, Shantikunj, Haridwar.

The University has well equipped infrastructure in the form of laboratories, library, games and sports, yoga halls, polyclinic, dispensary, mess, canteen, amenities centre, upcoming auditorium, offices, Wi-Fi connectivity, adequate security arrangements etc.

It is a residential and non-affiliatory university with co education facilities having separate hostels for boys and girls alongwith residential facility for all the faculty and supporting staff. The number of faculties presently working in the University is 101 out of which 52 are having Ph.D. degree in different disciplines. So far more than 3,000 students have completed their education through different programs in the university besides more than 9,000 students who have completed programmes through distance education. These students have come from different states of the country reflecting a truly national character of the university.

A unique feature of the university is seen in terms of 'Life Donors' and 'Time Donors' working as faculty and staff and contributions made by socially conscious people through which it meets all its capital requirements and shortfall in revenue expenses. It has a provision to provide fellowship and scholarship to all the needy students. It is worth mentioning that the university does not charge any tuition fee but takes only maintenance charges towards hostel, mess, library, laboratory, and computers etc.

The internship programme is also one of the distinguishing features of a D.S.V.V. education. This unique programme not only guarantees students application of what they've learnet in class, but also presents an opportunity for them to gain valuable career-related experience, make contacts in their chosen field, and better the world through their knowledge. An internship is compulsory for every course, and a special department at the university helps every student find an internship that suits his or her needs.

The Vice Chancellor made a detailed presentation about the university. He highlighted the progress made by the university so far and the innovative courses being run by the university. He also apprised the Committee regarding the governance system, the admission procedure, the examination system and the future plans of the university. After that, Committee visited various departments and inspected other infrastructural facilities, available with the university. On the same day, the Committee interacted with Dr. Pranav Pandya, the Hon'ble Chancellor of the university. On 4th July, 2010, Committee visited the other remaining departments, library, hostels and laboratories of the university. The Committee interacted separately with the teachers, notteaching staff and students. The discussions were healthy and fruitful. In the evening, the Committee met for internal discussion where all members shared their views about the university and then the process of report writing was started.

23 a) Research and Extension Facility

• Research Facility

As a matter of policy, the university does not take any grant from state government or central Government or UGC to meet capital or revenue or "activity' expenses. Hence, the university has focused on in-house research activities through dissertation work in Masters Degree and Ph.D. programmes.

In order to boost up research activities, the university initiated its PhD program just after the completion of first batch of Masters Degree students in 2004-2005. The University focuses on bringing in limelight the scientific explanations of ancient concepts in different disciplines. Notable among the areas of research are as follows:

- Socio-spiritual model for treatment of mental disorders
- Yagna Therapy
- Yagna for environmental conservation
- Management model in Shrimad Bhagvat Geeta
- Ancient religious practices for human development
- Enriching body of knowledge through Vedic sciences in different disciplines
- Yoga in relation to health, human consciousness and human excellence.
- Indian culture and its implications in today's context.

Besides in house capabilities, the university involves Professors of repute and eminence to help students identify and carry out research projects.

So far 62 Ph.Ds have been awarded and 90 are under progress. More than six hundred dissertation work of Masters degree programme are already completed.

It is worth mentioning that a research culture in the field of yogic sciences is established and the faculty has started working to make research proposals to be submitted with national and international organisations.

• Extension Activity

The internship is a unique concept integrated in the course curriculum in which the students voluntarily give two months of time donation for the society. They are involved in various activities related to health, education, self employment, eradication of social evils, women s empowerment, scientific Spirituality, social concerns and educate the masses in various areas. The Jan Sanchar program of the university aims at reaching the educated youth of the country to sensitize them about the various challenges faced by the society and involve them in the social reconstruction of the country.

A prominent activity which is organized by the Yog Arogya Polyclinic of the university is that along with the regular OPD, camps are organized for the Para military and police personnel across the country. Special camps for the treatment and management of specific diseases are also periodically organized during the summer vacations. So far more thousands of patients have been treated through this polyclinic. The psycho clinic of the university also provides regular treatment to the patients suffering from various mental disorders.

As part of internship and on request hundreds of yoga camps have been organized in different parts of the country benefiting thousands of people.

27 Admission procedure

Admission procedure comprises of Written test and Interview. Admission Procedure

- There is no bias on the basis of gender, religion and regional bias for the admission.
- Reservation policy of the State government is followed.
- Round 1: Written Test:

All applicants need to undergo the first round of written test. This is to test the knowledge and aptitude level of the student in the opted subject, along with the general awareness. The entrance test shall also judge the candidate's aim of study, her/ his affinity with the ideals of DSVV and capacity or aptitude to adapt to the Vedic lifestyle.

• Round 2: Personal Interview-

The qualified candidates will undergo one-on-one interview with the subject committee specially constituted for the purpose.

- Eligibility
 - For admission in Post Graduate degree & Diploma Courses, candidates must have a Graduate degree following the 10+2+3 course pattern with at-least 50% marks in Graduation.
 - For admission in Certificate courses candidates must be qualified in 10+2 pattern.
 - For admission in Graduation courses candidates must be qualified in 10+2 pattern with at-least 50% marks.
 - Maximum age limit for all post graduate courses except Certificate in Rural Management and Certificate in Theology is 30 years. Candidates having work experience in some social service organization may get an exemption of another 5 yrs. for these 2 certificate courses. No candidates above 35 yrs of age shall apply for any course, even with work experience.
 - However, in exceptional cases management may relax this condition.
 - Maximum agelimit for graduation is 22 years.

 - The applicant must not apply for more than 2 subjects through one form.
 - Money deposited once will not be refunded.
 - Final decision regarding the total number of seats in a course will be made by the admission committee.

- Based on theoverall assessment, University reserves the right to accept or reject any application at any stage without giving any explanation.
- Candidates are required to enclose 2 self addressed envelopes (9"x4") along with the duly filled up application form.
- The details of all the courses run by the University have been mentioned later.

28 Fee structure for the different courses run by the University

The university neither accepts any financial aid from the Government or any other funding agency like UGC for its routine operations. Ved Mata Gayatri Trust, Shantikunj, Haridwar is the main funding body. No tuition fee is charged from the students. IV. Observations of the Committee:

The Committee after going through the academic and other infrastructure of the university makes the following observations:

- a) The effort of the management to combine modern education based on traditional Indian values with the help of ideologically devoted teachers is creating a new generation of students with strong nationalistic view.
- b) The library of the university is sufficient enough to cater for the various courses conducted by the university.
- c) In academic arena the university has tried to deviate from the traditional courses to revive Indian Academic Approach where they are successful to a great extent. The Committee found that the new approach has takers in the form of campus selections.
- d) The Committee considers this university as a model experiment in the area of 'Time Donation' and 'Life Donation' for appointing teaching and non-teaching staff which started in 2002 and continued to sustain successfully and grow strength to strength till today.
- e) The laboratories of the university are well equipped, specially the Computer Lab is praise worthy. The university academics has tried its hand on the modern subjects like, Animation successfully.
- f) The building infrastructure of the university available for academic and cultural activities is spacious and well furnished.
- g) The university has up to date Gymnasium and big separate hostels for male and female students to accommodate all the admitted students.
- h) The teaching faculties for various courses are in place. The teacher-student ratio is 1:7. In new courses, the university is taking the help of senior retired teachers in newly introduced courses. Young teachers are also involved in these courses, who are in the process of attaining prescribed qualifications. Since the university is based on specific traditional ideology, most of the teachers, though qualified, are working as volunteers without asking for the UGC pay scales. The Committee in its interaction with the faculty found that the teachers are fully satisfied with the facilities, provided by the management like free boarding and lodging, free medical facilities, group insurance and time to time financial support for major events in the family. The teachers were found quite dedicated and committed to train their students for promotion of Indian values and ethos.
- i) The Committee interacted with the students and found them to be well equipped in their branches of learning and having high level of confidence.
- j) In its interaction member with the non teaching staff, the Committee found that staff is focused, devoted, satisfied with the facilities available to them and committed to the academic ideology of the university. Many of the staff members have devoted their life for the services of this university.

k) The Committee found that there is utmost cohesive atmosphere and mutual cooperation among all units of the university. The Vice Chancellor was found to be leading his team successfully with support, appreciation and respect from all the stake holders of the university.

V. Suggestions of the Committee :

- a) Looking to the rapid expansion of the academic activities, the University should create a separate Examination wing headed by Controller of Examination or Registrar (Evaluation).
- b) The courses should be updated / reviewed from time to time.
- c) All four Faculties of the university should have specific Departments/Schools and each Department/School should have specific subjects/courses with provision for introducing interdisciplinary course/s.
- d) Special arrangements should be made for teaching of Sanskrit, English and other Indian languages wherever it is essential.
- e) Special arrangements should be made for deputing the faculty or organizing Refresher Course/Orientation Programme for newly appointed teachers.
- f) Sports activities need more encouragement in the light of rising national competition levels.
- g) University should organise Workshops / Seminars and Conferences to constantly expose the students to scholars in respective subjects and also to update in the concerned subject to raise their academic level.
- h) Periodical / Research Journal of university needs to be started.
- i) UGC may be approached to start NET in new courses run by the university.
- j) University must undertake academic publications in the new / novel courses initiated by it.
- k) The Committee find the potentiality of the university to develop as Centre of Excellence in Yoga. Therefore, the School of Yoga and Health should be promoted as Centre of Excellence in Yoga by following all national standards with respect to nomenclature of the courses, curriculum development, teaching modules and methods, evaluation procedures etc.

VI. Specific Recommendations of the Committee:

Based on the presentation made by the Vice Chancellor and subsequent discussions visit to the different departments and other infrastructural facilities, discussions with the Hon'ble Chancellor, the faculty, the non-teaching staff, the students and the observations of the Committee made on pre page, the Committee feels satisfied with the functioning, the progress made so far and the future plans of the university. The Committee is convinced that this university is a commendable experiment in the field of higher education and is doing a great service to the society by launching innovative courses and research in the fields like Yogic Sciences, Scientific Spirituality, Water & River Management etc. The Committee feels that the university deserves all support from the Govt., the UGC and the society.


However, the above university, has not been declared fit to receive Central assistance in terms of the rules framed under Section 12- (B) of the U.G.C. Act, 1956.



DSVV CODE OF RESEARCH ETHICS

Code of ethics as adopted by the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya (DSVV), Haridwar has been drawn on the lines of Code of Ethics and Professional Practice approved by the Board of Directors of Association for Institutional Research(AIR) Tallahassee, Florida USA and as adopted by AIR membership on 12/18/92, updated on 12/14/01and further updated on 5/2/13.

DSVV Code of Ethics in Research provides some broad ethical statements to guide the professional lives of DSVV research scholars and to identify relevant considerations when ethical uncertainties arise. It also provides a means to learn about the ethical principles and standards that should guide the work of researchers. Code is directed to individuals and not institutions although basic tenets contained within the Code are also applicable to the colleges and universities and should be compatible with institutional codes and values. The research worker/scholars in DSVV may come from many different academic backgrounds and from many different professional experiences with considerable variation in research practices of individual colleges and universities and therefore this DSVV Code of Ethics for research is important. A researcher scholar is viewed as the "guardian of truth" or the "conscience" of the nation. DSVV Code defines a normative expectation for research scholars in their work.

Although it provides standards, the DSVV Code does not provide a set of rules. Reasonable differences of opinion can and do exist with respect to interpretation, and specific application must take into account the context of a given behavior. Adoption of a code of ethics cannot guarantee ethical behavior or resolution of all disputes. Rather, **it sets forth standards to which professionals aspire and against which their actions can be judged** (both by themselves and others). Ethical behavior should result from a personal commitment to engage in ethical practice and an attempt to act always in a manner that assures integrity. All DSVV research workers/scholars should **pledge to maintain their own competence by continually evaluating their research for scientific accuracy**, by conducting themselves in accord with the ethical standards expressed in this Code, and by remembering that their ultimate goal is to contribute positively to the field of postsecondary education. Finally, this Code is a living document that must change and be shaped as the practice of research continues to evolve and develop.

SECTION I - COMPETENCE

- a. **Claims of Competence**. The research worker/scholar shall not, in job application, resume, or the ordinary conduct of affairs, claim or imply a degree of competency he/she does not possess.
- b. Acceptance of Assignments. The research worker/scholar shall not accept assignments requiring competencies he/she does not have and for which he/she cannot effectively rely upon the assistance of colleagues, unless the supervisor has been adequately apprised or unless he/she would acquire the necessary competence prior to doing the research. The

research worker/scholar should use methodologies or techniques that are new to him/her only after appropriate study, training, consultation, and supervision from people who are competent in those methodologies or techniques.

- c. **Training of Subordinates**. The research worker/scholar shall provide subordinates with opportunities for professional growth and development.
- d. **Professional Continuing Education**. The research worker/scholar has the responsibility to develop his/her own professional skills, knowledge, and performance and to keep abreast of changes in the field.

SECTION II - PRACTICE

- a. **Objectivity**.
 - i. **Unbiased Attitude**. The research worker/scholar shall approach all assignments with acknowledgement of personal biases and make all attempts to minimize the effect of such biases in the conduct of the work.
 - ii. **Conflicts of Interest**. The research worker/scholar should disclose situations in which financial or other personal considerations may compromise, or have the appearance of compromising, decisions or the performance of services. Disclosure and proper management of such situations assures that unavoidable conflicts do not interfere with the integrity of performance of duties.
- b. Use of Accepted Technical Standards. The research worker/scholar shall conduct all tasks in accordance with accepted technical standards.
- c. **Initial Discussions**. Before an assignment is begun, the research worker/scholar shall clarify with the sponsor and/or major users the purposes, expectations, strategies, and limitations of the research.
 - i. Special care shall be taken to recommend research techniques and designs that are appropriate to the purposes of the project.
 - ii. Special care shall be taken to advise the sponsor and/or major users, both at the design phase and, should the occasion arise, at any time during the execution of the project, if there is reason to believe that the strategy under consideration is likely to fail or to yield substantially unreliable results.
- d. **Identification of Responsibility**. The research worker/scholar shall accept responsibility for the competent execution of all assignments which he/she, or a subordinate, undertakes, and shall display individual and/or office authorship, as appropriate, on all such reports.
- e. Quality of Secondary Data. The research worker/scholar *shall exercise reasonable care to ensure the accuracy of data gathered by other individuals, groups*, offices, or agencies on which he/she relies, and shall document the sources and quality of such data.
- f. **Reports**. The research worker/scholar shall ensure that all reports of projects are complete; are clearly written in language understandable to decision-makers; fully distinguish among assumptions, speculations, findings, and judgments; employ appropriate statistics and graphics; adequately describe the limitations of the project, of

the analytical method, and of the findings; and follow scholarly norms in the attribution of ideas, methods, and expression and in the sources of data.

g. **Documentation**. The research worker/scholar shall document the sources of information and the process of analysis in each task in sufficient detail to enable a technically qualified colleague to understand what was done and to verify that the work meets all appropriate standards and expectations.

SECTION III - CONFIDENTIALITY

- a. **Atmosphere of Confidentiality**. The research worker/scholar shall establish clear guidelines about confidentiality issues within the institutional research office.
- b. **Storage and Security**. The research worker/scholar shall organize, store, maintain, analyze, transfer and/or dispose of data under his/her control in such a manner as to reasonably prevent loss, unauthorized access, or divulgence of confidential information.
- c. **Release of Confidential Information**. The research worker/scholar shall permit no release of information about individual persons that has been guaranteed as confidential, to any person inside or outside the institution except in those circumstances in which not to do so would result in clear danger to the subject of the confidential material or to others; or unless directed by competent authority in conformity with a decree of a court of law.

d. Special Standards for Data Collection.

- i. **Balancing Privacy Risks Against Benefits**. The research worker/scholar shall, at the design stage of any project, thoroughly explore the degree of invasion of privacy and the risks of breach of confidentiality that are involved in the project, weigh them against potential benefits, and make therefrom a recommendation as to whether the project should be executed, and under what conditions.
- ii. **Developing Specific Guidelines**. Where appropriate, the research worker/scholar shall adopt a written description of any specific steps beyond the regular guidelines within the institutional research office that are necessary during a specific assignment to ensure the protection of aspects of privacy and confidentiality that may be at specific risk.
- iii. **Disclosure of Rights**. The research worker/scholar shall ensure that all subjects are informed of their right of refusal and of the degree of confidentiality with which the material that they provide will be handled, including where appropriate, the implications of any freedom of information statute. Any limits to confidentiality should be made clear.
- iv. **Appraisal of Implications**. The research worker/scholar shall apprise institutional authorities of the implications and potentially binding obligations of any promise to respondents regarding confidentiality and shall obtain consent from such authorities where necessary.

SECTION IV - RELATIONSHIPS TO THE COMMUNITY

a. **Equal Treatment**. The research worker/scholar shall promote equal access and opportunity regarding employment, services, and other activities of his/her office,

without regard to race, creed, gender, national origin, disability or other accidental quality; and in analysis, demeanor, and expression shall be alert to the sensitivities of groups and individuals.


- b. **Development of Local Codes of Ethics**. The research worker/scholar should develop and promulgate a code of ethics specific to DSVV mission and should strive to cooperate with fellow practitioners in the institution in developing an institution-wide code of ethics governing activities in common. The research worker/scholar should take reasonable steps to ensure that his/her employers are aware of ethical obligations as set forth in the DSVV Code of Ethics for research and of the implications of those obligations for work practice.
- c. **Custody and Archiving**. The research worker/scholar shall apply all reasonable means to prevent irrevocable loss of data and documentation during its immediately useful life; and, being aware of the role of data as institutional historic resource, shall act as an advocate for its documentation and systematic permanent archiving.
- d. **Assessment of Institutional Research**. The research worker/scholar shall develop and implement regular assessment tools for the evaluation of institutional research services.
- e. **Institutional Confidentiality**. The research worker/scholar shall maintain in strict confidence and security all information in his/her possession about the institution or any of its constituent parts which by institutional policy is considered to be confidential, and shall pursue from Section III of this Code all processes for that purpose as are appropriate.
- f. **Integrity of Reports**. The research worker/scholar shall make efforts to anticipate and prevent misunderstandings and misuse of reports within the institution by careful presentation and documentation in original reports, and by diligent follow-up contact with institutional users of those reports. If an institutional research report has been altered, intentionally or inadvertently, to the degree that its meaning has been substantially distorted, the research worker/scholar shall make reasonable attempts to correct such distortions and/or to insist that institutional research authorship be removed from the product.
- g. **External Reporting**. The research worker/scholar has an obligation to the broader community to submit and/or disseminate accurate information and engage in responsible reporting when requested by legitimate authority, including federal, state, and other governmental agencies and accrediting bodies. With respect to private inquiries, such as those from guidebook editors, journalists, or individuals, the research worker/scholar, should he/she respond, is bound by the same standards of accuracy, confidentiality, and professionally responsible interpretation.

Professionally responsible interpretation includes consideration of how the requesting individuals or organizations will employ the information. A sound understanding of how information will be used is fundamental to decisions regarding what type of information and supporting materials is appropriate and whether to participate with the request, if such reporting is not mandatory.

SECTION V - RELATIONSHIPS TO THE PROFESSION

a. Research Responsibilities.

- i. The research worker/scholar shall seek opportunities to contribute to and participate in research on issues directly related to the craft and in other professional activities, and shall encourage and support other colleagues in such endeavors.
- ii. The research worker/scholar should take responsibility and credit, including authorship credit, only for work actually performed and to which he/she has contributed. The research worker/scholar should honestly acknowledge the work of and the contributions made by others.
- b. **Integrity of the Profession**. The research worker/scholar should work toward the maintenance and promotion of high standards of practice.
 - i. The research worker/scholar should uphold and advance the values, ethics, knowledge, and mission of the profession. He/she should protect, enhance, and improve the integrity of the profession through appropriate study and research, active discussion, and responsible criticism of the profession.
 - ii. The research worker/scholar should contribute to the knowledge base and share with colleagues knowledge related to practice, research, and ethics. He/she should seek to contribute to the profession's literature and to share knowledge at professional meetings and conferences.
- c. **False Accusations**. The research worker/scholar shall take care not to falsely demean the reputation or unjustly or unfairly criticize the work of other research worker/scholars.
- d. **Incompetence of Colleagues**. The research worker/scholar who has direct knowledge of a colleague's incompetence should consult with that colleague when feasible and assist the colleague in taking remedial action. If efforts to change a colleague's incompetent behavior or practice are unsuccessful, the research worker/scholar has an ethical and professional obligation to use the institutional or agency guidelines for reporting such conduct.
- e. Unethical Conduct of Colleagues.
 - i. The research worker/scholar shall take appropriate measures to discourage, prevent, identify, and correct unethical conduct of colleagues when their behavior is unwittingly or deliberately in violation of this code or of good general practice in institutional research.
 - ii. The research worker/scholar who believes that a colleague has acted unethically should seek resolution by discussing the concerns with the colleague when feasible and when such a discussion is likely to be productive.
 - iii. If efforts to change a colleague's unethical behavior or practice are unsuccessful, the research worker/scholar has an ethical and professional obligation to use the institutional or agency guidelines for reporting such conduct.













Furniture Layout For Library , DSVV.


Note :- Legend For Fire point Hose Reel H. Reel Fire Cylinder F FIRST FLOOR PLAN (Area=245.36 sq.m.)


